New Water System for Caigary.

Calgary, Alta., Jan. 16—A waterworks scheme involving an expenditure of in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000, will eventually be entered into by the city of Calgary as a result of a report to the city council by A. W. Fawkes, municipal water engineer. He recommends great storage dams on the Elbow river which brings ice cold water from the Rocky Mountains right to the city. It is proposed to construct these dams at sites varying in distance from Calgary of thirty-two to thirty-nime miles. The water would then be conveyed to Calgary by gravity pipe-lines, saving the necessity of doing any pumping at all and largely reducing the cost of operation.

Ownership in land, he says, is a privilege, while ownership of the product of labor is a right. Mr. Brown pointed out that this could be remedied by legislation, and to the objection that a change would be an interference with vested rights, he declared that vested wrongs was the correct term to use in such acase, since the owners of the land themselves had not given it its value. Mr. Brown was able to show that with the exception of Winnipeg the whole of Canada west of Port Arthur has practically abolished the tax on improvements, and Winnipeg, which now taxes improvements on sixty per cent. of their value, is to take a vote soon on complete exemption. The reason that the land tax had not produced entirely satisfactory results in some western cities was that the land was only taxed on twenty-two per cent. of its value, and this left a fine margin and splendid opportunity for the land speculators. The adoption of the single tax he contends will eliminate land speculation, and bring land down to a reasonable value.

The whole address and the answers to the questions asked shed a new light on the taxation problem in St. John, and it is safe to say that the visit of Mr. Brown will give a new impetus to the movement to secure home rule in taxation in New Brunswick, and in St. John itself to the movement for a gradual reduction of the income tax and the tax on improvements.

"Sec. 32. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission"

EX-SOLDIER AND NAVY

MAN MAKES COMPLAINT OF UNFAIR TREATMENT

Thomas Reynolds, who describes himself as a former soldier and navy man with a distinguished record during his active service, appeared at the Times office this morning with a complaint of unfair treatment by an officer at St. John's, Quebec. Reynolds displayed a row of medal ribbons on his vest, but said that the one he valued most highly, that representing the Victoria Cross, had been stripped from his breast by a private soldier acting on the orders of the officer of the dragoons at St. John's.

He said that the officer had examined his papers, including originals of some and copies of others, which he carried with him, but had declared that he was not the man described in the papers. Not only were his decorations taken from him, Reynolds says, but he was threatened with a ducking in the horse trough. He says that he intends to bring the matter to the attention of the authorities at Ottawa and secure the restoration of his ribbon.

Regarding his career in the Imperial service Reynolds says that he served through the Afghanistan campaign in 1879 and 1880 in the 9th Lancers, then secured his discharge and entered the navy to be with his brother. In 1882 he was at the bombardment of Alexandria under Lord Roberts and in 1889 he assisted in the relief of Ladysmith, being hen a first class petty officer of H. M. S. Powerful. It was here that, he says, he won the Victoria Cross. He was discharged in England in 1900, and came to Canada in 1902 and worked in the naval lock yards in Halifax until they were closed. He says that all his medals, including the Victoria Cross, are in the ossession of his wife for safe-keeping, but asserts that his record is known in Ottawa and by many of the South Afivan veterans in St. John and elsewhere whom he met during the Boer war.





The single tax, which, to quote the speaker's description of his subject, "rests on a sure foundation and natural justice, and is in harmony and keeping with the natural laws of economics, and is the one honest, simple, straight, plain way of raising upblic revenues." was explained, enlarged upon and strongly advocated in an address given before the board of trade by James R. Brown, of New York, a member of the Tax Reform Club, last evening. The speaker based his arguments on the fundamental principles that land value is public value, belonging to society, and that wealth produced by a man's labor is his own exclusive property against all violation, contending that, therefore, the product of labor is taxed without any color of justice, while unearned increment in 'and value alone is justly subject to tax ation, being in itself the property of the community.

Debate after the address grew warm when Daniel Mullin, K. C., pointed out that in this city the application of the single tax system would involve heavy loss to such land owners as have vested rights in property at a nominal lease and in perpetuity—such rights practically amounting to a freehold.
