SENSATIONAL CASE IS OPENED

Lipton Men In Army Corruption Charges

BOW STREET POLICE COURT

Widepread Interest In The Old Country Over Charges Against Eight British Army Officers and Eight Civilians

(Canadian Press) London, Jan. 17.—For many years no suit has aroused such widespread interest in the British Isles as the proceedings opened today in Bow street police court against eight officers and non-commissioned officers of the British army and eight civilians, on charges of wholesale corruption and bribery in connection with the supplies of British army cantons.

Thirteen of the accused appeared. Two of the officers had not answered the summonses while one of the civilians was absent on account of illness. The six officers and two non-commissioned officers are all connected with the quartermaster's department. All have risen from the ranks. The civilians are all employees of Lipton, Limited, of which Sir Thomas Lipton is managing director. They include John Canfield, general manager and director of the company; James Craig, general manager of the military department of the company, and the former and present managers of the company at Aldershot, headquarters in Ireland and at Aldershot and Salisbury Plain.

DEATH LIST IS VERY LONG

Tokio, Japan, Jan. 17.—Up to last night 9,000 of the 19,000 inhabitants of the island of Sakata, devastated by earthquakes and lava, were accounted for. Others will be found, but the loss of life is very great. The farmers and their families are eating soups made of chopped straw, leaves and rotten potatoes and meat taken from cats, dogs, and fish. The more fortunate have a thin gruel of rice or wheat.

CANDIDATES FOR I. C. R. PROVIDENT BOARD

(Special to Times) Moncton, N. B., Jan. 17.—As candidates in the election of two members of the I. C. R. provident fund board, which brings ice cold water from the Rocky Mountains right to the city. It is proposed to construct these dams at sites varying in distance from Calgary of thirty-two to thirty-nine miles. The water would then be conveyed to Calgary by gravity pipe-lines, saving the necessity of doing any pumping at all and largely reducing the cost of operation.

WEATHER BULLETIN

Synopsis.—The low area which was over Ontario yesterday has been absorbed by an important storm off the Atlantic Coast and a pronounced high area with low temperature is now spreading southward over the Great Lakes. Very stormy weather is indicated for both Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

Maritime.—Strong winds and gales from northeast and north, local snow falls; Sunday, northerly winds and turning colder.

Anxious About Strathcona Alarming Symptoms Today in Illness of Venerable High Commissioner

London, Jan. 17.—The following announcement was made to the Canadian Press at 28 Grosvenor Square this morning: "Lord Strathcona is suffering great prostration with threatening heart failure following on a short catarrhal illness. His condition gives rise to grave anxiety." The Canadian Press understands that alarming symptoms manifested themselves at an early hour today. Sir Thomas Barlow is in attendance. Lord Strathcona has shown increasing feebleness since the death of his wife.

CASKS OF RUM FROM COBEQUID WASHED ASHORE

Westport Captain Located Wrecked Steamer Himself — Off of Halifax

Yarmouth, N. S., Jan. 17.—The customs officers recovered ten casks of rum yesterday, cast up on the shore at several points. The Westport III, when she left Westport, on Wednesday afternoon for Halifax, had not learned of the Cobequid's position, and she located her after making an independent search. Captain G. M. Hicks and W. C. Kenny of the Cobequid, left this morning for Halifax. They expressed themselves extremely grateful for all that has been done for them by the people of Yarmouth. They also referred again to the excellent work of Captains McKinnon, Mr. Allison and Mr. Gallant also left for Halifax. Four of the sailors are still in the hospital.

NAVAL CHANCELLORSHIP FOR GERMANY IS REPORTED BUT IT MAY BE ONLY TALK

Berlin, Jan. 17.—The Vossische Zeitung says that circumstantial reports, current in the international quarters, are that Germany is on the verge of a "naval chancellorship" under Admiral Von Tirpitz. It is asserted that Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg has resigned, and that foreign secretary Von Jagow and the latter's under secretary, Zimmermann, will leave office at the same time with him.

Canadian Divorce Courts.

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—Each of the maritime provinces and British Columbia now have divorce courts. The principal objection to institute divorce courts in the other provinces comes from Quebec. ONLY FEAR IS THAT JAPS MAY BLOCK IT

Powers Considering Agreement Re Pacific Ocean

HELP IN FAR EAST TROUBLES

Idea of Dutch Statesman Finds Favor But Obstacle is Difficulty of Getting United States and Japan Together

(Canadian Press.) Berlin, Jan. 17.—Germany, England, the United States, Japan, France and Holland, are sounding each other with a view to a mutual guarantee of the status quo in the Far East and Pacific ocean. Since the close of the Russo-Japanese war, Holland has been uneasy as to the future of the Dutch Indies, and has been seeking a means to insure the preservation of the status quo in the Far East, as she realizes the impossibility of building a sufficient naval establishment to defend her possessions in the Indies.

NOT BUSINESS LIKE, HE SAYS

Re-organization of Montreal's Administration of Finances Will Be Demanded

(Canadian Press.) Montreal, Jan. 17.—A complete re-organization of the financial administration of the city, which will lead to a reduction of the number of departments and an elimination of many of the highly paid unnecessary positions which are costing the city hundreds of thousands of dollars in salaries, will be demanded by Ald. Joseph Ward at a meeting of the city council. He will ask for an expert account to do the work.

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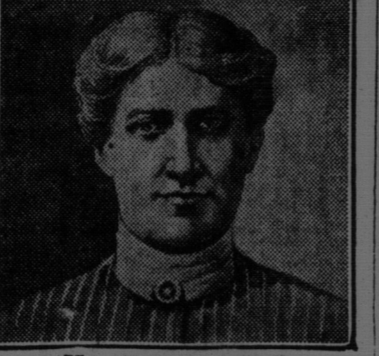

EIGHTY-FIVE IN PRE-VOCATIONAL SCHOOL IN CALGARY

First in Canada Has Been Given a Good Start—The Way The Idea is Worked Out

Calgary, Jan. 16—The opening of the school year has seen the beginning of a new epoch in education in Calgary through the inauguration of the pre-vocational school system which has commenced work with an enrolment of eighty-five pupils, thirty-nine boys and forty-six girls. This is the first pre-vocational school to be opened in any Canadian city.

The opening of this school is largely an experiment but it is hoped that its results, principal among which will be the lengthening of the educational period for all children and the consequent turning out of better boys and girls and a reduction of the present large number of children who are turned loose in the world after completing their elementary education without a knowledge of any calling or trade.

Early in the autumn of 1913 a circular was sent to the parents of all children in Grades six and seven of the Calgary public schools inquiring, among other things, as to the child's likes and dislikes in the way of studies, any apparent tendencies towards callings or avocations and the parents' intentions as to the child's future.

Particular attention was also paid to the question of whether or not it was the parents' desire to have the child proceed to the high school or university. These circulars were analyzed when returned and it was found that a large proportion of the pupils would leave school at the end of the elementary period and go to work. It was also found that a large number of pupils expressed a desire to enter mechanical occupations, a rather large number indicating their desire to enter offices and many girls suggesting household arts. As in other cities, it was found that the actual number going forward to higher education was very small compared to the total.

Armed with these facts a special officer of the Calgary School Board detailed to make inquiries presented a scheme for a course of work which would provide a different form of education for those children who proposed to leave school at the earliest legal age. A school centrally located was chosen and a new wing was allotted for the experiment which has just begun. The scheme involved the arrangements whereby half of each day would be spent in academic work and the other half in some form of industrial activity.

For the girls the industrial activities take the form of cooking, sewing, laundry work and general housewifery; for the boys advanced types of manual training in woodwork, simple metal work and a print-shop are provided. A third side of the work is that leading to office occupation. To that end shorthand will be introduced and much of the work in arithmetic and other subjects will have a bias towards commercial and other pursuits. Drawing will be emphasized throughout the course, as it is a means of education which is more being recognized as having enormous value as a measure of training and development.

One important fact is kept in mind and that is that no bar shall be placed in the way of a child who may wish to proceed to a higher school. In point of fact, although the Calgary scheme has

been designed largely for those who intend to leave school at the earliest possible age, yet it is expected to materially lengthen the school life of the children. It is anticipated that the more attractive nature of the work will keep them at school longer and so develop their capabilities by means of the industrial and manual side of the courses as to encourage them to go on into the higher schools.

Another interesting feature is that the Calgary school authorities are definitely committed to provide a large technical high school, offering broad and generous

BOOST FOR TAX REFORM

If all the members of the board of trade had realized the manner of man Mr. James R. Brown of New York is the board room would have been far too small to hold the crowd that would have been present at last night's meeting. It is safe to say that when Mr. Brown next appears here to discuss the question of taxation the largest audience will be none too large.

The second article on the use of school buildings as social centres appears in today's Times. Readers of this paper will do well to read carefully the series of articles, the first of which appeared in yesterday's paper, and another of which will appear on Monday, dealing with this important question.

One Captain R. D. Clift of Montreal is quoted as saying that the Bay of Fundy is most dangerous water, and ocean liners run great risks in coming to St. John compared with going to Halifax. No doubt Hon. J. D. Hazen will take advantage of the first opportunity to tell parliament and the country that this alleged captain either does not know what he is talking about or is indulging in gratuitous slander.

Mr. James R. Brown told the board of trade last evening that a city, has no more right to hold land out of use than a private individual. It has been argued that the city of St. John should hold land as a safeguard against the land speculators, but Mr. Brown declares that a proper land tax is a sufficient safeguard and that the moment there is a demand for land for improvement purposes it should be made available.

RIFLE MATCH GROWS OUT OF ARGUMENT BY HON. SAM AND COLONEL FARQUHAR

There will be a competition next summer between a team of thirty men from the Coldstream Guards in London, of which Col. Farquhar is the head. Each team will shoot at its own range and the results will be exchanged by cable.

The first match will be at the ordinary bull's eye targets of 200, 300 and 600 yards; the second will be at the same ranges at a field service target and the third will be shot off in each case at a disappearing target.

The winner in each case Col. Hughes or Col. Farquhar, will be decorated with a silk hat.

The Canadian team will consist of fifteen men from the Governor-General's Foot Guards and fifteen from the 43rd Regiment both of Ottawa.

A large number attended the reception held last evening in Calvin Presbyterian church when Rev. F. W. Thompson was welcomed as the new pastor. Among the other ministers present to meet him were Rev. Gordon Ritchie, Rev. Dr. Patterson, Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, Rev. J. J. McCaskill and Rev. R. H. Slaver of Harcourt.

USE THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS AS SOCIAL CENTRES

Some Information For St. John People Concerning This Great Movement and Its Results

II. The high water mark in state legislation with regard to social centres has been reached in Wisconsin, where in 1910 a law was enacted which requires all school boards to open the school-houses for neighborhood civic club meetings upon the demand of the people. The sections relating especially to the work are as follows:—

"Section 2.—Where the citizens of any community are organized into a non-partisan, non-sectarian, non-exclusive association for the presentation and discussion of public questions, the school board or other body having charge of the school houses or other public properties which are capable of being used as meeting places for such organization, light, heat and janitor service, where necessary, and shall make such other provisions as may be necessary for the free and convenient use of such building or grounds, by such organization for weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly gatherings at such times as the citizens' organization shall request or designate.

"Section 3.—The school board or other board having charge of the school houses or other public properties, may provide for the free and gratuitous use of the school houses or other public properties under their charge for such other civic, social and recreational activities, as in their opinion do not interfere with the prime use of the buildings or properties."

In an address delivered in 1911, Clarence A. Perry, chief of the Bureau of Investigation of the Wider Use of the School Plant, said that up to that year twelve other states besides Wisconsin had prepared laws authorizing the appointment of recreation commissions, or authorizing school boards to expend funds for recreation and social centre purposes. In several American cities school buildings are used as polling places. Mr. Perry mentioned Wisconsin, Mass., Grand Rapids, Mich.; Madison, Wis.; Milwaukee and Salt Lake City. In Milwaukee the city makes an annual saving of \$7,000 by using the school houses as polling places. In at least eleven American cities in 1911, and there were probably others and certainly many since then, social centres were maintained in school buildings supported by municipal funds; while in as many other cities social centre work had begun through co-operation between the citizens and the school board. In many cities the beginnings of recreational work in school buildings consisted in throwing open the assembly room or class room, or both, on certain evenings of the week. In more than a hundred cities in 1911 lectures and entertainments were held in school buildings, while in very many others parents' and teachers' organizations, improvement associations and similar bodies made the school house a meeting place.

Mr. Justice Hughes, who was a few years ago the reform governor of the state of New York, referring to the social centre movement in school buildings, has said:—

"I am more interested in what you are doing than in anything else in the world. You are buttressing the foundations of democracy."

COLONEL McLEAN AND JAMES REID WOULD LOSE SEATS

An Ottawa Report on Re-distribution in New Brunswick

The Ottawa correspondent of The Moncton Mail, has the following of interest: "It is understood that the New Brunswick Conservatives have practically agreed upon the redistribution of parliamentary seats for that province. County lines will not be disturbed, but Albert county will be joined to Westmorland, Victoria to Carleton, Restigouche to Madawaska and Sunbury to York, while Kings and Queens will be united. The net result will be to eliminate two of the sitting Liberal members namely, James Reid, of Restigouche, and Colonel H. H. McLean, of Queens and Sunbury.

EX-SOLDIER AND NAVY MAN MAKES COMPLAINT OF UNFAIR TREATMENT

Thomas Reynolds, who describes himself as a former soldier and navy man with a distinguished record during his active service, appeared at the Times office this morning with a complaint of unfair treatment by an officer at St. John's, Quebec. Reynolds displayed a row of medal ribbons on his vest, but said that the one he valued most highly, that representing the Victoria Cross, had been stripped from his breast by a private soldier acting on the orders of the officer of the dragons at St. John's.

He said that the officer had examined his papers, including originals of some and copies of others, which he carried with him, but had declared that he was not the man described in the papers. Not only were his decorations taken from him, Reynolds says, but he was threatened with a ducking in the house trough. He says that he intends to bring the matter to the attention of the authorities at Ottawa and secure the restoration of his ribbon.

Regarding his career in the Imperial service Reynolds says that he served through the Afghanistan campaign in 1879 and 1880 in the 9th Lancers, then secured his discharge and entered the navy to be with his brother. In 1882 he was at the bombardment of Alexandria under Lord Roberts and in 1889 he assisted in the relief of Ladysmith, being then a first class petty officer of H. M. S. Powerful. It was here that, he says, he won the Victoria Cross. He was discharged in England in 1900, and came to Canada in 1902 and worked in the naval dock yards in Halifax until they were closed. He says that all his medals, including the Victoria Cross, are in the possession of his wife for safe-keeping, but asserts that his record is known in Ottawa and by many of the South African veterans in St. John and elsewhere whom he met during the Boer war.

In addition to the loss of his ribbon Reynolds also complains that the officer at St. John's took from him the sum of \$18 which had been raised by subscription among the men for him and returned the money to the donors.

REPORT SHOWS BANK IN FLOURISHING CONDITION

The Bank of Nova Scotia's eighty-second annual statement appears in this issue. Owing to changes in the form of statement made necessary by the recent revision of the Bank Act, comparisons with last year's figures cannot readily be made. However, it may be noted that the total assets have increased from \$71,279,299.95 to \$80,151,829.99 during the year. Liabilities to the public (deposits, notes outstanding, etc.) total \$69,996,486.97. The holdings of coin and legal tender amount to \$10,440,546.08. Notes of and cheques on other banks amount to \$7,985,468.07 and other readily available assets such as call loans, investments are held to the extent of \$20,746,796.20. So it can be seen that against the bank's total liabilities to the public it holds in cash 16 per cent., in quick assets 62 per cent. This is a very strong showing and should be viewed with satisfaction by the shareholders and depositors.

News and Personal Notes From The North End of The City

Owing to the poor condition of the ice in the Kennebec river many country residents who frequently come to the city with produce at this season of the year, do not find it so convenient to do so. The new building being erected by the Royal Bank of Canada in the North End is nearing completion and it is expected that the bank will move into its new quarters early in March. The building is of concrete and will present a fine appearance. Most of the workmen are now engaged on the inside, as the walls have been erected and the outside is about completed. The work is being done by John Ford.

Lively Discussion Of Single Tax System

James R. Brown Presents Its Claims and Answers Questions—Present System "Guess Work and Larceny"

The single tax, which, to quote the speaker's description of its subject, "rests on a sure foundation and natural justice, and is in harmony and keeping with the natural laws of economics, and is the one honest, simple, straight, plain way of raising public revenues," was explained, enlarged upon and strongly advocated in an address given before the board of trade by James R. Brown, of New York, a member of the Tax Reform Club, last evening. The speaker based his arguments on the fundamental principles that land value is public value, belonging to society, and that wealth produced by a man's labor is his own exclusive property against all violation, contending that, therefore, the product of labor is taxed without any color of justice, while unearned increment in land value alone is justly subject to taxation, being in itself the property of the community.

the property of the community to increase the revenue of private individuals. Specific Cases.

Mr. Brown then cited specific cases to illustrate how the single tax would pay the whole budget of cities.

In New Glasgow, with a population of 5,000, a yearly budget of \$60,000, the city is spread over four square miles, or 2,560 acres, which would give \$2,380 to 29 feet by 100 feet. If these were taxed on an average of \$2 a lot, a maximum high tax being assessed at a central point of the city, and the amount of tax diminishing as the property recedes from the centre of the city, all other taxes could be abolished and an income of \$68,500 would be obtained.

Similarly for Sydney, where capital will be more productive in a city larger, by assessing lots of the same size at an average of \$8, the city's budget of \$109,000 would be more than paid, the population being 20,000, the area 3,730 acres, containing 46,480 lots.

In Pictou, a town of 3,600 population and acreage 1,920, an assessment of \$150 a lot would suffice to pay the budget of \$30,000, with \$7,440 added.

"AS YOU LIKE IT" IS CHARMINGLY GIVEN BY MARGARET ANGLIN

Shakespeare Comedy Delightfully Presented at His Majesty's Theatre in Montreal

The Montreal Mail has the following of interest here:—"As you like it" was never presented more sympathetically in Montreal than it was last night. Margaret Anglin played the comedy at His Majesty's theatre to mere handfuls of people, but the production did not suffer because the audience did not suffer because the audience was slender. One may say, faithfully say, that the presentation was in accord with the best traditions, and yet it carried a touch of personality throughout.

Miss Anglin deserves much credit for her courage in engaging in a Shakespearean revival these days when they say the bard of Avon is out of fashion, but more than that, she deserves credit for presenting a sympathetic interpretation coupled with the best examples of modern stage art.

Her Art Not Exclusive

Miss Anglin's art is evidently not exclusive. To play Viola one night and Rosalind the next may strike many people as being a comparatively easy task, but the slightest consideration of the two roles will convince anybody that the case lies with the imagination of the audience rather than will the player.

Miss Anglin's art to put the point more concisely, is an art, which neither limits itself to any personal style nor an art, which lends itself readily to identification. She identifies herself with the part she is playing. She is not only willing but anxious to sink her personality. There is never at any period, the slightest suggestion that Margaret Anglin, as Viola, or as Rosamond, desires her audience to recognize her as Margaret Anglin, the actress, or as Viola, who played the leading female role the night before.

Rosalind Is Human

Her Rosalind is, primarily, intensely human. She neither emphasizes its feminine features nor attracts undue attention to the duplicity of the role. She does succeed, however, in conveying to her audience a very definite and very intelligent suggestion of the girl who, having adopted male attire for convenience sake—to say no more—neither so far forgets her sex as to attempt a deliberate masquerade nor degrades it to the status of glorifying in her temporary masculine activities.

In a word, her Rosalind possesses all the qualities that one anticipates in so glorious a creature. Her Rosalind also manifests all the artifices one readily forgives in the Rosalind of the play. We cannot have her all the time, everything that we desire. We can realize, and she allows us to realize, that her Rosalind is in the ultimate consideration, essentially feminine, essentially human, and delightfully womanly.
