Daily Hints For the Cook

VEAL FRITTERS.

One-half cup molasses, 2 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon of allspice, 1 teaspoon of soda, flour enough to make it as stiff as for cake. Steam 1 hour. Serve with custard sauce. It does not call for any butter or lard.

BANANA SAUCE.

Yolks of 2 eggs beaten to a cream, with 1/2 cup of sugar, then mash 2 medium-sized bananas and beat into egg. Beat whites of 2 eggs very stiff and add to banana. This is very nice served with cottage pudding.

London, Nov. 22.—"Every one at Oxford is glad to see," says the "Field," "how thoroughly the Prince of Wales is enjoying the life of an ordinary undergraduate, and entering into so many different forms of sport. He rides regularly, generally in the company of Major Cadogan, and that of other undergraduates; in Nanchuan Park, and no doubt it will not be long before he is seen, like his father and his grandfather, in the hunting field; but for the present his position seems so fully occupied that he may postpone a close acquaintance with hunting until a somewhat later date.

SERIOUS FOR THE TAXI MEN

London, Nov. 22.—When the price of petrol is increased by ten cents a gallon in February next, the taxi-cab industry of London will be faced with ruin, unless some arrangement can be made to the cab proprietors say that they cannot bear the additional cost; the drivers say it is as much as they can do to earn a living now, and the home office regulations will not allow the fares to be raised. There are two alternatives to overcome the crisis. TRAGEDY OF THE WAR

Bulgarian Woman Shot for Betraying Army Secrets to Turkish Officer She Loved

Paris, Nov. 22.—A tragedy in which a Bulgarian woman's love led her to betray her country and brought upon her self retribution is told in the "Petit Parisien." According to the special correspondent of that journal at Sofia, a woman of high standing in that capital, wife of a Bulgarian staff officer, was found guilty of betraying the Bulgarian mobilization plans to the Turks and was shot.

A few years ago when she was still a young girl she fell in love with a dashing young officer attached to the Turkish legation at Sofia. Her parents, however, would not bear to their marriage, and when the young officer was recalled to Constantinople, the girl reluctantly married a Bulgarian officer. Some time later the Turkish officer returned to Sofia charged with a special mission, and his friendship was renewed between the two. Finally, it is asserted, the Turk asked her to run away with him. "I have been ordered by my superiors," he said, "to obtain the Bulgarian mobilization plans. If I do not succeed I shall be relegated to some distant command in Asia Minor and we shall have no chance of seeing one another."

The woman pointed out that they were both too poor to think of eloping, and told him to be patient. A few days later she handed him a bundle of documents containing the Bulgarian army war plans. She had taken them from her husband's desk and told the Turkish officer to photograph them and to give the originals back to her.

When the war broke out the Turkish officer was captured in one of the first engagements and papers were found on him, revealing the whole affair. He was tried by court-martial and shot. The young Bulgarian woman, though the wife of an officer, was not spared, and having been found guilty by a special court at Sofia was also shot.

Her husband, determined to wipe out the dishonor on his name, was one of the first in the storming line at Kirk Killiss and fell riddled with Turkish bullets.

THE CITY COUNCIL

Reference was made yesterday's issue of the Times to the need of better building laws and a better system of inspection of plans of new buildings. In the same issue appeared the very gratifying statement that the commissioner of public safety has been giving this matter most careful consideration, and will shortly present a policy of radical changes so long needed. This matter of the building laws and inspection furnishes another illustration of the unsatisfactory condition of affairs which had come to exist under the old city council system. It is not alone in the public safety department that conditions have been found which gave the strongest evidence of poor system and lax methods of administration. A great deal of the time of the new city council has necessarily been given up during its first year in office to the study of conditions and to the application of better methods in dealing with civic affairs. The citizens may fairly expect that when the commissioners have got their work well in hand and have improved the system where that is necessary they will be able to make even a better record than they have done up to the present time. The application of business principles to city affairs has come at an opportune time. The commissioners are among the bestest men in the city, but they have the satisfaction of knowing that their efforts to improve the city administration are appreciated by the people.

ASSESSMENT LAWS

The Toronto News is not in favor of the immediate adoption of the single tax system, but holds that "land should be a larger proportion of the burden of taxation, and the improvement tax should not be graduated so as to encourage the development of unproductive land property." The News holds that two kinds of taxation are sufficient for any city. It would make the first a land tax and the second an income tax on all whose income exceeds \$1,000 a year. The conditions in Toronto as described by the News are very like those which exist in St. John. It says:—

"The trouble in Toronto is that the system is so cumbersome that it can be enforced only in part. Many wealthy men are not paying their share of the cost of local government. Many young men, earning good salaries and evading taxation altogether. Other people, chiefly married men of small means, have to bear the burdens which these classes evade. The system is so complicated that it cannot be enforced with any degree of thoroughness or fairness. It would take an army of detectives to locate every person who should pay taxes, and an equally large army of expert valuers would be needed to assess every lot, every building, every alteration and every store and office in the city."

The need of simplification of the system of taxation is the great need of the cities of eastern Canada. The west appears to have successfully solved the problem, and it can only be a question of time when the western idea prevails in the east.

ONTARIO AND LOCAL OPTION

Nearly 80 municipalities in Ontario will vote on local option in January. More than 200 licenses are involved in the contest. One city, 20 towns, 23 villages and 31 townships are included in the list. In only two cases is an attempt being made to repeal the act. The city in which there will be a contest is Peterboro. Three years ago its people declared in favor of local option by a majority of 110, but this was 200 votes short of the three-fifths required. This year the fight is being renewed. The story of attempts made to repeal the law during the last four years is interesting. In 1909 there were 97 municipalities in which repeal contests were possible. Repeal was sought in 29 of them, but 27 remained in the local option column. In 1910 there were 111 places where repeal contests could have been held, but in only 12 was repeal sought, and in only two of these was it gained. Last year there might have been 124 contests for repeal but there were only three, and in each case the advocates of the bars were defeated. This year there were 126 opportunities for repeal. It was tried in 15 of these and defeated in every one. Regarding the growth of temperance sentiment in Ontario during the last year the Montreal Witness says:—

"Upon the one hand we have the anti-temperance propositions of the government and Sir James Whitney's statement to the recent temperance convention. He said: "I will be glad on any other occasion to help along even a little the cause you have at heart. The public man who is unwilling to do all in his power to suppress the evils of the liquor traffic is unworthy of any British community." Upon the other we have Mr. Rowell, his British 'bat' policy and his declaration of war. The rising tide of public sentiment has reached the conclusion that the open bar in this province is a public nuisance, a social menace, prejudicial alike to the home, to the church and to the state, and that this being so the time has come when the bar should be abolished."

There are 528 municipalities in Ontario, and in 463 of these no liquor license is granted.

JAIL AND PRISON FARM

The Victoria Colonist prints a picture with interior plans of a new provincial jail to be erected four miles outside of Victoria, to replace the existing prison in that city. The plans show that the new structure will carry out modern ideas in relation to the care of prisoners. Those held for trial will be kept separate from those serving terms of imprisonment, and beginning in crime will be separated from the hardened criminal. There will also be connected with the institution a prison farm of 30 acres. The building will not present the appearance of an ordinary jail, but will be a handsome structure of reinforced concrete with an exterior of pressed brick with terra cotta trimmings. It will be large enough to accommodate 140 prisoners, and so arranged that 40 more could be provided for without overtaxing the institution. Another wing could easily be added when required. There will be connected with this prison a hospital section, with laboratory and operating room and accommodation for nurses. As far as possible all the work connected with the establishment, such as laundry work, carpenter and repair work, etc., will be provided for. The Colonist gives Hon. W. J. Bowser, who is a native of New Brunswick, credit for planning the prison farm at this place as well as that recently opened in connection with a prison at Burnaby.

Joseph Pulitzer of the New York World left a fortune of more than \$18,000,000. That is quite too much, even for a newspaper man.

The Gardens Commission of Halifax is asking the city council to secure, for playground purposes, a lot of land which, with the buildings on it, would cost about \$20,000.

Those who have not recently paid a visit to West St. John and the site of the new grain elevator have no idea of the remarkable change that has been made in the appearance of the place, for the great activity now prevailing about that erstwhile quiet straggling beach.

Today sees the formal opening of the Winter Port season at St. John. It is expected that last year's record, when the exports were valued at about \$35,000,000, will be greatly exceeded this season. There will be many more steamship sailings and an increase is expected in both passenger and freight business.

It is intimated from Ottawa that Mr. Borden may adopt the Laurier policy of establishing Canadian shipyards. This has been made fairly clear to the Premier during the last few months that whatever may be done in the matter of an emergency contribution there must be a Canadian navy, built and manned in Canada.

The Montreal Gazette says:—"The Protestant Board of School Commissioners reports a great increase in attendance at the night classes in the public schools. These schools after knowledge are largely boys who work during the day. The future Van Hornes and Shakespeares and Carnegies of Montreal are preparing themselves for their coming tasks. They are ambitious young citizens of an industrial city."

This biting paragraph is from the Toronto World:—"There are 3,000 people dying of consumption in Ontario every year. A number of gentlemen are getting a million dollars together as a memorial to King 2d, ward to assist in stamping out this plague. Up to date there has only been discovered one man who lifts his voice against the effort. He will be thought about at 3,000 funerals next year."

The armistice between the Turks and the Balkan allies was exceedingly brief. The latter presented their terms and the Turks promptly refused to consider them. Some light is thrown in this morning's despatches upon the savage character of this war. All of the savagery is not on the side of the Turk. There have been cruel massacres of Albanians and Turks by Serbians and Bulgarians. There does not seem to be any doubt, however, of the final result. The Turk is beaten.

Mr. Borden is asked to tell Parliament and the country whether he asked Mr. Lavergne to be a member of his cabinet. Mr. Lavergne has said that the request was made and that he declined, although he did assist in forming the Borden cabinet. There appears to be in a portion of the Conservative press a disposition at the present time to belittle the Nationalists. This is a fine illustration of the bosom friends of Mr. Borden till he got into power.

GLORY AND FLAG TALK LAUGHING STOCK OF WORLD

So Declares Noted Australian M. P. Now In Montreal

PLATITUDEOUS IMPERIALISM

Mr. Cave-Brown Thinks There Is Too Much Jingoism Displayed in Canada—He Gives Interesting Interview

(Montreal Herald)

An Australian view point on Imperialism was set forth in a Herald representative at the Windsor last night in a most striking manner. Hon. Robert Cave-Brown, a Melbourne representative in the parliament of the Commonwealth, is in Montreal on route home from a consultation with the Imperial authorities on Imperial trade matters affecting Australia.

"Australia recently has witnessed a decided revulsion of feeling against what we term 'jingoism' and 'imperialism,'" said Mr. Cave-Brown. "You know the amount of glory and flag talk which has been going on during the past decade throughout the Empire is the laughing stock of the civilized world. I am a plain-spoken man and may be guilty of putting matters baldly but I must say that it is about time the jingoes and so-called nationalists of both Canada and Australia ceased their tomfoolery."

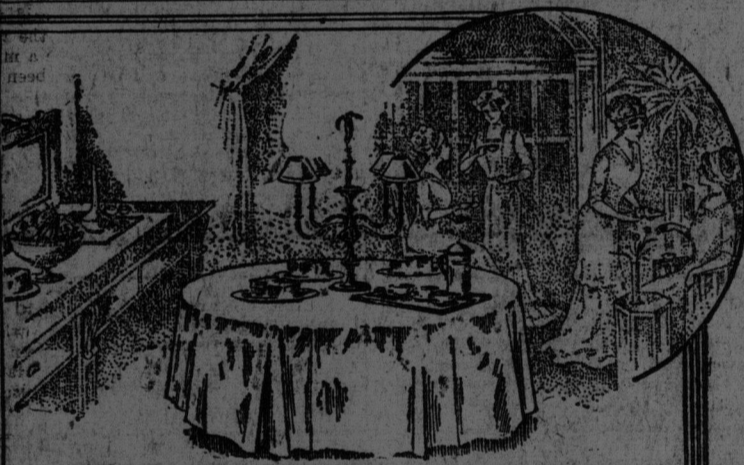

IN PARLIAMENT

Liberals Present Some Awkward Questions To Government

HINT AT NAVY MATTERS

Borden May Take Laurier Policy of Shipbuilding at St. John or Halifax—New Senators in Their Places

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—More than three-score of inquiries of the ministry by private members on matters of both provincial and national interest are already on the agenda paper of the commonsense. The inquisitiveness of the members covers a large range of subjects and some bristle with embarrassment for the government.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux will ask Premier Borden for a statement as to the result of Armand Lavergne's recent declaration that he was offered a place in the cabinet, and that he had much to wish the choice of Mr. Borden's Quebec ministers.

Mr. Lemieux also wants to know as to the truth of Mr. Lavergne's statement that the premier gave Mr. Monk assurance, when the cabinet was formed, that a placet would be taken before any kind of contribution to the British navy should be decided on.

Mr. Lemieux further inquires as to the authority which Hon. Col. Sam Hughes had for declaring at Vancouver last August that Germany has to be taught a lesson and that Canada must join with Great Britain to help teach that lesson.

Other queries from the ex-postmaster-general concern the extent to which the letter and the latter's intention with regard to a parcels post system.

Hon. Charles Murphy asks what the government is going to do about the Georgian Bay canal this session, and how many special commissions have been appointed, and how much money has been paid there since the present government assumed office.

Mr. Sinclair, of Gypsum, asks information as to new private cars purchased for the ministers and as to the delay in carrying out of the construction of promised branch lines of the Intercolonial.

There are also numerous questions to disbursements, appointments, etc., in various constituencies.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson has given notice of a resolution declaring that in view of the general feeling throughout Canada that the present rate of taxation is too high, the government should make a thorough investigation of the whole question of taxation, covering the period of the past ten years, with a view to remedying conditions, now complained of.

The government's naval proposals will probably not be introduced into the house until the week after next, as it is expected that the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne will occupy fully all of next week.

In addition to the main features of the emergency proposals as announced, the government is endeavoring to arrange with one or other of the big English shipping companies to establish at Halifax, St. John or some other maritime port a dockyard and shipbuilding plant, such as the one which the admiralty might expend in the construction of warships some of the Royal Canadian Navy. No definite agreement has yet been reached with any company for such works as being made to get something tangible on which to bolster up the government's naval program.

It is understood that the emergency contribution will be a vote of \$50,000,000 as a cash contribution to the construction of naval vessels in addition to the regular admiralty programme. There is to be a provision that if Canada at any time establishes a navy of her own the shipyard is to be handed to the Canadian fleet.

After the opening of the house, the introduction of new members took place. The Liberals set up a hearty cheer when P. J. Carlin was introduced by Sir Wilfrid as victor in Rishdiele.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—(Special)—Hon. Frank Cochrane has given notice of an amendment to the government railways employees' pension fund act, by providing that the board administering the fund may pay out of such fund the whole or any portion of the contribution thereto of any employee discharged for parliamentary since April 1, 1907.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The senate opened its session with a short sitting and adjourned until Tuesday, when the debate on the address of his royal highness will be commenced. His royal highness the duke of Kent attended at the senate chamber at 3 o'clock, and the commons having been summoned, the speech from the throne was delivered.

The following senators were introduced, took the oath of office and assumed their seats in the senate: Senator Nathaniel Curry, Amherst (N. S.); Senator William Dennis, Halifax (N. S.); Senator George Gordon, Nipissing; Senator Harry Corby, Belleville.

A communication was read from the clerk of the senate stating that Senator Sullivan, of Kingston, had not been in attendance at the senate for the last two sessions. The matter was referred to the committee on orders and customs, comprising the whole senate, which was called to meet on Tuesday at 2:45 p. m.

Senator G. W. Ross gave notice of a motion for the production of correspondence between the British and Canadian governments on the Panama canal.

Senator Belmont introduced a bill respecting the pollution of navigable waters. The Liberals of the senate have chosen Senator Hewitt Bostock to lead them in succession to Sir Richard Cartwright, with Raoul Dandurand as first lieutenant.

It is believed that there will be chosen a fisheries board of an advisory character to aid in the protection of the fisheries along the coast of Canada. The board would be composed of officials of the government and citizens representing those engaged in the fishing industry.

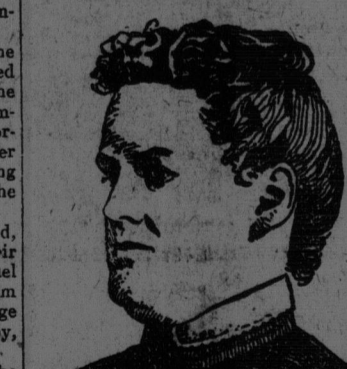

WILL NOT MEET. Owing to the absence of G. H. Allen the meeting of the N. B. Editor-writers to have been held this evening in the board of trade building has been cancelled.

LABORERS' PAYROLL. The fortnightly payroll for laborers disbursed at City Hall today was made up as follows: Ferry, \$147.63; water and sewerage, \$174.25; public works, \$1,793.85; total, \$3,022.74.

BURIED TODAY. The funeral of Mrs. Julia C. Fowle was held this morning from her late home in Bridge street to St. Peter's church where requiem mass was solemnized at nine o'clock by Rev. Father Grogan, C. S. S. R. Relatives acted as pallbearers. Interment was made in the new Catholic cemetery.

MILLS TO CLOSE. The mills about North End are soon to close their season. While some will continue to save for some time, it is expected that the majority will be down next week. Miller & Co. will in Great Street close today.

NONE FROM HERE. It is not expected that there will be any delegates from St. John at the convention of those interested in the Student Volunteer Movement to open in Charlottetown this evening. Those from the Y. M. C. A. will attend. The movement is more for college workers.

HORSE FRIGHTENED. A horse attached to a wagon owned by George Chamberlain took fright in Mill street and bolted. The animal turned in to the sidewalk and one of his hoofs went through a window in the store of Harrison & Co. The incident caused some little excitement.

IS CAPTAIN NOW. Frank L. Hurley, of 77 Brittain street, is receiving congratulations on passing a successful examination for captain's papers as steam tug master. He received his certificate yesterday. Captain Hurley for some time has been engaged as mate in the local dredging operations. He has two good wives, many friends in his step ahead.

BOTTLING PLANT BURNED. C. G. Armstrong, Well Known Here, Suffers Loss in Chelmsford, Mass.

Many friends of C. G. Armstrong in St. John and Kings county will be sorry to learn that the bottling plant of the Chelmsford Spring Company, near the railroad station in Chelmsford Centre, Mass., was burned on last Wednesday morning. The plant is owned by Mr. Armstrong and a large number of men were employed. The fire started in the boiler room and spread so rapidly that there was little opportunity to save much of the contents. The auto trucks and some of the other furniture were saved.

Some of the fire apparatus and a number of Lowell firemen responded to call from Chelmsford, and assisted in preventing the spread of the fire in adjoining property. It is reported that the loss is \$20,000 with \$15,000 insurance. Mr. Armstrong was manager of the Sussex Mineral Springs Co., and it is believed is still interested in it.

THE FISH MARKET. Supplies were light on the local fish market this week. Few arrivals were received and except for the Westport coming in late last night with a fair shipment of cod, haddock and some chicken halibut, receipts were below the average, although the demand today was well up to the mark. There is a good run of smelt chiefly along the harbor and river front. Although the season for lobsters was opened a little earlier than last year, receipts thus far have been large and the stock has been of good quality and it is generally expected that the season will prove encouraging.

A period of activity is being felt with the local wholesale market for salt fish and quotations are firm. Good quality medium cod is rated at \$2.25 while the demand for small cod, being light causes a range of from \$2.25 to \$2.50 according to quality. Dealers throughout the maritime provinces are seeking to secure supplies from fishermen along the shore to replace their stocks in large cod, as Lunenburg fisheries are holding for higher prices.

TODAY IN THE COURTS. In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Mary A. Pope, widow, Theophilus Marshall, of St. John, moulder, the executor, filed his accounts with a petition for passing them and for order for distribution. A citation was issued returnable on Monday, December 23 at 11 a.m. Francis Kerr is proctor.

The court took up the matter of the estate of Edson Clayton DeWare, tugboat captain. He died intestate on November 4, 1912. His father and mother died before him, and he died without issue. He did not leave any brothers or sister or descendants of brothers or sisters. His mother was Melissa, daughter of William Straight by his first wife, Jane (Moore). She married Thomas DeWare, William Straight, after his first wife's death, married Elizabeth DeWare, a sister of Thomas, Elizabeth and her husband, William Straight had three children, William E. of St. John; James G., of McDonald's Corner, Queens county, and Albert Straight, of the same place. These three may be called uncles by the half blood of the deceased, and also cousins. Besides these three there are other relatives, but more remote than the uncles, being the children of Edward DeWare; the children of Peter DeWare; the children of William DeWare, and the children of Jane DeWare, married Samuel Appleton, being some twenty-four in number. On petition of William E. Straight he was appointed administrator. There is no real estate personal estate \$200. Besides \$500 life insurance. Inches & Hazen are proctors.

CHARGES AGAINST POLICE MAGISTRATE; INQUIRY NEXT WEEK

Judge Armstrong Appointed To Conduct Investigation—It Will Be Public

J. R. Armstrong, K. C., has been appointed a commissioner to investigate the charges against Police Magistrate Ritchie and will open his investigation on Tuesday morning at eleven o'clock in the Probate Court room. J. A. Barry will appear for the complainants. The charges are that Peter Leslie paid a deposit of \$100 into the court and when the case was dropped for lack of evidence he did not get his money back; also that \$100 given by Barry, for payment of a fine was not paid into the provincial treasury until after the trial had been completed.

HAVE MADE PRACTICALLY NEW BUILDING OF IT

The building in Charlotte street recently occupied by Fraser, Fraser & Company as their dry goods department and previously by R. Strain & Co., has been entirely remodelled and repaired, the work practically amounting to the construction of a new building. The structure was gutted by fire earlier in the year and since then work has been busy rebuilding it.

The main part of the building has been greatly improved and a three-story addition forty feet in length has been added in the rear. The building has made it possible to do away with pillars and supports that giving three large and well lighted floors entirely clear of obstructions. The basement has also been excavated, and it will again be occupied early in December. The building will be used by Fraser, Fraser & Co. for their men's clothing and furnishing business, the manufacturing or the wholesale department of the firm being moved to the new building and which it is completed the store will be one of the most up-to-date in the city.

HAD CONFERENCE WITH MAYOR AND COMMISSIONER SCHOFIELD

F. St. C. Hamilton, of the editorial staff of the Montreal Star, who is making a tour of the maritime provinces in furtherance of the Star's campaign to help the boom of the maritime provinces, had a conference this morning with Mayor Prink and Commissioner Schofield.

Mr. Hamilton's efforts at publicity were being made by the western provinces and asked the co-operation of the public and citizens generally, in the crusade the Star was now making through their weekly, the Family Herald. He also had an interview with H. C. Schofield, president of the board of trade, and invited the board to freely utilize the Star's London office as a distributing point which they had special literature about the province or city, which they wished to reach the British public, the London branch of the Star being now a recognized place for information on things Canadian. The visitor was given much valuable information as to the development and possibilities of new industries in and about St. John.

He was well known about the city and had a large circle of friends who will regret to hear of his death. For many years he conducted a retail liquor store in Brussels street.
