A convenient size for the vario-coupler primaries for receiving short wave broadcasting is 3½ inches with 70 turns on the stator or "L" and 25 turns on the rotor of the first vario-coupler. Coll "L3," the tickler coll, should have about 50 or 60 turns, while the secondary loading coil need have only about 35 turns. The secondary windings "L1" and "L2" are shunted by the variable condenser "C" which should have a capacity of about .0005 micro-farads. If vario-couplers of the 180 degree type are employed in this circuit very close adjustments are possible, a feature which is highly desirable in distinguishing between 360 and 400 meter broadcasting stations. In localities where the interference is not a serious problem it may be desirable to omit the first vario-coupler and connect the antenna circuit to the terminals of the coil "L2," thus converting the circuit into the standard single circuit regenerative type. In this case the coil "L2" should have about twice as many turns. A series condenser should be employed in the an-tenna circuit for close adjustment of that circuit.
