

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
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MINUTES

Twenty-fourth Annual Conference.

. What Ministers have Died during the year?

1. REV. JAMES CHEETHAM was born at Middleton, near Manchester, England, on the 28th July, 1811. His parents were adherents of the Episcopalian Church, but his maternal grandmother was a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Society, and even in childhood her godly life made a deep impression on his mind; the often longed to be like her. Notwithstanding these good desires, he continued to seek happiness amidst worldly pleasures till, in his twenty-second year, a Primitive Methodist minister visited his home; and invited hig to attend the week-night service. He did so, and that night became convinced of his lost condition as a sinner. He carnestly sought salvation, and received pardon threu th faith in c'hrist, while attending class meeting on the 29th of March, 1833. His heart being full of the love of God, he began at once to lead others to Christ. His parents, and nine brothers and sisters, were converted, also many of his neighbors were led to the Saviour through his exhortations and prayers.

After laboring in a local capacity for five years, he entered the itinerant ministry, in 1838. Manchester was his first station. Afterwards he was appointed to Newmills, Bradwell, Silsden, Douglas, Staleybridge, Bolton, Warrington, Rochale and Prestonbrook. While in the last-named circuit, after much deliberation and prayer, he withdrew from the itinerancy, the reasons which induced him to do so being fully justifiable to his own mind. Whether he was or was not right in this, must be left to the Great Judge, who will do right.

In October, 1856, he emigrated to Canada, settled in the then Peel and Wellesley Station, where he labored efficiently as a local preacher-and class leader. Not being satisfied with this comparatively limited sphere of usefulness, he again offered himself for the regular work of the ministry, and was accepted by the Conference of 1858, and stationed to Brantford and Paris. He afterwards labored in Hamilton, Portland, McGillivray and Woodstock stations.

On Sabbath, January 1870, as usual, he preached three times. Complained of great weariness that night, next morning was very ill, and was not able to do his ministerial work for some time. In June he finally broke down, and at the following Conference of 1871 was superannuated. In 1874 he got an idea that a warmer climete would suit his health better, and removed to Jacksonville. 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BRAMPI ETOBICO MALTON ALBION Florida, where he preached as health permitted, until the Fall of 1876, when it became evident his work was done, and he calmly waited the coming of the Master to take him home. An abscess, which had several times formed and broken outwardly, formed and broke inwardly, and his earthly journey was soon ended. Resting on the atoment, finding peace in Christ, and comfort from the presence of God in the Valley, on November 24th, 1876, he entered the Master's joy, and is forever blessed.

REV. ISAAC RYDER was born in the year 1804, in the county of Norfolk, England. Of the early part of his life little is known. While on duty as a soldier in India, he became a subject of saving grace. When his term in the army was finished he emigrated to Canada, settled in the City of Kingston, and united with the Wesleyan Church, but afterwards united with the Primitive Methodists, and entered the Christian Ministry in the year 1852, and for fourteen years labored earnestly, and with a measure of success. In the year 1865 he located near the Village of Linwood, in the Township of Wellesley, where he preached faithfully the Gospel of Christs Two weeks before he died he preached in Hawksville Church, with his usual ability. He was unwell only ten days; his complaint was heart disease. While ill he was visited by Rev. J. Walker, to whom he expressed confidence in the Saviour he had pointed others to.

On the morning that he passed away to the Eden shore he partook of a hearty breakfast, after which he was seized with a smothering sensatin. His wife saw that he was ill, and asked him if she might call their next neighbor, when he remarked, "He could do me no good." These were his last words; in about twenty minutes he passed away to be forever with the Lord.

(b) That a Minister shall not be eligible for Conference until he has been ordained three years.

(c) That a Minister shall not be eligible for General Committee Delegate, or member of the Stationing Committee until he has been ordained six years, with the understanding that if there be not a sufficient number of men of the above standing in any District, the next senior brother in that District shall be elected.

(d) That a Layman shall not be eligible to become a Member of Conference until he has been a member of the P. M. Church seven consecutive years.

(e) That no person shall be eligible to any of the afore-mentioned positions, except he be free from charge and complaint.

(f) That in view of the increased number of Delegates, and consequent increase of claims on the Conference Fund, no Delegate shall be entitled to any claim for expenses in travelling to Conference for the first twenty-five miles of the double journey.

2. GENERAL MISSIONARY AGENT.

(a) That a General Missionary Agent be appointed for three or four months in each year, his salary and expenses not to exceed two hundred and thirty dollars.

(b) The General Missionary Agent shall be under the direction of the General Missionary Committee, and report quarterly to that Committee.

(c) That the Missionary Committee be empowered to pay the salary and expenses of the General Missionary Agent at such times as they think best.

(d) That Brother Thomas Crompton be the General Missionary Agent.

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(a) The Salary of ordained unmarried ministers shall be for the first two years, \$300 per year; after that time, \$350 per year.

(b) That the salaries of widowers be the same as those of married ministers.

(c) That in future, every Probationary Preacher taken out by the Conference at the regular time, shall receive a full quarters' salary for each quarter of the year, and on his retirement from the ministry he shall be regarded as being paid up to the time of change, and is expected to supply the work up to that time.

(d) That all ministers who have been taken into the work by the Canadian Conference, prior to this present year of 1877, be considered as ensitled to half a quarter's salary when at the end of any year they retire from the work.

4. INVITATION SYSTEM.

That invitations from stations to ministers be sent from the May Quarterly Meetings of the respective stations, instead of their being sent from the February Quarterly Meetings, as heretofore; and invitations shall in no case be sent to probationers.

5. SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That Sabbath School Teachers and Superintendents be eligible to act as Chairmen of Sabbath School Teachers' Meetings.

5. CLASS MEETINGS.

That we memorialize all our members upon the importance of a faithful and constant adherence to the class meeting, regarding the class meeting as we do, as being one of the most vital means of grace for the ingathering, upbuilding, and strengthening of our church in Canada.

7. MINISTERIAL DEFICIENCY.

That Question 16 in the "Historical Account of the Station" be changed to read as follows :--

"Have you paid your Minister the Conference Salary in full ? if not, why ? and state the amount of your deficiency."

(b) Each preacher shall, on or before the 30th of June, report to the General Secretary what amount of salary he received between the last Quarterly Meeting of his station before Conference and the last Monday but one in June.

8. EXPLANATION OF RULE.

It is the opinion of the Conference that the Vice-delegate shall not take the place of his Principal Delegate, unless the Principal be permanently absent, except by vote of Conference.

2. That the Trustees of the Roblin Parsonage have permission to sell the parsonage, and that the President and Secretary be, and are hereby desired to sign the deed, and stamp it with the Conference Seal.

3. That we recommend the Conference to allow Markham Circuit to sell the site of Ebenezer Church, as they have purchased a better place.

4. That we recommend the Conference to allow the Queen Street Church to sell 20 feet of their parsonage property.

5. That we recommend the Conference to allow the Pickering Circuit to sell the Glen-Major Church, on the condition they put up a church at Balsam.

6. That the Brampton Circuit have permission to sell Hope Church, and the deed be signed by the President and Secretary, and stamped with the Conference Seal.

7. That the application of the Woodstock Station to re-convey the land on the 15th line of East Zorra, known as Providence, be granted.

25. What Reports are Received by the Conference?

1. REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

1st. That we have observed with pleasure and gratitude the progress which temperance principles have made during the past year throughout our country, as evinced by the passing in several of our most important counties of the by-law provided by the Dunkin Act.

2nd. That we deeply deplore the fact that some of our church officials are not total abstainers; and that we most respectfully and earnestly recommend, that for the sake of the cause of Christ, not only they, but also all our members, take a decided stand on the side of temperance.

3rd. That we recommend the agitation now in progress in our country on the subject of the complete legal prohibition of the liquor traffic to the favorable consideration of all our people, and reco as p cour and vide ing pass law.

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recommend them to use every consistent means to secure it as early as possible, believing it is the only effectual way of delivering our country from the fearful curse of intemperance.

4th. That we earnestly recommend our people to labor earnestly and energetically for the passing and enforcing of the by-law provided by the Dunkin Act in their respective municipalities, believing that it would not only check the traffic where the by-law is passed, but also hasten the passing of a general prohibitory liquor law.

5th. That we recommend the Conference to send a petition to the House of Commons for a prohibitory liquor law.

6th. That we acknowledge the reception of a communication from the Dominion Alliance for the Total Suppression of the Liquor Traffic, and we heartily endorse the principles on which that Alliance is founded; and that we commend their work to the encouragement and co-operation of our Ghurch.

2. Report of Sabbath School and Sabbath Observance Committee,

"That special attention be paid to the conversion of the young, and their preservation to the Church."

"That our Ministers and officials be kindly requested to establish Denominational Schools wherever possible, and as far as practicable, persons of religious experience be appointed as teachers."

And be it further Resolved:—That this Committe express its thankfulness to God for the marked improvement in the observance of the Sabbath which has taken place during the past few years, yet we deeply deplore that there still exists a large amount of Sabbath desceration, in view of which we make the following recommendations:

"That our ministers, officials and members, be earnestly requested to abstain from all worldly conversation on the Sabbath."

"That our members be kindly requested to abstain themselves, and, as much as possible, discountenance in others, the habit of social visiting on the Lord's Day; also, that they be more regular in their attendance upon the means of grace."

"It is within the knowledge of your Committee that a large number of interments are reserved for the Lord's Day; and we request that our ministers and members discourage all Sabbath funerals as much as possible."

CHRISTIAN JOURNAL.

Your Committee, having carefully examined the accounts of the Christian Journal, are gratified to find that there is a slight improvement in that fund, notwithstanding the financial depression that has prevailed throughout the country; but we are also of opinion that its financial condition might be greatly improved. We would therefore recommend:

1. That every minister make a prompt and determined effort to collect all outstanding subscriptions, as we find that there is \$2,092 77 due by subscribers, after making considerable allowance for bad debts.

2. That a statement of the Journal account be printed in the Minutes and sent to the August quarterly meeting of each station, with the request that they appoint one or two laymen to co-operate with the minister in charge in collecting the subscriptions, and report to the following District meeting. 9 pay sub

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3. That the Mission Agent be desired, when visiting a station, to pay attention to Christian Journal matters, such as getting in old subscriptions and in getting new subscribers.

BOOK ROOM.

The Report of the Book Room submitted to us received our careful examination, and we are pleased to note that its financial condition is materially improved, there being a small balance in its favour, and that its affairs have been carefully managed during the year.

It is also gratifying to your Committee to find the Relief Fund has a large balance in its favour, there being few claims on account of sickness, which is an occasion for thankfulness to Almighty God.

We regret to find that there is a decrease of Missionary Money, owing, we believe, to the depression of trade and the failure of the wheat crop.

CANADIAN CONFERENCE TO THE ENGLISH CONFERENCE.

Greeting:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN :- We address you with faithful memories of many past obligations to you for practical sympathy with us in the Master's work on these distant shores. Our Conference of this year has been one of much spiritual power and brotherly co-operation. While we have had difficulties common to all true progress in sacred things, and which have required the most careful and earnest attention; we have had no single expression of bitterness to disturb the current of Christian brotherhood that flows on among us.

The past year has been signalized by many revivals of considerable power in our Churches, so that, notwithstanding the serious drain upon our statistics by removals, occasioned in a large measure by the drifting state of the community in these times of commercial depression, we are still able to average and the second state of the community of the second state of the second state

cial depression, we are still able to report an increase of 384. The failure of the harvest last year in this country, and the general depression of trade, have had their natural effect upon the various funds of the Church, and many of the Brethren are suffering heavy deficiencies in their salaries, yet the prevailing spirit among us is to have faith in God, and struggle on.

The Montreal Mission is likely for some time to demand all the help we can afford it. But, with 4,000 English speaking people at the chief of Canadian ports, with a rapidly increasing population, the very metropolis of Popery on this continent, and only one Methodist community in the city to stand up by the side of the other Protestant Churches in the cause of truth, we believe there is an abundant opening for our people, and have recommended that immediate steps be taken to assist them in the erection of a Church, without which our missionary has all winds and tides against him in the struggle for success.

We were much benefitted by the visit of our beloved Father in Israel, Rev. George Lamb, to this country, last year. His kindly spirit, courteous bearing, and prudent advice, did much to cement the relationship between us and the Old Land, and diffuse the true Christian Brotherhood among us here. We trust that his life may long be spared to the Connexion.

We learned from Dr. S. Antliffe, who was our excellent representative last year, that the privilege was allowed us of sending an additional delegate to the British Conference, we have therefore sent, as our second representative, Rev. W. Herridge, Vice-President of the Canadian Conference, a bother who has travelled among us in this land twenty years; who has occupied our best stations, and is in high esteem among his brethren. We heartily commend him to your exception as a brother worthy of your esteem, and he will doubtless be able to give you any information you may desire respecting our work in Canada.

Our Brother, Rev. Walter Reid, is also on a visit to England, and should he visit your Conference, we can say that any kindness done to him we shall regard as done to ourselves.

We commend to your respectful consideration our Brother, Rev. George Clarke, who returns to the work in the Home Land. He leaves us on his own special request, and with the Conference's best wishes for his future welfare and success.

And now, dear Fathers and Brethren, praying that every promise of our covenant-keeping God may be abundantly fulfilled in you; that upon all your deliberation's there may come a rich baptism from on high, that the mantles of the dear departed ones, whose names we all venerate, may still rest upon you; that you may increase more and more in all that relates to substantial good, and when our works and wanderings are over, may we greet each other on that heavenly shore where there is no more sea and no more separaration. 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Annual Address.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CANADIAN PRIMITIVE METHODIST CONFERENCE TO THE SOCIETIES UNDER ITS CARE.

"Grace be to you, and peace, from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers; remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sight of God our Father; knowing, brethren beloved, your election of God. For our gospel came not unto you in word only, but also in prayer, and in the [foly Ghost, and in much assurance."

BELOVED,—Since we last addressed you in our pastoral lefter, another year has rolled its round, and produced its usual wear and tear in human and Church life. A number of our members have been removed from our militant ranks, and have gone to join the Church of the first-born who have passed to the land of peace beyond the flood.

In many of your households death has made a fearful blank. Your dear departed ones are not lost, they are only gone before, and will wait your arrival on the banks of the land of life. Two of our ministerial brethren have crossed the frontier of time, and passed to their heavenly home. Father's Ryder and Cheetham, who each in his own sphere rendered good service to the Church, and are now joining in the song of the redeemed before the throne. Beside these removed by death, many have thought it needful to change their residence: and some have located in sections of country in which we have no churches, and thus have ceased to be counted among us. But they are not all lost to Christ's Church; many have joined some other section of that Church, and still cleave to the Lord with purpose of heart. May the Father of Spirits abundantly bless them.

It is a matter for unfeigned thankfulness to the great Hond of the Church that he has blessed us with marked successin the salvation of sinners, resulting in the grand net increase of *three hundred* and eighty-four precious souls. 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tion eate Altogether it was decidedly the best Conference which had been held for years. For unanimity of purpose, prevelancy of the spirit of Christ, and dispatch of business, it has not been surpassed.

Great praise is due to the Rev. H. Harris and his excellent colleague, for the admirable arrangements they made for the accommodation of the delegates and visitors. The members in Aurora, and Laskay circuit in general, and also the members and friends of sister churches, vied with each other to give the Conference a right hearty thanks of the delegates.

We rejoice that though the financial returns of the stations do not show that healthy condition necessary to meet their domestic wants—doubtless owing in a great measure to the failure of crops and the general financial depression—yet there is a pleasing improvement in the temporalities of late years. God is blessing your gratitude to Him by increasing your contributions to His cause. It is high time that those of you who are well-to-do in all our stations should feel the monetary responsibility of the Church, and relieve, so far as you can, the ministry from the corroding anxiety of short to the preaching of the word.

Allow us to ask you, dear brethren, to review your weekly and quarterly contributions to the support of the ministry. We are persuaded that some of you do all you can in this respect, but are there not others who are remiss, and far below, in their contributions, what God requires of their hands. The servant more than the master, the poor more than the rich, and the wealthy no more than when they were poor, is not seemly; it is indeed a moral wrong, and must certainly bring on leanness of soul, and forfeiture of some of Heaven's richest blessings. "Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed me."

Several new rules have been made, which it is hoped will tend to still further promote the prosperity and consolidation of our work.

The Conference in its wisdom saw fit to appoint a general missionary agent to visit our mission stations under the direction of the General Missionary Committee, to advise and assist the brethren laboring therein ; and though there was some difference of opinion as to whether the district agents had been properly worked, yet it is to be hoped wherever the agent may be sent there will be hearty co-operation with him, so that all possible good may be derived from the appointment of such an officer. He is a man of known ability, rich religious experience, and has a thorough acquaintance with our usuage, desciphine, and work, hence the Conference is expecting good and lasting results from his visits.

The Rev. W. Bee retires from the office of General Secretary and Book Steward, which he has so ably filled for the past five years, with the manimous thanks of the Conference, and also the Presidency of the same for this year as a mark of its appreciation of his services.

The Rev. R. Boyle has been appointed his successor, a brother well known and beloved throughout our entire work, and who by his talents, Christian courtesy, and brotherly kindness, has won for himself the honourable and responsible position in which the Conference has placed him. We bespeak for him the hearty co-operation of all the brethren.

This year it has been thought desirable to hold one or more camp meetings. One is to be held in the Barrie District the second week in August, and another in Kingston District as soon as proper arrangements can be made. Will our entire membership remember these meetings at the throne of grace. Ask for an abundant outpouring of the Holy Ghost, that many souls may be saved and the Church built up.

It is a matter for regret that there are so many outstanding subscriptions due to the CHRISTIAN JOURNAL. Two thousand dollars owing is a serious item, and does much to prevent it becoming that power for good among us which it might be. Will the remiss subscribers see to paying their indebtedness at once. Some of you doubtless subscribe to seculy and undenominational papers, and for these you must invariably pay in advance. Pursue the same course with the JOURNAL and then soon shall we be able to bring it up to the standard of a first-class denominational paper.

We would also lay before you the claims of the Book Room upon your support. Works of almost every description for home reading, or Sabbath-school libraries, you can be supplied with as cheaply as at any other house in the trade. Some of our school authorities have the impression that works may be purchased at a cheaper rate at other establishments than our own, but this is a mistake, as they may soon learn by applying to our own Book Steward. The Conference was rejoiced to find that the temperance question is making progress amongst us. Our members and officials are joining the standard of the great temperance crusade. Let us still retain our character, as a Church pledged to eternal warfare against the gigantic evil, the drink traffic.

We ask your prayerful attention to the following resolution adopted by the Conference on our class meetings :--

"That we memoralize all our members upon the importance of a fait.hul and constant adherence to the class meeting, regarding the class meeting as we do, as being one of the most vital means of grace for the ingathering, upbuilding, and strengthening our Church in Canada." Be punctual in attending your class. This is the badge of your membership, and it is eminently calculated to promote your growth in the divine life. This means of grace has been called, and how pertinently so, "Christianity crystalized." This is an age of daving innovation and restless speculation. Men are writing in glowing terms about the Church of the future and religions tests. These would loose you from your methodistic moorings. Be exceedingly careful against unsettled views on this question, lest you drift into some whirlpool, or on to the rock of ensemble.

Most affectionately and earnestly do we entreat you all, officebearers, and private members, to help the ministers all in your power to advance the kingdom of Christ in your stations. every means calculated to help forward the work be employed,-Let open-air services, house to house visitation, holding prayer meetings. distributing tracts, working well the machinery of our Sabbath-schools, contributing your time, your talents, your influence, your all, for the advancement of the Saviour's kingdom in your respective localities. Let there be no jealousy, no unholy rivalry, no indifference, no relaxing of effort, indulged in among you, but let every man at his post, do his duty, feel his personal obligations, and thus contribute his quota to the general good. Seek more closet religion, more family devotion, more practical and experimental piety, aspire after holiness. The great difference between us and our forefathers is this question of consecration. O, the conformity to the world that exists among us. What following of the fashions and customs of the world. What dressing like the world, talking like the world, doing business like the world, making marriages with the world, joining in the amusements of the world, dissembling like the world. The great want of the Church is the richer baptism of the Hol Spirit, spiritual (not architectural or scholastic) power. Here we fail, minister and people; our usefulness

will be in proportion to our holy living. Our stability and prosperity depend almost entirely upon the possession of this power.

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Our machinery may be perfect, our ministry educated and eloquent, our people refined and well-to-do; but what of all these without the Spirit's -powr. We fear there is a tendancy in some querters to subordinate the spirit to the secular, the divine to the human. This is a great mistake,—a sin; and no wonder that worldliness exists in our midst. When this is done it cannot be otherwise, until we feel that conversions depend not upon human ability, but alone upon the Holy Spirit, and growth in church life, uppen profounder piety.

Let all our ministers resolve that this year upon which we have just entered shall be more abundantly prosperous than the past. To this end let there be a more full and complete giving up to the faithful and conscientious performance of the numerous and important duties, private and public, of their holy calling.

Dear Brethren, suffer the word of exhortation. Yours is a high and holy vecation, one which relates to the spiritual and eternal interests of your race. Momentous issues depend upon the honest and faithful discharge of the functions of your exalted office. Your life and word will be the savor of life or death to those among whom you may labor. Hence we ask your kindly acceptance of a few words of brotherly counsel. Cultivate carefully and continuously personal piety. Do not attend to your duties of preaching, conducting prayer meetings, visiting, holding open air services, as mere matters of routine.

Men of other callings may, perhaps, perform efficiently the duties pertaining to their profession without much sympathy of feeling with the same; but if you would be successful ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ, your whole soul must be absorbed in your work. Let there be an agreeableness of manner, a modesty of dress and speech, a moderation in the gratification of your personal wants and wishes, a gentleness toward all men, a constant industry, a generous hospitality, a profound prayerfulness, an unswerving faith, a burning zeal, an insatiable thirst for the salvation of souls, and a God honoring purpose characterizing you in all your efforts to do good, and these will command the admiration and co-operation of the people among whom your lot may be cast. Endeavour to make your visiting effectual; do not let it degenerate into gossip, about business, the weather, or the crops,—remember you are not a merchant, or a dealer, but a minister of the cross of Christ. Your work is first with the souls of the families and not their worldly prospects. Let there be no light and frothy conversation, (it enervates the soul), but let it be seasoned with grace,-such as becometh the gospel of Christ. Speak a few personal, kindly, Christian words, to old and young, read the Scriptures, if possible, and offer a brief

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
Do not depend entirely upon protracted meetings for additions to your ranks, it is an unsound method of keeping up your numbers. Aim at conversions in every sermon. Labour to bring souls to Christ in the ordinary means of grace. Hold prayer-meetings after preaching on Sabbath evening wherever practicable, and thus expect immediate results to your efforts. Why should you not see souls saved every time you preach? You expect them to be saved in protracted meetings, and why not at every service? The Lord is willing. In all your ministerial relations and outies, let there be a constant aim to glorify God, rather than please men. Aim at winning souls rather than 'popularity, at the saving of perishing men, rather than securing salary. Leave that question with the Lord: your Heavenly Father knoweth ye have need of such things, and he that feeds the towls of heaven and clothes the lilies of the field, will feed and clothe you and yours.

Brethren we are in danger of degenerating into a puny race. Our fathers were stalwart men, of indomitable courage, and invincible perseverance, let us pray their mantle may fall on us, that we may perform gigantic deeds for God and truth.

Let the priests be clothed with salvation, (as flames of fire may they be, in the midst of formalism and impiety), and the people with righteousness. Let Zion look forth as the morning, clear as the sun, fair as the moon, then shall she become to her enemies terrible as an army with banners. Arm of the Lord, awake, awake, put on thy strength. O Zion arise and shine for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is arisen upon thee. Brethren, there is a grand future before us in this Dominion, let us then ministers and members, teachers and local preachers, prayer-leaders, and class baders, one and all, arise from the dust, and girding on the armour for the work, go forth in one combined and unbroken phalanx to make war upon sin, infidelity, mammon, intemperance, popery, indifference, age upon the whole force of hell; and thank God, clad in the heavenly armour, wielding wisely and well the sword of the Spirit, as did the proud old worthics, our Fathers, who have laid down the weapons and taken the crown; we shall then win magnificient victories, report glorious increases, realize mighty revivals, experience a blessed state of holiness, and bring great glory and honour, and place at the feet of our ever adorable

And now we pray, "that our Lord Jesus Christ, himself, and God even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and a good hope through grace, comfort your hearts, and establish you in every good word and work."
