## FIRST EDITION.

### PETTICOAT CRUSADERS.

THEY ARE ARRANGED BEFORE THE BAR OF JUSTICE.

They Come up from Spikardville on a Special Train—A Brass Band, a Big Crowd, a Horse Meeting in the Opera House and a Cold Water Bath Before the Trial.

TUESDAY, Feb. 21.—Thirteen fair riders and three men who aided and abetted them in the destruction of much property at Spikardville last Saturday were arraigned here for trial today. At 9:30 o'clock a special train arrived from Spikardville with the crusaders and 600 of their friends on board. They were met at the depot by 1000 Trenton sympathizers. As they alighted from the train the crusaders sang "Hold the Fort" the whole crowd joining in the chorus. The 18 were stood up in line and two rustic photographers took a snapshot at them. Rev. J. H. Cox of the M. E. Church was marshal. The crusaders, wearing white badges, marched next to the band, and carried banners with the inscriptions: "No Chubroom Here," "A Mother's Hope," "A Sober Son," "We Protect Our Homes and Children," "The Will of the Majority is Law," "Here the Voice of the People," "Whiskey Must Go! This is Official."

After parading the principal streets the procession filed into the Opera House. Rev. Mr. Cox called the meeting to order and opened with prayer. Original crusade songs were sung, one of which appeared to be a clear case of plagiarism of that well known melody, "Whiskey you're the devil, you're leading me astray." Rev. Mr. Knox of the Presbyterian Church then prayed fervently for the success of the crusade. Then there were more crusade songs. A big "temperance crusade lunch" was served in the court house yard after the parade. Water was the only liquid in sight. After lunch a speech was made by Rev. Mr. Robbins, who was very bitter, and referred to the crusade as a "hellish paper." Rev. B. Lockhart and Rev. J. Davis spoke in the same strain, and the prosecuting attorney came in for a scorching attack.

At 1:30 o'clock Justice Shanklin called court to order, and the 18 crusaders were assigned before 2000 people and a jury of their peers. The jury are residents of Trenton, and are good citizens. The prosecuting attorney was hissed and jeered at his opening statement, and the court threatened to clear the room if the demonstrations were repeated. A. H. Burkholder, for the defense, appealed to the prejudices of the jury, and the court ruled that he could go on. The first witness was Bradley Hamilton, owner of the building in which the chubroom was located. He was on the stand but a few minutes when the evidence was objected to as irrelevant. Then a question as to the building was raised and whether private parties had a legal right to abate nuisances. There were long debates following. Then the lawyers became personal and came very near settling something. The court took the question under advisement and adjourned court until tomorrow morning. About 75 witnesses were subpoenaed, and the trial will take two or three days.

In his opening speech Mr. Harbor of the prosecution charged the crusade with being a "hellish paper" and with having been behind the destruction of much property at Spikardville with the aid of the crusaders.
