The President also pointed out the desirability of the Royal Military College being recognised as an engineering institution by the Institute of Civil Engineers, and hoped that it would be arranged during the coming year. The President also spoke of the necessity of having any papers that might be read before the Club of a non-professional character, in order that such papers would be interesting to all the members and prevent the Club becoming in any sense a professional institution. The President thanked the members for having accorded him two terms of office and stated his intention of retiring from the Presidency, and closed his remarks by stating his appreciation of the efforts of the Secretary in the interests of the Club.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY TREASURER

-OF THE-

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE CLUB

FOR THE YEAR 1889.

The year just closed has been one of the best which the Club has yet experienced. The membership has increased from 83 to 100, and I have not got a single member on my list asking for employment.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last annual meeting, I drew the attention of the Militia authorities to the injustice done to the graduates of the Royal Military College by making appointments to the permanent forces, of unqualified officers, in violation of Par. 136, Regulations R. M. C., but received no reply.

I also sent to Major-General Oliver the congratulations of this Club on his investiture as a companion of the distinguished order of St. Michael and St. George, and expressed our appreciation of his services as Honorary President of the Royal Military College Club.

I am very sorry to state that the proposed college journal which was to have been published, and which this Club was to make its official organ, has fallen through, owing to the Commandant of the College objecting to our having representation on the Committee of Management. I may say that quite a tew of the members of the Club are trongly in favor of the publication of some such paper in connection with the Club, and, in my humble opinion, the matter is well worth our earnest attention.

The Proceedings of last year's meeting, together with a printed copy of the By-laws and Constitution, was sent to every member.

Those in arrears of dues were notified to that effect, and, I regret

to say, have not all responded in that hearty manner which we have a right to expect.

The most important event which has transpired during the year, to us, was the publication of a General Order on the 30th March, 1889, which reads as follows:

"No. 4.

"ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE OF CANADA.

"Graduates having rank in the Militia.

"Adverting to par. (1) of No. 2 of G. O. (3), 6th February, 1880, a Graduate of the Royal Military College of Canada who has been appointed a Lieutenant in the Militia, may, if not an officer of an Active Militia corps, be promoted Captain in the Militia, provided that within ten years from date of his graduation he has performed at least five annual drills in a camp of exercise, attached temporarily as an officer to a corps of the Active Militia in camp."

This is an answer to our letters of the 16th February and 21st October. 1886, which had long been pigeon-holed, and which would still be there had it not been for the very untiring efforts of our worthy President, Mr. W. M. Davis, with the co-operation of Messrs. J. Sutherland, M.P., and R. S. White, M.P. To these gentlemen the thanks of the Club are due for the very great interest shown by them in its affairs, and for their successful efforts in our behalf against untold opposition.

As there seems to have been very general satisfaction expressed by the members with the list of addresses of ex-cadets published last year, and as the same has proved a great convenience to all, I would suggest that the Secretary be instructed to publish the addresses annually, for distribution, and, between each such publication, to issue once a year a slip giving any changes of addresses that may have occurred since the last publication.
