SOUTH SEA ISLANDERS RELEASED FROM SLAVERY

British Government Frees the Survivors of Party Kidnapped and Taken to

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17. — Nineteen survivors of several hundred South Sea Islanders, kidnapped eighteen years ago from their native strand and sold into slavery among the coffee plantations of Guatemala, arived here yesterday on the steamer City of Para. They are free and homeward bound, and in addition to this they are travelling as tourists with their government paying expenses. The natives were kidnapped by Captain Blackburn, now dead, who visited the islands in his steamer the Monserrat, and enticing them aboard, sailed away. They were supposed to be contract laborers bound to their Guatemalan employers for three years. Ignorant of the language and in a land where the law is sometimes the dictator's will, it was easy to keep them on the plantation where they slaved until their plight was made known to the British government, which, however, was not until eighteen years had passed.

MAPLE SYRUP.

Bulletin No. 155 from the laboratory of the Inland Revenue Department has just been issued.
