SUMMER CARE OF THE FOWLS

At no time of the year does cleanliness count for more in the poultry business than when the warm weather commences. Fowls kept in closed stifling sleeping quarters cannot be kept in a really healthy condition or give very good returns. It would be much better to have the windows removed from the poultry house, to have them cleaned and stored away in some place where they could not be damaged until needed again, and a piece of wire which will keep out any vermin and at the same time allow more fresh andy soil. If they are of wood which wilk keep out any vermin and at the same time allow more fresh sandy soils to have too much sun for he fowls. Many of the losses among adult fowls in the summer season are the result of unhealthy roosting quarters.

The poultry house should be thoroughly cleaned. THE STABLE MEDICINE CHEST

Have you a medicine closet in your barn? You probably have one in your buse—that is, you should have—but if you would be prepared for emergen. Yall the stock you must have ready a supply of remediate of first ald treatment.

A small wooden cabinet securely fastened on the wall of a barn will prevent much trouble. Inch boards of cypress or soft pine are easy to work. Let the thickness, that is work, the the thickness, that is the distance from back to face, be not over eight or ten inches. A chest larger than this will take up too much apace.

A carboilc acid is the best of antiseptic before using against it, and where it is always handy and accessible for immediate use.

For a dusting powder have your druggist prepare equal parts of boric acid, pulverlized gum, camphor, powdered alum, pulverlized charcoal. Or work let the thickness, that is one part; boric acid, two parts; zinc oxide, two parts. Either of these powders is calomet, of turpentine.
