

# AUSTRIA PREPARING ISONZO OFFENSIVE ON

# British and French Defeat the Enemy at St. Souplet and Quentin

Austrian Commander on Isonzo Front Preparing New Offensive and Concentrating Heavy Forces Northeast of Gorizia — Von Hindenburg Said to Have Hand in New Move.

French Smash First Two German Lines and Enter Third Positions in Champagne-British Attack Trenches East of Hargicourt and Wipe Out Enemy.

Paris, Sept. 12—French troops last night attacked the German trenches in the region of St. Souplet in the Champagne and succeeded in smashing the first two German lines and entering the third positions. All the German troops garrisoning these trenches, the French war office announced this afternoon, were either killed or taken prisoners.

The British Statement.

London, Sept. 12—Field Marshall Haig reported today from the British headquarters in France as follows:

"Early this morning the enemy attacked our trenches east of Hargicourt (north of St. Quentin), under cover of a heavy barrage. His advancing infantry were received with rife and machine gun fire and repulsed.

"We carried out successful ridis last night northeast of Bullecourt and south of Lombaertzyde. 


Splendid progress is being made with the new C. G. R. elevator and unless something unforeseen occurs it will be all ready by the end of 1917, was the statement made by the foreman in charge of the construction of this building to a Standard representative yesterday.

The concrete work is all done with the exception of the flours in the upper part of the building, and on Friday last the erection of the steel frame was begun. It is expected that another three weeks will see the steel all in position, then will come the pouring of the floors and the placing of the steel sheathing and ceilings.

The storage tanks are all ready now to receive grain and remind one of a gigantic beehive. Last week the receiving bins were finished and the "leg" which is the name given the part of the machine which takes the grain out of them and starts it on its way to the top of the building, is being installed. These bins are below the ground and under the tracks on which the cars enter the tracks on which the cars enter the building. The care are run in and the grain dumped into the bins, from these it is taken to the top of the elevator where it is sorted, weighed distributed to the storage bins.




