





The Session. A special session to consider the goal and penitentiary question was held yesterday morning, His Worship the Mayor presiding. About twenty five Justices were present.

The Clerk read the minutes of the last Session containing the resolution of Justice Keane, under which the present session was called. It read:—

That the Committee of Sessions formerly deputed to proceed to Ottawa in order to confer with the Dominion Government as to the mode of dealing with the Penitentiary in the City and County of Saint John, be requested to renew the negotiations then entered into, and to be authorized to make terms with the Government as then proposed, either by taking over the present building and grounds, or by the purchase of the Sessions, and using wholly for local or personal purposes; or in case the Government retain the property by agreement to the sum of money or other allowance to be made by the Government in lieu of the right of the Sessions. Such Committee to report to the Session by bill, or otherwise, what steps may be necessary for the fine them for short periods. The other details of the transfer and the amounts in connection with the matter, Justice Keane stated his willingness and ability to give from the time of the laying of the first brick. There were, he said, two aspects of the question—either to keep the buildings or dispose of them for a money compensation. In the latter case, the County would have to build a House of Correction at a cost of not less than \$5,000, while, to any person but ourselves, the building would be of little use.

Justice Robertson asked if the Provincial grants were not made on condition of the right to send persons from any part of the Province and was answered in the affirmative. Justice Keane gave his opinion that it would not.

Justice Robertson mentioned the discussion in Parliament, and stated he believed that were the matter clearly laid before the Parliament they would not perpetrate such an act of gross injustice as to pass the act depriving us of our rights by turning criminals for minor offences loose on the community. They dare not take the responsibility mentioned in the section of the Act of 1870. He was opposed to the resolution as it was in regard to the authority to be given the Committee.

Justice Robertson supported Justice Robertson. Justice Marshall suggested that the Penitentiary and lands were both sufficient equivalent, and wished a clause added in regard to money compensation. Justice Gregory thought the Dominion Government should be compelled to sustain this institution which was now so great a tax on us. He further believed that more representative men should be added to the committee.

Another long conversation here took place, but at last, Justice Keane was again addressing the Board, Justice Milligan rose to order, and complained that some five or six members had taken up the time of the Board in speaking on all sorts of foreign topics, out of which the other Justices could understand nothing.

After further conversation the question on the resolution and amendment were taken, the latter being carried. The Clerk of the Peace gave notice that he had received a notice to show cause why the Portland Assessment should not be set aside at the next term of the Supreme Court, after which the Board adjourned.

There was a furious gale during Saturday night and Sunday on Lake Ontario, doing considerable damage to steamers and rafts.

Hon. E. K. Smart, a prominent citizen and politician of Maine, died yesterday. Two sons of Wallace Gupit, one son of Nelson Gupit, and a son of Capt. William Malmson, were drowned near Eastport, Me., on Friday night by the upsetting of their boat.

LONDON, Sept. 30. Consols 92 1/2; breadstuffs firm. The ship "Nazarene" was wrecked off Forby, Lancaster County, during the late heavy gale. All on board were drowned. Many reports of other disasters of late severe character have been received. The reported destruction by Lord Fitzroy of the Chancellorship is confirmed.

LONDON, Sept. 30th. Professor Tyndall sailed for Liverpool for New York Saturday. Separato has resigned his position as Minister of the Spanish Senate.

The French Government condemns Gambetta's course in addressing people in the Provinces. His speeches are considered indiscreet and ill-timed and calculated to agitate the country which needs repose.

The Pope to-day went to the Vatican for the first time since the occupation of Rome by the Italian Government. He proceeded to Portofino, and walked in the garden.

New York, Oct. 1. It is rumored that Boss Tweed has fled at last to escape the suits pending against him, and which were to have commenced yesterday.

A furious gale has been prevailing on Lake Ontario, and some wrecks are already reported. On Lake Erie several disasters are reported, some of which were attended with loss of life.
