Time Agricultural Society.

1. There will be no appeal from the decision of the Judges, and any person guilty of fraud shall furfeit all his prizes and be expelled from the Society.

2. Any animal or article not deemed worthy of a prize, where there is no competition, shall not be entitled to it.

8. All Grains, Seeds, Roots, and Dairy Products must be the produce of the year 1894 and raised by the exhibitor.

4. For any Agricultural Implements of Articles of Mechanical Manufacture of Improved principle or superior workmanship; also for new or improved varieties of Grains, Seeds, Roots, &c., extra premiums will be awarded, at the discretion of the Judges and Directors.

5. All articles shown must be the property of the exhibitor. No exhibitor will be allowed to compete in more than one class with the same animal or article.

6. Exhibitors of Agricultural Implements and articles of Mechanical Manufacture must be the manufacturer of each article, or his authorized agent.

7. No exhibitor will be awarded more than one prize for articles of the same specimen, unless the additional article be of a distinct variety or pattern from the first. This rule qot to apply to Animals, but to Grain, Roots, Fruit, Manufactures, &c.

Notice of Sale published in THE BEE Free of Charge. 8. No person will be allowed to interfere with the Judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premiums to which they might otherwise be cutitled.

9. Any article having been awarded a prize three years in succession, previous

to this exhibition, will be debarred from competing for a prize.

10. That tickets issued by the secretary be attached to the different animals of articles on or before 12 o'clock and while the Judges are inspecting the same every one not necessary will be required to withdraw from that part of the ground.

11. Membership will be retained for the year next ensuing, from the parties obtaining prizes at this exhibition.

12. All articles of Mechanical Manufacture must be the production of the present year.

13. No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any article before 5 o'clock on the day of show.

14. The colors to be 1st prize, Red; 2nd, Green; 3rd, White. All articles must be entered with the Secretary before 10 o'clock a. m. on the day of the show, and to be on the ground before 11. Judges to commence at 12.

15. Perons taking prizes must apply to the Secretary on or before Nov. 80th, ensuing, or forfeit such prizes

, 16. Any person may become a member of this Society by paying \$1 to the Secretary or any of the Directors. A member of this Society shall be entitled to two admission tickets.


