RUSSIANS FIRED ON BRITISH STEAMER IN RUSSIAN SEAPORT

Guardians Over-Anxious Regarding Safety of Czar and
Fired Shot Which Struck the

WOUNDED ONE SEAMAN.

Viborg, Finland, June 17.—A British steamer has been fired upon by a Russian torpedo boat, approaching too close to the bay on the Finnish coast where Emperor Nicholas and Empress Wilhelmina are to meet today. The British steamer in question is the Nordborg, Capt. Robertson. She was hailed and fired upon last night off Wieroholm, island of Helsingfors. The projectile from the torpedo boat pierced a steamship and one member of the crew of the British steamer was injured. The incident shows the extreme nervousness of the Emperor even at sea.

ANOTHER BIG LUMBER DEAL

Drummonds Said to Have Option on
Adams, Burns Co's,
Property.

A FINE PROPERTY.

St. John, June 15.—A big lumber property deal on the North shore was currently reported yesterday. The story was that Adams, Burns & Co., of Bathurst, had disposed of their holdings in Gloucester county to American interests and the price was \$250,000.

Patrick Burns, of the firm, was asked to confirm the report, but he would only say that he preferred to make no statement in the absence of Mr. Adams, who was in Bathurst at the time but would be in a few days.

The Adams-Burns property, it is said, consists of 400 square miles of timber lands, a mill and other adjuncts. The report of the sale aroused a good deal of interest when it was heard in St. John yesterday.

The option which the Drummonds concern have on the Adams, Burns & Co. property at Bathurst is generally valued at \$200,000 and there seems to be little doubt that the mill will take over the property. The property has a fine water frontage and would give

London, June 12.—The mobilization of the British fleet for the annual manoeuvres was practically complete at this morning and something like 350 warships are now making their way to the respective stations. The manoeuvres will be secret but the general scheme is understood to be a repetition of the plan of last year, which resulted in a race, as owing to the fog the opposing fleets never came into contact. Vice-Admiral Sir William Henry May is in supreme command.



TOWN IMPROVEMENT.

A little improvement in a town in one year does not make a great deal of show. Neither does the zapping. But the zapping adds a little to its growth and beauty each year, and teaches us all a lesson. A little improvement this year, followed by an equal amount and perhaps a little more next year, will mean a big thing in the course of a decade. The interest on a hundred dollars at five per cent is not a great thing in one year, but in twenty years it doubles the investment. But—improvements yield larger per centage than the money market affords. The cumulative power of improvement is not fixed laws; the cumulative power of improvement is not fixed, or at least improvement seems to have more to show for itself in a cumulative way. The resident of the home town is not so quick to see the improvements that have been made in the town. Thus the whole territory comprised by the eastern provinces is marked as suitable for dairying and mixed farming; the northern and central portion of New Brunswick is marked "lumber"; and the coal and iron deposits are similarly indicated as well as the fishery resources along our coasts. In addition to the map the new publication contains a mass of statistical information regarding the various Canadian provinces; their products, areas, wealth, population, trade, etc. Comprehensive in its presentation, the new book should prove of great value to intending settlers as well as to investing capitalists.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry, by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts, 1 acre \$150 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

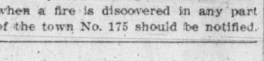
