## OPPOSES EXTENSION OF WATER POWER

Grand Falls Board of Trade Takes Strong Stand and Has Support of Towns all Along the River

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Grand Falls Board of Trade, which resolution pleads for the cancellation of the franchise controlling the power resources of Grand Falls vested in the Grand Falls Power Co., controlled by the International Paper Co. of New York, Fred W. Pirie and Meagher Costigan on Thursday evening addressed a representative body of citizens in the Star Theatre.

The resolution in question is as follows: "Whereas the Grand Falls Board of Trade has learned that it is the intention of the Grand Falls Company, Limited, to make application, at the coming session of the Legislature, for a further extension of time before commencing development of water power at Grand Falls; be it

Resolved, that we in regular meeting assembled, protest against any further extension and urge upon the Provincial Government the necessity of immediate development and further be it

## LAND AND HYDRO-ELECTRIC COMBINATION

C. M. Sherwood, Bath, offers for sale sixty-five acres choice farming land, located at Connell, between land owned by Bertram Perry and the Presque Isle Stream. ## THREE MONTHS FOR STEALING \$20

Yesterday Sheriff Foster arrested Lewis Carr in Hartland on a warrant charging him with the theft of \$20 from the Windsor hotel. The money taken was in the form of two American ten dollar bills, and as such currency is rather uncommon here at present, the passing of the money led to the young man's undoing.

Before Police Magistrate, Kelly, Carr pleaded guilty and was sentenced three months in jail, whither the sheriff immediately conveyed him.

## BAD FIRE AT CLOVERDALE

A disastrous fire occurred at Cloverdale on Sunday evening when Herbert Adair's fine house, with practically all its contents was destroyed. Fire caught in the oil when nobody was in the house, the occupants being only temporarily absent.

The building was a very nice one and as there was only relatively small insurance the loss is a heavy one. Neighbors quickly on hand did what they could to save the property. The other buildings escaped.

## METHODIST DISTRICT MEETING

At Debec Last Week—Plans for Methodist Laymen's Convention Soon

The March meeting of the Woodstock District of the Methodist church met at Debec on Wednesday and Thursday of last week with a good attendance of ministers and laymen. The chairman, Rev. F. A. Wightman, presided over the session.

On Wednesday afternoon after a season of devotional exercises, Rev. M. E. Conron of Woodstock gave a very helpful address on "The Good and Evil Tendencies of Doubtful Religious Movements." In the evening Rev. F. A. Wightman gave a talk on mission work among the Indians of the Pacific Coast. This was illustrated by nearly a hundred very fine lantern slides. A large number were present.

On Thursday morning Rev. Hugh Miller gave a very helpful talk on Church Benevolences and how to collect these monies. His paper indicated that all the circuits in the Woodstock District had more than doubled their giving in recent years. This was followed by considerable helpful discussion by both ministers and laymen. At the same session Rev. H. Harrison read an excellent paper on "Spiritual Voices in Modern Literature." This was discussed at length.

An effort will be made to have one of the meetings in the near future take the place of a Methodist Laymen's Convention at which large numbers will be arranged to attend. A committee was appointed to make arrangements consisting of Revs. M. E. Conron and Hugh Miller and Messrs. Baker and Haynes. Votes of thanks were passed to entertaining friends. A fellowship meeting closed the session. The next will be held at Upper Kent in June.
