LATER REPORT.

SHELBURNE, April 25.—The triple tragedy enacted yesterday morning at the Morrison homestead is still the topic of conversation. Until to-day there appeared no happier family in the township of Melancthon. Morrison, the poor, demented murderer, is the possessor of a good farm, free from all encumbrance, and was in fact very well off. He enjoyed the respect of all his neighbors and is well connected. This evening he lies in a darkened room, hanging between life and death, with the mark of Cain on his brow. In the next room are the bodies of his three little children, murdered by his own hand. At the back of the bed lies the eldest of the dead children, a bright little girl named Arabella, 7 years of age. At the front is Thomas James, 5 years of age, and between the two lies William Edgar, aged 2 years.

A TALK WITH THE MOTHER.

The heart-broken mother is an intelligent woman about 35 years of age, being much younger than her husband, whose age is given as 54. Mrs. Morrison spoke in kindly terms with reference to her husband. She said he was a kind husband and an indulgent father, and she could not imagine what led him to commit such a terrible crime. The said he had been ill during the past month, and that very often he was despondent to bed, but appeared to be melancholy and complained about a pain in his head. Last week he told his wiie that he was troubled about what would become of the three youngest children in case anything happened to ten. Bates is 18 years old and the other lad 17. The girls afterwards informed their parents of the marriage and were taken back home, but without the companionship of their husbands.

Disastrous Results of the Mississippi's Overflow—Hundreds of Lives in Peril.

BAYOU SARA, April 25.—The real condition of things in the overflowed district is just coming to light. No pen can picture the devastation of the country or the desolation of the people. The entire front of Pointe Coupee is under water. The water back of the levees is so deep that hundreds of lives are in jeopardy. The small stretches of levee still standing are crowded with men, women and children side by side with horses, mules and cows. In an old raised gin house 500 negroes were found huddled together. The condition of the unfortunate blacks was pitiable. The crevasse at Allendale will overflow 30 of the finest plantations on the river. The damage is inscallable.

THOUSANDS OF STOCK HAVE BEEN BROWNED, and it is quite probable human life has been sacrificed. Standing on the deck of the relief steamer Dacotah as she passed within 50 yards of the flooded district the extent of the disaster could be seen. Grouping together on the little knolls between broken levees; through which the water rushed with ungovernable furry, were scores of people, white and black, some with babies in arms. Many had nothing in the world except the clothes they wore. Whenever the Dacotah discovered a scene like this the stage was swung out and the stricken ones taken aboard. A family named Luke, who resided several miles above Bayou Sara, were resculationed. vote. A council of war was neid, and it was determined that the men should take turn about in caring for the "kids" while Williams went to the polls. An attempt was made to carry this into execution, but the infants set up such a howl of protest that the poor man was left to his fate.—[Albany Journal.]

Some davs ago the lightning struck the 335-foot chimney—the highest in the world—of the Clark thread mills, at Kearney, N. J. Although the mighty tower of bricks withstood the shock, a shower of bricks, fell, and it was found that the chimney had been injured. The mills were shut down as a matter of precaution. To inspect the chimney it become necessary that some one should first get to the top of it. John Philips, a Scotch workman, volunteered to do, it and since then the town has had no other general subject of conversation. Phillips lashed ladders to the chimney, securing them by iron bolts, and put one on top of the other until 23 had been thus secured Thursday morning he completed the task of the other until 23 had been thus secured Thursday morning he completed the task by affixing the last ladder—an iron one, making 24 in all. A stout leather belt, with a hook around his waist, served to hold him near the top of each ladder as he progressed, leaving his arms free to secure the bolts for the next ladder. A block and tackle affixed at each stage of his work served to hoist the ladders up to him and also assist him in making his ascents. A number of women, some of whom are employed in the factory, stood near the gate as Phillips placed his last ladder, and prayed audibly and fervently that he would safely accomplish his undertaking. When Phillips reached the top of the chimney he walked around the inside of the cap for a few minutes and then lowered a rope to the bottom of the flue. To this rope were then added three heavy wood girders, which were sent up to Phillips, who placed them across the stack. The work of rigging block and fall occupied comparatively little time, and then Master Mason Cunningham, with lighted lantern, was raised in a boatswain's chair to points in the chimney corresponding with the breaks on the outside with lighted lantern, was raised in a boats-wain's chair to points in the chimney cor-responding with the breaks on the outside. The daring deed was watched from day to day by thousands and the New York papers devoted columns to a description of his perilous climb, which took several days.

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

San Francisco Severely Shaken.

San Francisco Severely Shaken.

San Francisco, Cal., April 25.—One of the most severe shocks of earthquake experienced here for a long time was felt in this city and neighboring localities a little after 3:30 yesterday morning. The buildings were shaken perceptibly and persons aroused from their sleep, plastering fell from the walls in places, but no serious damage has been reported.

The earthquake shock at Mayfield was very severe. The railroad bridge was rendered impassable, as the piers, 60 feet high, settled a few inches and the rails spread apart about a foot. The ground in places settled six to twelve inches. Railroad travel will be delayed. The earthquake was general in this section. The shock was very sharp in this city, but no serious damage was done. The walls of a few houses were cracked, and there was considerable alarm left by persons aroused from sleep. THE TURF.

TORONTO, April 25.—The jury in the St. George case, after having been under the surveillance of the court since Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, brought in their findings yesterday morning about 10:30. They did not find answers to all the questions submitted to them by Mr. Justice Rose, but the counsel for the plaintiffs entertain very sanguine views on the general result of the jury's deliberations. The questions and answers of the jury are as follows:

Q—What was the primary cause of the accident? A—The breaking of the tire.

Q—Was the west switch in order at the time the train passed over? A—To all appearance it was in order.

Q—What was the space between the ends of the floating and stock rails? A—About three quarters of an inch.

Q—Was the use of the stub switch west of the St. George station reasonable or unreasonable? A—Cannot agree.

Q—Was there a flaw in the tire? A—Sufficient evidence has not been given on this point to arrive at a conclusion.

Q—What caused the tire to break? A—Volcace, but cannot determine from what sources.

Q—Should the breaking of the tire have reasonably been anticipated? A—Yes.

Q—If so, what reason was there as shown by the evidence for such anticipation? A—Its being too thin for this service.

The report shows that Canada owns a system of canals that cost \$54,000,000 and the Intercolonial Railway which cost \$47,000,000. Canada has given to the Canadian Pacific \$215,000,000, while its total cost was only \$167,000,000. The to the Canadian Pacific \$215,000,000. While its total cost was only \$167,000,000. The Canadian people, the report says, have not disguised their purpose to secure a railroad across the continent able to dominate the trans-continental commerce of the United States, and to deflect from American vessels, seaports and railroads a large share of our own commerce with Asia, Australia and New Zealand. This has, to a considerable extent, been done. The report asserts that unjust discrimination is made by Canada against American vessels on the lakes in the matter of entrance and clear ance fees. Vessels passing through the Welland Canal bound to Montreal have a rebate made of a portion of the tolls pain for canal passage, but if bound to any American port or to the St. Lawrence. River no rebate is made. This, the report says, is in violation of the treaty of Washington.

Paying by Value.

The opinion is already coming to the front that cheese factory patrons should be paid for their milk on the basis of its actual value determined by analysis or adequate test, proceeding on the assumption that the measure of fat is the proper gauge. Hoard's Dairyman deals thus with the subject: A valued Canadian subscriber advises us that the directors of a cheese factory, of which he is a patron, have resolved to conduct the factory by testing the milk an average of once in two weeks, and divide the money received for the cheese on the basis of the butter fat contributed by each patron, as shown by the tests. He asks the mathematical steps for dividing the money. Nothing is plainer; for all we have to do is to divide the money received for the cheese on the basis of the butter there is found to be in it, and then paying each man his pro rata share, according to the butter he contributed to the cheese vat. It is just as plain, and just as easy to pay for the butter in a cheese, as for that in a butter tub.

For illustration: Suppose 10,000 pounds of cheese are sold at 10 cents and \$1,000 received therefor. If the tests show there were 3,500 pounds of butter in the milk the cheese was made from, then the owners of the 3,500 pounds of butter in the milk the cheese was made from, then the owners of the 1,000; or, in that case, butter in the cheese is worth 25.67 cents per pound, and the farmer who has contributed the milk to make 100 pounds of butter, it entitled to \$28.57—no matter what his milk weighed, though of course his milk would have to be weighed to know what per cent. of fat his milk yielded, and from that credit him with so much butter in the cheese.
