He did not think the fact that the mover had left in the bill the word "unlawful" was sufficient reason for the statements which had been made with regard to bis motives.

Mr. Laurier said there was no doubt there were other causes of combines than protection, that distance and the difficulty of transportation might give an advantage which would make a combine possible. ALCOHOL IN HEALTH AND DISEASE A recent declaration by an anonymous writer, that alcohol is the natural enemy of disease, and its consumption therefore beneficial, is not borne out by the evidence of the leading physicians who last week participated in the proceedings of the International Medical Congress at Port Richmond, R. I. Dr. Davis, of Chicago, showed that last year \$800,000,000 was spent in the United States for intoxicating liquors, or \$13 per head; and he contended that the expenditure was not in the public interest, but had inflicted a distinct loss not only to of the consumers. "People," said this doctor, "drink because of the erroneous ideas as to the nature and effects of alcoholic beverages. Before chemistry analyzed liquor it was supposed to be stimulating, warming, soothing and restorative. This is now known to be fallacious. Nineteen twentieths of the alcoholic drinks given to the sick are mixed with sugar, nutriment as will be found in a daily diet of eight or ten quarts of beer continued for a year. The man who drank this amount of hear would not be sent about their business. A five-pound loaf of bread contains as much amount of beer would swallow a barrel of alcohol. In beer there is 4 per cent. of alcohol, in wines 15 per cent., and in dis-tilled liquors from 50 to 60 per cent. Science classes alcohol as a poison. taken pure it will destroy tissue as quickly as carbolic acid. Alcohol causes permanent structural changes in the liver, kidneys, stomach, heart, blood vessels and nervous tissue, and lessens the natural duration of life from ten to fifteen years." This is a serious arraignment, but it had many supporters in the congress. Dr. Halbrook, of New York, for example, gave personally-compiled statistics to show that the con-

the power of resistance to disease. Thousands of intelligent physicians sub-scribe to this declaration, and as a conse-quence have now either banished alcohol from their prescriptions or countenance its use sparingly solely as a medicine. In support of their stand, the experience of the National Temperance Hospital, established at Chicago a few years ago, to demonstrate that disease can be more successfully treated without than with the use of alcohol, can be adduced. The principles upon which it was organized were: 1. Alcohol is a poison. 2. When taken into the system it is not assimilated, but passes the round of the circulation, and is firefly thrown off through the organs of exception unchanged. 3. While passing through the body it disturbs the various physiological processes, and in this way lays the foundation for disease. 4. It does not stimulate or strengthen but depresses and weakens. 5. As it is not assimilated, it cannot be a food. 6. As it disturbs every physiological process it cannot be a medicine. 7. There is no disease afflicting the body that cannot be more successfully treated without than with the use of alcohol. On this principle the hospital at Chicago is being run. During the last year it treated 140 patients and performed 98 surgical operations, and ortality was only 5 per cent.

If further testimony were needed that the use of alcohol in health or disease can well be dispensed with, it is to be found in the experience of Dr. Bucke, superintend ent of the London Asylum for the Insane, who has for years banished the stimulant from the institution, and with the most patisfactory results.

APPLY BRITISH PRECEDENTS. The recent scandalous revelations at Ottawa have brought out some remarkable excuses for wrongdoing and for toleration of the men who are responsible for the gross mismanagement and robbery that has resulted therefrom. Our contemporary the Montreal Star has been quoted with approval by the excusers of Sir Hector Langevin and his associates. The particular comfort which the Star gave arose from its assertion that perhaps too much party zeal would characterize the action of the Liberals in ferreting out evidence in support of the contention that the public have been robbed systematically by the Govern ment and its needy hangers-on. The Star has since wisely modified its position, no doubt as a result of the increasingly dam aging nature of the evidence brought out at Ottawa. We presume that there is small comfort in this categorical pronouncemen

"Does anyone suppose that in a civil service thus permeated with the spirit of grab the abuses now brought to light are the worst that might be uncovered? Are the great responsibilities and interests of the country safe in the hands of a huge staff in which the superior officers systematically connive with their subordinates to draw public money under false pretenses?

Worst feature of all, it has remained for a Parliamentary committee to raise the first doubts about the existence of Mrs. Harris. How could such practices have been carried on for years without the knowledge of the Government? It is not difficult to answer these queries

by our contemporary:

We believe that worse scandals remain yet to be unveiled, though the process is ren-dered most difficult by the retention in office of those accused, who have power to do as they please with the books and papers that would reveal the true state of affairs. The great "responsibilities and interests" of the country are not safe in the hands of boodling officials who for years have carried on a system of fraud and robbery of the public

Can we rely upon the Star and other in-dependent Conservative journals to join is in demanding an immediate change of Administration, as a result of those revela-tions? In Great Britain, a Government that was proved to be buttressed by men of the stamp of Sir Hector Langevin and Mr. McGreevy, M.P., would not stand 24 hours, so great would be the public outcry against it. Surely if we are to follow English precedent in matters of government and in respect for the proprieties, there should be enough in dependence in the ranks of honest Con servatives to teach their leaders the lesson that wholesale peculation of public money, with the connivance of Ministers and their deputies, will not be condoned, even if a portion of that money is spent in achieving

a party triumph. To the great mass of us, it is of con paratively small importance who the men may be that are the head of the Govern ment at Ottawa. But it is of vital interest to all who have to depend upon their own exertions for a living that the men in public office, whether as Ministers of the Crown or as subordinates, should be honest and the pockets, but to the bodies and minds | zealous for the welfare of the public. That many of them have not been so in the past must now be patent to all. Millions of dollars of public money have been given away, under one guise or another, to speculative contractors and monopolists. These men did not earn that money; it did not grow upon the trees; it was the product of the labor of the people, and wrung from them by the tax collector, who levied milk, eggs or meat broths, which on almost every article going mon use. It certainly is about time that furnish the nutriment and would this sort of thing were stopped, and that the men who have winked at wrong-doing,

and his associates are now trying to purge their surroundings. They hold power to day by virtue of the cash and labors of the men whose services they are represent ed by their apologists as anxious to dispense with. They knew all about the greatest rascality of all—that involving Sir Hector Langevin and his cronies—long before last Dominion election, but they refused to take any action till the House met, and now denounce Mr. Tarte, M.P., for formulating the charges under investigation. No cleans ing short of a change of Government can, under the circumstances, be regarded as satisfactory to honest people.




