STARVING HIS WIFE.

An Old Brocklyn Miser Arrested on Charge of Attempted Homicide—The Woman Saved by Neighbors.

Charge of Attempted Homicide—The Woman Saved by Neighbors.

New York, N. Y., June 17.—Aliphalet Stratton, of 124 Gates avenue, Brooklyn, was arrested esterday on a charge of attempted homicide. Stratton is \$3 years of age, and is said to own real estate in this city and Brooklyn, having an aggregate value of \$300,000. Six years ago his first willo died, Shortly after her death the appearance of another woman in the house sot the tongues of the neighbors wagging. The new-comer was about 30 years old, dark, and wore gold-rimmed spectacles. Stratton was married to the woman, and for a year peace seemed to rule in the home.

But the year had hardly passed when the couple began to quarrel. Though feeble in lody the old man was still clear headed, and was said to be almost insanely parsimetions after another, and all claimed that they could not live on the food provided. Last January Mrs. Stratton was taken sick with peritonitis, and Dr. Cooper, of 79 St. James Place, was called in to attend months ago, because, he says, he could do not hive don't say, he could do not receiving proper care and nourishment. Dr. Rushmore then began to prescribe for not receiving proper care and nourishment. Dr. Rushmore then began to prescribe for Mrs. Stratton. He also gave up the case because the patient was so poorly cared for. Since then Mrs. Stratton, it is said, has been almost entirely without food of any kind.

Mrs. Jadwin procured some food and failing to gain an entrance to the house, passed it up to the starving woman on a clothes pole. Every day this was repeated until Stratton discovered what was going on. Then he barricaded the windows. But the neighbors mana, outwit the old man. One of their own keys fitted the lock on his door, and every day, when Stratton went out for a walk, they carried food up to his sick wife.

The belief was soon established in the neighborhood that old Stratton was trying to get rid of his wife, and an indignation meeting was held on Wednesday night by those who live in the vicinity. A complaint was laid and a detective forced an entrance into the house. He discovered Mrs. Stratton in bed, almost too weak to speak. She said that she was being starved to death, and held up her arm, which was almost fleshless. Her husband was locked up until his trial. He murmured something about being too poor to hire a nurse.

KILLED ON THE TRACK!

Michael Lalley, of This City, Was

His Mangled Remains Found on th G. T. R. Rails in the East End-The Probable Circumstances of His Death-An In-

Another unfortunate has met his death

Another unfortunate has met his death en the track.

Last night about 9 o'clock a telephone message was received by Night Agent Carroll, of the G. T. R. station here, informing him that the remains of an unknown man were lying on the track near the old race course in the East End. Some men had reported so to the switchmen out there.

Mr. Carroll procured assistance, and with an engine and car set out for the spot. There they found the stranger's body in a culvert. It was terribly mangled; the abdomen was so crushed that the trunk the abdomen was so trushed that the trunk that Mr. Carroll procured assistance, and almost severed from the legs. se was brought to the station was almost severed from the legs. The corpse was brought to the station and placed in the conductors' room for identification. No one seemed to know the man for a while. Finally Brakeman Ed. White recognized it as that of his brother-in-law, Michael Lally, a local cigarmaker. Others came along, too, who knew him, and many sorrowful exclamations of "Poor Mike!" were heard.

The victim was about 23 years of age.

He was widely known in the city. His
father, Michael Lally, son., a polisher, resides at 13 Palace street, and there
Michael lived with his parents, one brother
and two sisters. About a week ago he left Michael lived with his parents, due bother and two sisters. About a week ago he left the city—for Detroit it was supposed at the time. The circumstances of his death are not clear as yet. The most plausible theory at first was that he was riding on the west-bound he was riding on the west-bound pacific Express which reaches the property of \$6.50 nm. He was killed on the acific Express which reaches the ty at 6:50 p.m. He was killed on the ain line, and that was the last train to assever it before the body was found. So it was an unfrequented locality, his tesence there cannot otherwise be ac-

cunted for.

SOME LIGHT ON THE ACCIDENT. An important side light was thrown upon the circumstances surrounding the death of Michael Lally in the Police Court this morning. James Connor and Mathias Charlebois were arrested at Harrisburg by Grand Trunk Constable Logan on a charge of vagrancy. It appears that they were consorting with Lally at the exhibition race course yesterday afternoon and evening. The unfortunate man, they allege, was somewhat under the influence of liquor. He attempted to get on several trains, but was forcibly detained by his companions. When, however, early in the evening, a freight train came gliding down the track at a pretty good rate of speed, Connor An important side light was thrown a pretty good rate of speed, Connorlebois, who were anxious to get to and Charlebois, who were anxious to get to Hamilton, decided to avail themselves of this opportunity, and jumped on. Lally—although his two chums have no actual eye-knowledge of this fact—was less fortunate. He must have fallen under the wheels with fatal results. On Mr. Logan's recommendation, the prisoners were remanded until next Friday in order that they may appear at the inquest this afternoon.

Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, of this city, has recently been crowned with a new honor. He has been elected president of the Provincial Medical Council, and now stands, officially, at the head of the profession in Ontario.

Fifty years ago—Dec. 27, 1893—Dr. Campbell was born in London. At an early age he was connected with newspaper journalism, but soon abandoned this vocation to study medicine. His education in this profession was obtained in the Cleveland Western Medical College and the Homeopathic College at Philadelphia. On graduating he commenced practice in this city. This he has continued—with an interruption of four years spent in Stratford—without cessation since that time. Dr. Campbell's professional abilities have been amply recognized by the employment of his services in almost every local charitable institution. He is medical examiner for the Royal Arcanum, has been a valued member of the conventing staff of the General Hose

Royal Arcanum, has been a valued n of the consulting staff of the General Hospital and also of the Board of Health for

pital and also of the Board of Health for some time. He served with great accept ance on the Board of Education and was elected chairman before he retired.

The fraternal organization with which Dr. Campbell has been most prominently identified, and from which he has received the largest attainable reward for disinterested effort on its behalf, is the Independent Order of Oddellows. He joined Dominion Lodge in this city in 1867. Two years later he was the representative of this subordinate body in the Grand Lodge of Ontario. In 1879 he was chosen to fill a similar position in the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Last year he was elected Sovereign Grand Sire—the pinnacle point sovereign Grand Sire—the pinnacle point of honor in Oddfellowship. Dr. Campbell has the distinction of being the first resident Canadian to occupy this position. He is the executive head of over 800,000 members—a rare distinction indeed.

PROF. CAMPBELL'S CASE.

Text of Maitland Presbytery's Overture.

John Charlton, M.P., Speaks on Sunday Observance.

Brantford, June 16.—Following is the overture from the Presbytery of Maitland having reference to the teachings contained in a recent lecture delivered by Prof. John Campbell, D. S. C., of Montreal College, at Queen's College, Kingston, and entitled "The perfect book or the perfect Father?" "Having seen no notice or overture by any other Presbytery upon the same subject the Presbytery of Maitland overture the venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada cited to meet in the city of Brantford, Ont., on the 14th day of June, 1893, as follows:

"Whereas all ministers at their ordination and all professors at their induction into professorial chairs in the colleges of the Presbyterian Church in Canada salemnily declare that they believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the words of God and the only infallible rule of faith and manners, and that they believe the Westminster Confession of Teath as adopted by this church on the basis of union to be founded on and agreeable to the Word of God and promise in their teaching faithfully to adhere thereto.

"And whereas the Rev. John Campbell, LL.D., both at his ordination and also at his induction into the chair of church history and apologetics in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, made the foregoing

at his induction into the chair of church history and apologetics in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, made the foregoing declaration of belief and gave the foregoing promise, being the indispensable condition of his said ordination and induction; and whereas the Rev. John Campbell, LL.D., professor of church history and apologetics in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, has, in an address delivered by him in Convocation Hall, Queen's College, Kingston, Feb. 28, 1893, corrected by himself for publication, made use of language highly derogatory to the character of God, to the character and inspiration of the Scriptures, and the characters and writings Scriptures, and the characters and writings of the inspired penman, etc., as for ex-

Scriptures, and the characters and writings of the inspired penman, etc., as for example:

"The prevailing Old Testament notion concerning God was that of an oriential monarch subject to no law, ruling absolutely, sitting upon the circle of the earth and looking down upon its grasshoppers beneath; a warrior king he goes forth to fight for Israel against the rest of his children, an avenger he takes the little ones of Babylon and dashes them against the stones, etc.; we find God tempting Abraham to commit murder and David number Israel to his people's destruction; sending lying spirits to deceive and commanding Hosea to sin filthily, save in the Book of Job, 21st chapter of 1. Chronicles, and a few other places. The Old Testament writers merged two supernatural agents most diverse in power and character, namely, God and his creature the dovil, into one. If you are an intelligent Christian, zealous for your Father's reputation, you can read between the lines and tell when God speaks your Father's reputation, you can read be-tween the lines and tell when God speaks tween the lines and tell when God speaks and when the evil one, but your reading does not exonerate the sacred writers. It is in vain God says I am the Lord that healeth thee, for he sends plague and pestilence on Egyptian, Isrelite and Assyrian. It is of infinitely more importance to believe in an infallible God than in an infallible book; the latter is vulgar dolarry. When I come to investigate this book I find that those to whom God spake at sundry times and in divers manner had very different and contradicting views of God. The infallible teaching of Christ reveals the fallibility of preceding teachers. The divino perfections set teachers. The divine perfections set forth in the New Testament declare the untruthfulness of the statement in Samuel." And much more of the same

"And whereas, watching over and preserving to the church the sound teaching of the scriptural standards in her colleges and pulpits is a primary duty of the supreme court of the church; therefore the Presbytery of Maitland humbly overture the venerable the General Assembly to take such steps, with the least delay, in the premises as shall uphold in the colleges of the church the teachings of her scriptural standards, remove from the minds of the people the well-grounded anxiety and alarm awakened by the address at Kingston, complained of, and deal with Prof.

Mr. John Charlton, M.P., who is an elder delegate, made a strong speech in favor of legislating to prevent the desecration of the Sabbath. After the matter had been pretty well threshed out it was agreed to remit the question to a special committee for further consideration and report.

Wm. Hetherington, of This City, Killed on the C. P. R.,

By the Westbound Express at the Water loo Street Crossing—An Old Rest-dent of Middlesex—His Family.

Still another was added to the list of deaths on the railroad this morning.

The C. P. R. express, No. 5, from the east, due here at 11:05, ran into and killed a man on the corner of Waterloo street. It was within a block of the station. The man was crossing Pall Mall street leisurely and seeing the approaching train increased his speed. Unfortunately the engine struck him on the right side, hurling him off the track. The victim died in a few minutes. The body was at once removed to a stable at the rear of Carling's old brewery, where it remained unidentified for over an hour. Shortly before 1 o'clock Mr. Thos. Hetherington viewed the body and was horrified to find his father cold in death.

for a \$100 Grant.

The Electric Street Railway Question Revived-A Proposition Laid Before the Committee.

Before the Committee.

The question of the advisability of making a grant to the Convalescent Home was debated at last night's meeting of the gaance committee. The matter was brought up by the reading of a communication from the president, Mrs. H. A. Beomer, asking that a sum be set apart for this purpose. Mrs. Boomer, who, in company with Mrs. Labatt and the matron of the home, appeared before the committee, made an effective appeal in support of the proposition. The home, she said, had been in existence for five years. During that time only 7 out of the 61 patients who had entered the institution from the City Hospital had paid the charges. The home authorities thought that, under such circumstances, they had carned the right to come to the city. From these figures it would be seen that the city had been saved considerable money, and that the home had done more in this respect than any other henevolent institution. They hoped the committee would see its way clear to grant \$200 for the purpose mentioned.

Ald. Parnell, after asking several questions about the objects and conditions of the home, moved that \$100 be granted. He wanted it to be clearly understood in doing so that this was not a yearly allowance. Mayor Essery seconded.

"Thank you, gentlemen," observed Mrs. Boomer, as she and her companions prepared to leave the room.

"The grant has not passed the council," remarked the mayor warningly.

"Oh," said Mrs. Boomer, gleefully, "we have every confidence in the recommendation of this committee. We will come back again next year," and amid the laughter of the committee's members, the deputation retired.

Mr. Hellmuth, of Hellmuth & Ivey, appeared to confer with the committee in regard to the extension of the street railway on Dundas street west of Richmond street. The company, in order to meet the wishes of merchants in that section, are desirous of laying a double track. They cannot do this without the cohesnet of the council. Mr. Hellmuth asked that the committee recommend a modification of the bylaw gi

committee recommend a modification of the bylaw giving the company power to act upon the merchants' wishes.

Ald. Parnell suggested that the question of electric motive power be taken up first. The mayor, in seconding this proposition, said that the company should not be granted any additional route rights until the electrical question had been settled. It should now be electricity or nothing. Continuing, the mayor asserted that the company wanted everything for nothing. Its representatives came to the committee meetings night after night and evaded the issue. Why

tives came to the committee meetings night after night and evaded the issue. Why had they not placed their proposition in writing? Could the committee be expected to consider verbal propositions?

A special meeting of the City Council was held last evening for the purpose of deciding whether Dominion Day should be observed on Monday, July 3, instead of Saturday, July 1. It was represented that a large number of merchants were adverse to the latter day. On motion the mayor was asked to issue a proclamation requesting the observance Monday as the Dominion's natal day.

The possibility of the Grand Trunk car sequence of the offer of a bonus of \$100,000 to the company by that town, has revived the question of whether or not it is possible for London to resume negotiations for the concentration of theshops at this city.

The company asked, and the city agreed, that a six weeks' shut-down, because of slackness in any one year, should not be regarded as a breach of the agreement. If shut down because of a strike, the time so shut down shall be added to the 40 years' period.

If burned down, the company promised to rebuild with all reasonable speed, the period of cessation of work to be added to the 40 years. The city was also given power at any time to inspect the books. Another clause on which grave diver-gence of opinion existed between the two

solicitors was clause 10. It enacted:

"The company may end the agreement on a month's notice, if they refund the \$100,000. If at any time during the continuance of the agreement any substantial breach of the agreement shall be committed by the company, the company shall be liable for actual damage or loss, if any, which such breach shall cause to the corporation, and if such damage cannot be agreed upon the same shall be recovered by action at law in the usual way. In any case the company will not pay more than the \$100,000." solicitors was clause 10. It enacted:

This clause was not regarded by the city solicitor as satisfactory. His proposition, which was rejected by the company, was that the words from "if at any time," etc., should be struck out and that there should

"If the company do not employ at least "If the company do not employ at least 400 men for six months at any time, the city shall have the option of demanding the \$100,000. The company shall pay \$5 a year for each man short of the stipulated 500."

Both solicitors agreed that the \$100,000 should be refunded if the works were abandoned; that the arbitrator should be the president of the Ontario High Court; that the contract should bind the company's successors, lessees, and assigns; and that the present assessment of the company (\$304,072) should continue for five years, and be \$350,000 for the succeeding five years.

A MYSTERY STILL

All the evidence in the famous Borden trial at New Bedford, Mass., is now in, and the jury may be expected to reach a verdict within a day or two. It is probably the most remarkable case of its kind that has ever been tried on this continent, and it is no wonder that a revolting crime, enshrouded in so much mystery, should have engrossed the attention of the newspaper reading public as it has done.

Briefly stated, the prosecution set out to prove against the prisoner that her father, a wealthy resident of Fall River, having gone down town on the morning of Aug. 4, last year, her stepmother having gone upstairs, and the servant girl Bridget Sullivan being occupied in washing the downstairs windows, she went upstairs and killed her stepmother; that she got rid of the bloody evidences of guilt and came downstairs in time to greet her father upon entering; that Bridget having gone to the attic, she slew her father, again got rid of the evilences of guilt and called in Bridget and the neighbors. It was endeavored to be proved that the woman was killed betweeen 9:15 and 10:15 in the forenoon, and that the father was slain between 11 and 11:15. This story has been difficult to believe even with the snatches of suspicious cirnumstances that were got together in evidence by the police officers. 

MESSIAH'S KINGDOM.

LESSON XII, INTERNATIONAL SERIES, JUNE 18.

Text of the Lesson, Malachi ili, 1-12-Golden Text, Malachi iii, 17-Doctrinal Suggestion, The Unchangeable God-Commentary on the Lesson by Rev. D. M.

Stearns.

1. "Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom ye seek shall suddenly come to His temple, even the messenger of the covenant whom ye delight in. Behold, He shall come, saith the Lord of Hosts." Some 400 years before Christ came, and more than 100 years after the restoration from Babylon, this servant of the Lord uttered his message. It is the word of the Lord to Israel (chapter i, 1), and about 25 times we find "Saith the Lord" or "Saith the Lord of Hosts." It has been called a miniature of the times before the day of the Lord, when ungodliness shall prevail and the Lord shall come. The last words are suggestive of Him who was made a curse for us. John the Baptist was the messenger preparing the way of the Lord at His first coming (Luke i, 76), but Elijah will be the messenger at His second coming (chapter iv, 5). John came in the spirit and power of Elijah but he was not Elijah (Luke i, 17; John i, 21). Had John and Jesus been received the kingdom would have come, but both having been rejected the kingdom is postponed. Jesus himself said that Elijah shall come (Math xvii, 10-13).

2. "But who may abide the day of His coming?" This is not the birth in Bethlehem, but the coming in power and glory. He did not come judging and overturning, but in great grace and love and humility, calling men unto Him, and instead of exerting His power against His enemies He suffered Judas to betray Him, His disciples to forsake Him and the Roman soldiers, at the instigation of the Jews to take Him and crucify Him. It will be the time of Israel's redemption, the restoration of all things of which the prophets have spoken, when the nation shall be all righteous (Luke xxi, 27, 28; Acts iii, 21; Isa lx, 21). The manner of it is given in Isa. i, 25-27, "I will turn my hand upon thee, and purely purge away thy dross, and take away all thy sin: afterward thou shalt be called the city of righteousness, the faithful city." See also Zech. xiii, 8, 9. Two parts are to be slain or perish, and it is the third part that is to be refined.

4. "Then shall the offering of Judah and Jerusalen be pleasant unto the Lord, as in the days of old and as in former years." When He came the first time, they crucified Him; then their city was destroyed, and to this day they are a people scattered and peeled, a byword and a reproach. 





MERIT CARD FOR BEEF CATTLE.

Suggestions For a Merit Register For Breeds of Beef Cattle. A member of the American Hereford association submits to The Breeder's Ga-kette the following diagram as the basis of a ment record for beef breeds:

The points or features of record as here proposed are made with the view of proposed are made with the view of meeting the particular requirements of the Herefords, but with some slight modification in these points this plan, it is thought, might be made equally ap-plicable to other breeds of beef cattle.



DIAGRAM OF MERIT RECORD. It is proposed, to begin with, that the body of a bovine be divided into parts body of a bovine be divided into parts something similar to the subdivisions usually made for a scale of points, and that each of these parts be designated by a number, and furthermore that certain numbers be taken to designate certain features of the animal, as color, markings, set of horns, general appearance, etc., as shown in the diagram herewith submitted. While some of the features here enumerated may be regarded by those of the strictly utilitarian turn of mind as not of sufficient importance to justify a place in the record, yet there are breeders who are largely influenced by and breed for what may be termed fancy features.

fancy features.
As the addition of these fancy features to the records of points may be made without adding materially to the trouble and expense of the same, it would doubt-less be thought best to admit them to a less be thought best to admit them to a place therein, and thus give sufficient latitude and scope to the work to meet the wishes of all classes of breeders. The drawing herewith submitted shows the outlines of the body of a Hereford and the proposed divisions of the same into parts to be scaled and the ratings thereof to be recorded, together with the numto be recorded, together with the number that may be used to designate each

of these parts.

In order to very materially shorten the record made of the scaling of each part it is proposed to indicate the rating given to each part and feature by one of the to each part and feature by one of the first five letters of the alphabet, these five letters covering all the degrees of dewest or lowest as actually seen (not idea) in this breed of cattle. With this plan it will be necessary for the associa-

BREED A ONE PURPOSE HORSE.

Choose Your Particular Hind of Morse and

What are the lessons to be drawn from recent sales as applied to our home interests? The most patent one is that many men have been breeding types of animals that are not suited for either the track or road, and surely not for breed-ing purposes. Many of these men have carelessly bred, hoping to get a chance racer, and failing in that expected to get a roadster. Such haphazard breeding does not pay and should never pay. There is no chance whatever of such a breeder ever being able to compete in supplying either the field for racers or for roadsters.

We do not care to be misconstrued We do not ears to be misconstrued and quoted as authority that the frotter is not suited for a roadster. On the con-trary, we do believe that the breeder who intelligently tries to produce great campaigners and racers will find a large proportion of his animals to be great roadsters, although not up to the stand-ard of racers. But remember such men are those that are breeding for trotters and not trying to breed several different things at the same time.

We are all agreed that the size, perfect conformation and speed are special re-quisites desired in the racer, and the same things make a good roadster when the speed ability fails to reach the racing the speed ability halfs to reach the racing requirement. Many racing breeders in speaking of size in the trotter sneeringly state that "they go in all shapes and sizes." This is true, but all of us admit that size is desirable when it does not carry with it awkwardness and too much belocher weight. This is an important height or weight. This is an important quality in the trotting ranks and still

quality in the trotting ranks and still more necessary when trotters are thrown into the road classes.

We believe the trotter the greatest road horse America has produced, but to fill the bill they must have size and attractive appearance, with style in their movements. The man who undertakes to breed ponies had best start with ponies, as it is much cheaper than to try and must be trotting runts off on the nublic and push trotting runts off on the public for ponies.

We believe a man can breed for a par-

We believe a man can breed for a particular type of animal and succeed best. If for trotters that can race, then keep that clearly before you all the time. If your specialty is for roadsters, let that be the goal to which all your efforts are directed. If for plow horses or ponies, breed what is suited for that purpose. Many of the animals produced under such intelligent breeding would be suited for other purposes. It is the man who is breeding mares that he knows are not suited for raising trotters to trotting sires, simply because they have no trotting blood in their veins, that we

no trotting blood in their veins, that we are striking out of business. He does not think for a moment what he is trying to produce, and generally raises a nondescript that is unsuited for any spe-

Examine closely your material before examine closely your material before trying to produce anything from it, and if unsuited to your purpose sell it, re-gardless of original cost, and start right. —Horseman.

National Pat Stock and Horse Show. The Illinois state board of agriculture has appointed a committee on fat stock and horse show, and the surrounding state boards of agriculture have ex-pressed a willingness to co-operate in a national fat stock and horse show and get thoroughly organized for November, 1894, as probably no show will be want-ed this year by the time the World's fair show is over, and most of the breeders' associations will hold their annual meetings during the World's fair stock show.

A general meeting of state boards of agriculture will be held during the horse and cattle show in August to organize the national fat stock and horse show the national fat stock and horse show to co-operate with the Illinois state board of agriculture that has so successfully conducted these shows. Much more lib-eral premiums will be given, besides state prizes to draw out larger state exhibits and larger attendance from all the stock breeding states thus identified with the management and success of the show, and a deficiency of a few thousand dollars can be easily paid by the several state boards, whereas the Illinois state board alone has heretofore had this deficiency to meet from their own treasury. It is proposed to have each state board of agriculture appoint their best live stock show managers to this work, and we will have a national stock show that all the states will be proud of—a show to advance the improved stock industry and not a money making scheme. Chi-cago can and will provide the building, but cannot run the show successfully.— Farmers' Institute.

A CREAMING EXPERIMENT.

May We Mix Last Night's Cream With This Morning's Milk?

A short time ago we were asked whether any injustice would result to either creamery man or patron if the latter should set his ovening's milk, skim it in the morning, mix the cream with the morning's milk and send the mixture to the creamery instead of sending the milk of both evening and morning, as is the usual custom. The most satisfactory way to answer all such queries is by practical demonstrations, and it was determined to conduct an experiment bearing on the point in question.

Milk was taken immediately after

milking and set in Cooley cans in water at a temperature of 42 degrees. The temperature of the milk was 98 degrees. The milk set from 7 in the evening until 7:45 the next morning, or nearly 13 hours, when it was sammed. At that time the temperature of the water was 40 degrees, the ice used having reduced the temperature two degrees. The skimmilk was drawn off by means of siphons provided for that purpose at the bottom of the cans.

The first 11 inches of milk below the cream line were left with the cream.
The cream was then well mixed with the morning's milk from the same cows and weighed and tested. The following table shows the weights of the evening Table shows the weights of the evening milk, morning milk, skimmilk and the mixture of cream and morning's milk, the per cent of fat and the number of pounds of butter fat in each lot of milk:

morning's milk..... 83 5.20 4.81
In this table the fat in the skimmilk plus the fat in the mixture should equal plus the fat in the mixture should equal the fat in the evening milk plus the fat in the morning milk. It will be noticed that there is a difference of .03 of a pound, but with ordinary test bottles the per cent cannot be read close enough to avoid

cent cannot be read close enough to avoid such a small error.

A composite sample of the evening and merning milk tested 3.25 per cent fat. Where creameries are conducted on the separator system the general custom among the patrons is to take in both evening and morning milk and haul back the skimmilk. In this case there would have been 125 pounds of milk to be taken to the creamery testing 3.25 would have been 105 pounds of man 20 be taken to the resemery testing 8.25 per cent fat, as above noted. For this 4.28 pounds of butter fat, at 20 cents per pound, the patron would have received 87.6 cents.

By skimming the evening milk and By skimming the evening milk and mixing the cream with the morning milk there were 88 pounds of the mixture, which, as shown in the above table, yielded 4.31 pounds fat. At 20 cents per pound this would be 86.2 cents. That is to say, the creamery man would lose nothing if the cream and morning milk was delivered instead of the milk of both evening and morning, and the naboth evening and morning, and the patron's loss would be only the amount of

trons loss would be small or the left in the skimmilk.

Whether this loss would be small or great would of course depend on the efficiency of creaming, and this in turn

efficiency of creaming, and this in the would be governed mainly by the meth-ods employed in handling the milk. Whether it will pay patrons to set the evening's milk, skim it and send in the evening's milk, the meaning's milk is some cream with the morning's milk is some thing that each must determine for himself. The advantages of the plan are obvious. It would save hauling a large quantity of milk, and the skimmilk being always sweet would certainly be bet-ter for the calves than when the whole milk is taken several miles, run through the separator and hauled back through the hot sun, often souring before it can be fed.—Bulletin Iowa Agricultural Experi-

The length of time a boiler will last depends a great deal on the water that is used in it to make steam with—how much lime or mud is in the water. Some riters say that th blown out every week and cleaned out, and the lime scraped off the flues inside of the boiler. If very hard water is used. all the time, that may be necessary, but if rainwater is used—and every creamery ought to have a cistern and catch all the rainwater that is possible—it does the rainwater that is possible—it does not need cleening more than four or five times a year, as there will be no lime scales form on the inside of the boller, and every time you blow off and fill up with cold water it takes as ranch fuel as it does to do a day's churning.

If you have a cistern, you should run all the drip from the refrigerator into it in the summer, and if you use much ice

in the summer, and if you use much ice the water from the ice will almost run the boiler in the winter. If your cream-

the boiler in the winter. If your creamery is heated by steam, you can empty the return pipe into the cistern when necessary and so save all the soft water. A short time ago, after I had done the churning and was about through with my day's work, I heard some pipe burst in the boiler room and the water blowing out of the furnace. Upon examination I found that the feed pipe had burned out. The pipe had been in the same place for six years and had done well to last that long. It was put in the back end of the boiler, and every time the flues were cleaned out the soot fell on it, and when the fire was started the soot was burned off and took a thin seale off the pipe every time.

The feed pipe to a boiler should never The feed pipe to a boiler should never be put in the back end, as you have to take down part of the brickwork to get at it, but always at the frontend through the hood that forms the lower part of the smokestack, where the pipe can be seen every time you open the door to clean out the flues.—G. B. Lawson in Creamery and Dairy.



BUDS AND BUDDING.

rated Directions That Will Be Use-

Buds are classed as leaf buds or fruit buds. Leaf buds produce either leaves or branches. They differ in form from fruit buds in being in most cases longer and more pointed in the same species. In the early stages of their formation and growth all buds are but leaf buds. Thus, for example, on a young shoot of the cherry or plum of one season's growth the buds are all leaf buds. The next spring a part of these produce new shoots, and others are transformed into fruit buds that will bear fruit the following season. In selecting buds from one variety to be inserted under the bark of another, cut off shoots of the present summer's growth that are sufficiently matured to have well developed buds. Cut off the leaves except enough of the leaf stalk by which to handle the bud. The bud to be inserted is in the axil of each leaf stalk. The stalk to receive the bud should be young and in a vigorous



VARIOUS STAGES IN THE PROCESS OF BUD DING.

Make two incisions in the tender bark in the form of the letter T and raise the edges of the bark with the handle of the edges of the bark with the handle of the budding knife to receive the bud. Cut the bud from the shoot with a sharp knife so as to remove the bud entire with the little piece of bark, clip the bark off square at the top of the bud to fit the incision, hold the bud by the short leaf cision, hold the bud by the shot car stalk and slip it down into the opening prepared for it, binding the cut with some soft ligature to keep the whole in place, leaving the bud itself and the leaf stalk uncovered. In a general way, budding may

In a general way, budding may be done at any time when the bark will peel and the buds are sufficiently ma-tured on the new wood. The only tool needed is a sharp, thin bladed knife. A regular budding knife such as is for sale at any store where horticultural tools are lord; is shown at 1 in the illustraare kept is shown at 1 in the illustration. At A in Fig. 2 is shown how the bud is cut out; 3 shows the underside of the chip after it is cut out; 4, how the the chip after it is cut out; 2, how the hosisions are made, and 5 the bud inserted and the whole wrapped securely. The cut is usually made about half an inch above the bud to be removed, and the cut is made down to three-quarters of an inch below the bud, though it may be made shorter. A small portion of the wood is removed with the bark, so as not to injure the voct of the bark. not to injure the root of the bud. smooth cuts; fit the bud to the incision as closely as possible and wrap secure ly, so as to exclude air and water.

Chaste and Pleasing Design For a \$2,800 Dwelling.

Unless great care is taken in the selection of the plans the cost of a building frequently exceeds the first stipulated limit of cost, and the result is disappointing to the owner and unpleasant for all concerned. Queen Anne houses cost more than colonial or hybrid designs of the same area of plans, especially where elaborate details are re-




PERSPECTIVE VIEW. quired. Here is a neat little house which may be classed as a simple treatment of a Queen Anne cottage. All the room is used to good advantage, and the building is well finished throughout, with a cellar underunisned throughout, with a ceilar under-neath the whole structure and a good fur-nace which sends ample heat to all the principal rooms.


The foundation walls are of stone laid up in cement mortar. Above the foundation walls the structure is of wood. Side walls and roofs are sheathed with tongued and grooved stuff and covered with water-proof sheathing paper, elapboarded in the first story, with side walls in the second story and all gables and roofs shingled with best quality white pine shingles. There is a wide veranda across the front and along one side of the hall. This veranda is roofed by extending the main roof of the building over the same. The lower ends of the rafters rest upon astrong plate, which is supported by neat columns in keeping with the style of architecture. The space between the columns is ornamented by a ralling in harmony with the whole. rice is shut off from the dining room, thus making it possible to utilize the entire space in the parlor, hall and dining room when desired. The special feature of the hall is the handsome staircase, with a pretty stained glass window over the lower landing. Stained glass may be pretty without being expensive. Amber colored glass, with small corner picess of ruby, is a simple combination, but very rich in interior effect.

The staircase and all woodwork in the hall are of selected dry ash. The parlor and dining room are finished in chestnut, selected for its beauty of grain, all thoroughly kiln dried. The floors in both stories are of yellow pine, as is also the kitchen woodwork. The doors in the first story are of ash and chestnut finish. All woodwork in the first story is filled with a good wood filler and varnished two coats with best coach varnish and rubbed smooth. The woodwork and doors in the second story are of white pine painted in two coats. The inside walls and ceilings in both stories are hard finished on two coats of plaster, with ornamental center pieces and cornices.

The exterior of this cottage is well broken by gables and dormer windows, which, with the long sloping line of roof which extends over the veranda, give a most pleasing appearance. The roofs are second story and clapboards in first story a light drab, with dark drab trimmings, with

light drab, with dark drab trimmings, with moldings and sash picked out in bright red. The effect of the whole is chaste and pleasing to people of refinement. If so desired, a comfortable bathroom could be added in the second story at small cost.

The hardware in the first story is of bronze; in the second story bronzed iron with jet knobs. This house, with heating, etc., and bathroom complete, would cost about \$2,500. Without the bathroom it could be built for \$2,500.

Will it be sufficient to serve notices of sale on the infant and adult children and when the time in notices mentioned clapses unheeded to proceed with the sale? ANS —You are liable to contribute to the extent of your note or undertaking for the winding up of the company. Whether you should now pay or not is a question upon which you hadbetter consultalawyer. The fact that you owed no call or assessment at the date of the failure does not necessarily relieve you from liability.

WEST DULUTH, MINN.—Is the will legal of a father who leaves one child out and does not mention his name in the will and

West Duluth, Minn.—Is the will legal of a father who leaves one child out and does not mention his name in the will, and can that child come in for a share of his father's property and break the will? Ans.—The will is legal. A man can legally will his property to whom he pleases, and the fact that he leaves none to his family, or to some of them only, is no ground of itself for setting aside the will. That one child is not mentioned in the will might, coupled with other facts, be evidence of fraud and improper influence, which would be a ground for having the will declared void. It is not, however, the fact that one child gets nothing by the will, but that the testator has been by fraud induced to make his will in a certain way, which would justify the court in setting it aside as void. If the will stands, the child of course gets no share of his father's centare. Your former question did not put the matter clearly before us. before us.

Widow .- My husband died and left 50 Widow.—My husband died and left 50 acres, the homostead, to his son, and 50 acres to his daughter, each having to give me so much, and the son had the use of all the personal property during my lifetime for keeping me. The sale of the farm would not apparently affect your allowance, which is a charge on the tarm. You had better consult a solicitor.
