Even in politics, he hears "bribery and indirect and direct corruption more than hinted at." Of course, his ears would never have been profaned with such a suggestion in the good old times twenty years ago. Bribery was then unknown in politics. These things we find printed in our histories about the Pacific scandal, the printing contracts, the unseating of members open bribery under laws much laxer than we now have, and that sort of thing, are probably fiction in the opinion of Sir Gilbert, and no one is a bet-

ter judge of fiction. However, Sir Gilbert does bring one charge against us to which we must plead guilty. "Art stands where it did twenty years ago," he says. "A few private collectors in Montreal and Toronto have gathered together pictures of value from Europe, but the public of Canada cannot today see a single permanent collection of even good water-color drawings, to say nothing of oils, by modern masters even. It is little less than a disgrace that Canada should not have an art gallery-I do not mean a building alone, as some of the Canadian newspapers have suggested that I meant, but a collection of pictures of merit and worth drawn from the capitals of the world, and reinforced by pictures from Canadian artists who reach the necessary standard - and there is only one standard for art."

He tells us that there are three really good art galleries in Australia, and that our sister colony spends at least \$30,000 yearly for pictures by such men as Alma-Tadema, Leighton, Millais, Lenback and others. 
