Sir Gilbert Parker on Canada.

[From the Montreal Star.] Sir Gilbert Parker contributes to the current Canadian Magazine some reflections on how his native land struck him on his return to it this last summer after twenty years of life elsewhere.

There is something in the beauty of the landscape moved him to poetry, but the moral beauty of our people attracted his attention chiefly by its absence. Having associated of late with publishers and politicians, he thinks that our commercial morality is not as high as he remembers it to have been twenty years ago.

Even in politics, he hears "bribery and indirect and direct corruption more than hinted at." Of course, his ears would never have been profaned with such a suggestion in the good old times twenty years ago.

However, Sir Gilbert does bring one cheering message to us to which we must plead guilty. "It stands where it did twenty years ago," he says. "A few private collectors in Montreal and Toronto have gathered together pictures of value in Europe, but the public of Canada cannot today see a single permanent collection of even good color drawings, to say nothing of oils, by modern masters even."

He tells us that there are three really good art galleries in Australia, and that our sister colony spends at least \$30,000 yearly for pictures by such men as Albert Leighton, Miles, Leback and others. "Yet Canada has not a single great picture gallery by the nation, nor a national gallery, nor an invention, save this necessary education of the higher and finer faculties of the people."

He is not only true; it is serious. We shall never make a nation of this kind in any lasting sense if we do not create in it a spirit of national art and national literature—a spirit which will be conscious of itself as the soul of the nation.

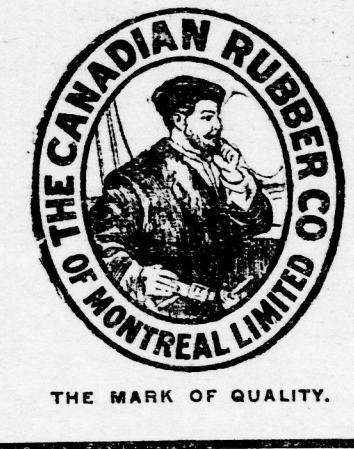
