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2,500 STRIKERS MEET DEATH BY CHILEAN MACHINE GUNS

Awful Havoc By Government Forces in a Great Conflict at Nitrat Beds---Unarmed Mob Ruthlessly Cut To Pieces

Upon Defying the Troops.

San Francisco, March 12 .- Machine guns, operated by the Government forces of Chile in a great conflict with strikers at the nitrate beds, and in the city of Iquique, laid 2,500 men low, most of whom were killed, according to advices received yesterday, by the Norwegian steamer Christian Bors, which arrived today direct from Chile.

Business at Iquique, which had never before been seriously disturbed by anything but earthquakes, was paralyzed when the great army of workers went on a strike. One fracas after another occurred, until soldiers and strikers met in the streets of Iquique and on the outskirts and openly de-

Being ordered to disperse the army of men, the soldiers opened fire. The mob had little opportunity to fight back, even though it had been armed, the assault was so sudden. This took place on Jan. 1, and a week later, as though by common agreement, the strikers went back to work without the expected advance in wages. It was reported that the mine owners will voluntarily increase the pay of many of their employes.

DR. ARNOTT BADLY INJURED IN A RUNAWAY ACCIDENT

Axle of Buggy Broke Crossing the Street Railway Tracks at the Cornes of St James and Richmond Streets and the Horse Ran Away.

Dr. David Arnott, of Queen's avenue, had a narrow escape from death this morning about 11 o'clock, when the front axle of his buggy broke as he was turning on to Richmond street from St. James street.

At that point there is a drop of several inches from the ice which covers the street, to the street car tracks, and the drop proved too much

CLUNG TO THE REINS.

Dr. Arnott was not thrown out when the axle first broke, and managed to cling to the reins until Oxford street had been reached. The horse in the meantime had become madly frightened by the

bumping of the trailing buggy on his heels, and was going at a terrific

Near Oxford street the animal veered, and the buggy crashed into a farge tree at the side of the street, with such force that Dr. Arnott was thrown to the street, alighting on his head, and being severely injured. The buggy was totally demolished.

The horse was injured badly. WAS UNCONSCIOUS.

For some time after the accident Dr. Arnott lay unconscious in the street, and it was thought at first that he was dead.

Passers-by picked the injured man up and he was taken to Dr. Thompson's office.

The latter was out, however, and Dr. W. J. Tillmann attended the

The doctor found that by a miracle no bones had been broken, but that Dr. Arnott had suffered a number of bad cuts about the head, several infuries to the spine and back, as well as a large number of bruises. . Dr. Arnott is also suffering severely from the shock, and it will be a long time before he will be able to be out again.

When questioned after attending Dr. Arnott, Dr. Tillmann expressed his views on the cause of the accident very forcibly.

THE CAUSE.

"I consider it a perfect outrage the way the street car company is allowed to leave the city streets," said he, "and it is distinctly up to somebody to see that the danger is removed before someone meets with death. "The drop from the ice along the streets to the street car tracks in some places is five or six inches, and at the point where the accident occurred it was at least four or five.

"How Dr. Arnott escaped instant death, when the buggy struck that tree at the high rate of speed it was going, is more than I can conjec-

"It is criminal to leave the streets in the condition they are now in."



OPPOSES EXPORT OF PULP WOOD

Conservative Member for West Huron Wants Prohibitive Tax on Product.

Cttawa, March 11. - Mr. E. N. Lewis (West Huron) today introduced in the House of Commons a resolution in regard to the duty on pulpwood, as follows: "That in the opinion of this House such an export duty should be placed on the export of pu!pwood as will be sufficient to induce its manufacture into paper in Canada, and thus save to the labor of Canada the six millions of dollars now lost." In supporting his resolution. Mr. Lewis quoted President Roosevelt on the timber and pulp question. No other question, he said, was of equal gravity. Mr. Lewis said Canadians had no desire for concessions from across the border. "All we wish," he said, "is that the product of our forest shall be manufactured in Canada and then shipped to

them." The experience of the United States in using up its great forest wealth was, he said, a lesson to Canada. 

BARS DEATH PENALTY

Ohio Senate Passes Bill Providing for Life Imprisonmen Only.

Columbus, Ohio, March 11. - The Senate today, by a vote of 22 to 9. passed the bill by Senator Schmidt, of Cuyahoga county, abolishing capital punishment. The bill contains simply providing that all persons convicted of murder in the first degree shall be sentenced to impris-

onment for life. A similar bill passed the Senate two years ago, but was defeated in the House. That bill made an exception of prisoners killing guards or officers, the death penalty being reserved for that crime alone.
