



LONDON, WEDNESDAY, NOV. 11. THE NIAGARA POWER BUNGLE.

Perhaps-some citizens need to be enlightened as to the present status of the Niagara power question, and the reason why it has been thrown back upon the municipal councils.

In January, 1907, nearly two years ago, the ratepayers of London indorsed a bylaw, empowering the city council to enter into a contract with the hydro-electric commission, by which the latter would deliver Niagara power at the city's doors, ready for distribution, at a price not to exceed \$23.50 per horsepower per annum.

No more was heard of the matter for seventeen months. Its interests are supposed to be looked after by the British consuls, who naturally pay less attention to fostering Canadian trade than to matters which more directly concern the mother country. 
