Thieves Active in London's Disease Has Broken Out to Principal Business Centres.

22,000 MEN ARE OUT

"Bobbies" of British Capital Have Sympathy of the Public.

PREMIER RECEIVES DEPUTATION. London, Aug. 31 .- Premier Lloyd George today received a deputation of the London police strikers. After the conference it was announced that proposals had been made in behalf of the Government which would be considered by the strikers this afternoon.

London, Aug. 31 .- Considerable lawlessness marked the first night passed by London without police protection. During the early hours of the morning there were some harmless demonstrations, but later on the thieves became active, and daylight found a number of windows of jewelers' shops and other places of business broken and consider-able property stolen. This was particularly true in such

centres as the Strand, Aldgate and other busy streets, which are usually so well guarded that shopkeepers leave their goods on view during the night. Some of these places were entirely without civilian police protection last night. There were a few military police about, but they devoted their attention entirely to their own men, and even if they had tried, would not have been able to cope with the thieves, who generally

worked in squads.

The strike of London police spread steadily throughout the night and early today a majority of 22,000 constables had joined in the movement. GERMANS FAIL IN EFFORTS TO RETAKE NOYON

Armies of Generals Mangin and Humbert Make Important Gains.

French Headquarters in France, Aug. 31.—The armies of Gen. Humbert and Gen. Mangin have made highly important strategic gains. North of the Oise Gen. Humbert's troops have crossed the unfinished canal and occupied Chevilly, on a hill overlooking the Valley of the Meve, and part of Genvry, in the hills two miles north of Noyon. East of Noyon, Mont St. Simeon was carried.

An attempt by the enemy to recapture Noyon by counter-attack failed. Mont St. Simeon, 600 feet high, which protected the enemy's right flank, was attacked at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. The summit was reached by middle afternoon, and the French thus established a great natural rampart upon which the enemy counted to guard his flank during the withdrawal before the attacks of Gen. Debeney and Gen. Rawlinson.

DOMINION'S OUTPUT

Fifty-Five Per Cent of 18-Pound Shells Come From Canada.

Toronto, Aug. 31 .- "Canada must provide not only men to reinforce our divisions at the front, but also munitions, foods, and ships," declared Hon. N. W. Rowell, who was guest of honor at the exhibition directors' luncheon at noon today. Canada is one of the great noon today. Canada is one of the great munition-producing nations on behalf of the Allies; the development and expansion of this industry since the war broke out is a real industrial romance. In the case of 18-pound shells, no less than 55 per cent of the output of these shrapnel shells for use on the British front in the last six months of the year 1917 came from Canada. Canada also contributed 42 per cent of the total of 4.5 shells, and a very substantial percentage of other shells in general use on the western front.

"It is the high degree of efficiency which the Canadian manufacturer has

which the Canadian manufacturer has attained in munitions production which is securing for him large orders from the American Government at the present time.'

Great Stronghold Is Taken By the Forces Under Field Marshal Haig -British Open An Attack On Marrienes Wood Between Somme and Bapaume---Advance Towards Peronne Continues.

MOUNT KEMMEL

HUNS ARE RETREATING.

With the British Forces in France, Aug. 31.—British successes on the Lys salient sector of the battlefront have caused the Germans to start a retreat from the neighborhood of Kemmel to opposite Bethune. The withdrawal is progressing rapidly.

Field Marshal Haig's men are attacking near Marrienes Wood, between Bapaume and the River Somme, which position is strongly held by the enemy.

KEMMEL AND MONT ST. QUENTIN CAPTURED BY BRITISH FORCES

London, Aug. 31.-Mount Kemmel, the famous stronghold southwest of Ypres, which was the scene of terrific fighting during the German offensive in Flanders late in April, has been captured by the British, according to advices from the front.

Mont St. Quentin, a mile and a half north of Peronne, has been taken by Field Marshal Haig's forces.

French troops made a small advance on the Ailette River and in that neighborhood, occupying the southern outskirts of the wood 500 yards southwest of Coucy-le-Chateau.

In the Lys salient, the British hold La Couture and Lestrem, and are west of Doulieu at Nooteboom. Field Marshal Haig's forces also have progressed a mile and

a half east of Bailleul. British troops have taken Mont-de-Lille and Kemmel Hill.

The British troops which captured Mont St. Quentin are now moving in the direction of Bassau, about two miles northeast of

KAISER'S TROOPS DRIVEN FROM POSITIONS TO EAST OF CLERY

London, Aug. 31 .- German troops have been driven from their positions east of Clery, on the Somme, northwest of Peronne, and the British advance in this locality is continuing, according to the official statement issued at the war office today.

CHANCE OF DECISIVE DEFEAT FOR ENEMY IN 1918; BUT NEXT YEAR HIS DOWNFALL CERTAIN

Brilliant Strategy of Foch in Series of Quick Blows Has Sent the Groggy Giant Reeling to His Certain Doom.

By Frank H. Simonds

(WRITTEN AUGUST 26TH.)

Substantially three weeks have now passed since Foch, having gained the initiative at the Marne, launched the first of his blows at the Somme, that of August 8. In that period we have seen a bewildering and almost unfathomable revelation of French strategy as contrasted with German. The events of the campaign from March 21 onward taught us the German method, the combination of men and material in a colossal and brutal attempt to win a decision by sheer force. The strategy was a strategy of mass, of momentum, the effort by the employment of the most gigantic machine military history has known to

overpower all resistance. Between March 21 and July 18 the Germans delivered three major blows, each of them accompanied by a comparatively smaller blow in a secondary field.

The greatest blow was the first—the Picardy offensive, in which not less than 110 divisions took part, followed at a very brief interval by the Flanders operation, in which forty additional divisions participated. The second blow, that at the Aisne, was made by far smaller forces, and its secondary phase was the operation above Complegne and almed directly at the seizure of all the Lassigny Heights. The third blow was the Marne offensive, which had as its main circumstance the attack between the Argonne and Rheims, and as its minor detail cumstance the attack between the Argonne and Meims, and as its minor detail the drive south of the Marne, which took on additional importance when the

As a result we had on August 8 the sudden blow of Rawlinson, delivered on Thursday and practically checked by Sunday. It broke through a considerable extent of the soft front from the Somme southward, and it enabled Debeny's first French army, to the south, to move forward on its flank. The result was the precipitate retirement of the Germans out of the point of the Montdidier salient, with the loss of 30,000 prisoners and 700 guns. On the whole front the Germans brought the enemy to a standstill by August 12 on the old Somme front of 1916.

But this dislocation from the Somme right down to the Matz had materially affected that portion of the German line from the Matz to the Oise, holding the Lassigny Heights, which were a vital circumstance in the new German front to the north. Accordingly, when Rawlinson and Debeny had done their work. Now, looked at from the broadest possible horizon, what does the Foch strategy aim at? Primarily it aims at destroying the organization and the morale of the central German armies before they can reach a position on which the front will become stabilized. Such a position exists in the old Hindenburg line. To this there is every reason to believe that the Germans are now turning, but the measure of the success of Foch will not be found in the territory regained when the Germans get back to their old defensive systems, but the condition in which they reach these systems and the cost to them in men and guns of their retirement. Don't look at the map between Arras and Soissons, as long as the Hindenburg line stands, to get any measure of Allied success; read, rather, the daily lists of the totals of prisoners, guns and materials captured. The ground is a desert, and in all human probability Ludendorff, left to himself, would have retired at least as far as the upper Somme if Rawlinson's successful thrust of August 8 had been a solitary blow and not one in a carefully arranged series. Between the old Somme front and the Hindenburg line there is only a desert; the man who has it behind him is the worse off, because even the ways of communication are lacking, while his troops in reserve are without cover or protection against the weather.

IS NOISELESS CAR WHEEL AT LAST REALITY?

Several inventions, characterized as "noiseless rail wheels," have been patented. Many of these devices are distinctly flexible, for the purpose of reducing the wear and tear of the rolling stock.

All inventions of this nature are said A Sound-Deadening Wheel Having a Flexible Pad Which Fits Like a Lining Around its Rim.

To be characterized by a noise-deadening and more or less elastic substance which is inserted between the flanged rim and the hub portion of the wheel, by some provision to prevent the rim from slipping round on the inserted material, and by guide plates on the sides to hold the hub and rim in alignment. "It is next to impossible to make the built-up" wheel as cheap or as strong Marcus C. Krarup in Popular Science Monthly. "It is almost hopeless to try to introduce a wheel which is, after all, only a little less noisy than those in use, unless it pays for itself from the start through savings in other directions. If the wheel is frankly intended to be flexible, it is well to remember that flexibility makes a constant demand on the power of the locomotive." Stefansson is looking well, but says it probably will be a year yet before his old-time physical endurance returns, when he hopes again to resume Arctic explorations. He was ill with typhoid at Herschel last January. This was followed by pneumonia and pleurisy. When convalescent, yet weak, he traveled four weeks with the Canadian Mounted Police and Eskimos with dogs over mountains covered with snow to Porcupine River, and thence to Fort Yukon, where he took treatment for 150 days.



From the Shetlands to the coast of Greenland and the Arctic Ice, merchant ships and trawlers ply their trade, regardless of the perils that beset them in drifting mine and lurking U-boat.

At the outbreak of war Britain possessed 10,000 ships. Addition of the fishing fleet brought the number to Three hundred thousand British and foreign sailors manned these ships, of which 15,000 have paid the supreme penalty of courage opposed by superior force and diabolical methods of warfare. Thrice that number of widows and children are the poorer for

the loss of their breadwinners.


All Records.
