Berlin, May 9.—The Berlin Thursday papers publish a summary of the peace terms which are condemned by all, from the extreme left to the ultra conservative right.

Dr. Theodore Wolff, in the Tageblatt, says: "Although we were prepared for a good deal, even for everything, we can only say that the treaty surpasses our worst expectations. It does not show a trace of statesmanship or of President Wilson's principles, but is a brutal, thoughtless product of thoughtless intoxicated brutality.

Dr. Wolff says that the occupation of the left bank of the Rhine for fifteen years "will within a few years create imperialism and a call for revenge in Germany." He also condemns the eastern settlement and says there can be only



As the new hours, if they are approved, and it is confidently expected that they will be approved by the minister, correspond to the present hours daylight time there will be no change in the time at all.

At the meeting the following trustees were present: Chairman J. S. Barnard, H. Hayman, Thomas Rowe, Mrs. David Williams, Mrs. Ronald Harris, W. N. Manning, Mrs. A. T. Langford, Edwin Smith and W. J. Tillman.

H. Hayman, chairman of No. 1 committee, introduced the resolution, asking authority to change the time in the public schools to 8 and 3 instead of 9 public schools to 8 and 3 instead of 9 to 4, standard time, and W. J. Tillman, chairman of No. 3 committee, sponsored a similar resolution, relating to the Collegiate Institute. W. N. Manning thought the board would make a mistake if it adopted the course laid out in the resolutions.

The secretary was m-structed to communicate with the minister of education and ask for an early reply.

TORONTO UNIVERSITY MAN ACQUITTED IN CASE OF RHYL RIOT

Gunner Elliott Evans Gets Off on Third Hearing.

WITNESS THRILLS COURT

Pte. Edmonston, Though Denying Participation, Tells All About Fight.

LIVERPOOL, May 8.-Reuter.-At the Kinmel Park court-martial today a Toronto University student, Gunner Elliott Evans, of the Canadian Artillery, was acquitted, after two previous hearings, on a charge of participating in a mutiny.

One of the most exciting incidents in the riot at Kinmel Camp was described by Pte. Russell Henry Edmonston, Canadian Cavalry, who pleaded not guilty to charges of joining the mutiny, and not endeavoring to sup-

On the afternoon of March 3 a party

On the afternoon of March 3 a party of men carrying the red flag was rushed and dispersed by pickets at Camp 20, which later was attacked by the main body of rioters.

Firing on Both Sides.

Though warned by the officers not to approach the camp, they laughed and jeered, and continued to advance, Pte. Edmonston said. Twice they were driven back, but they returned for the third time with rifles. Shots were fired from both sides, and in the raking fire men were struck. antil the rioters, some of whom were behind trenches, showed the "white flag."

Witnesses identified the accused as leading the parade of rioters, to whom he shouted: "Come on, boys; follow me." He was seen entering a trench later, going with five or six men behind a tree, from whence witness believed shots came. After the firing had ceased he was arrested behind a tree. He was hit in the head with a rifle bullet, and also in the right leg.

The accused denied participation in the riots. He said he was attracted to the scene while standing with a crowd of spectators. He saw a drunken man, who had run forward, fall wounded. The accused said he had rushed out and dragged the wounded man behind the tree. He did what he could for the wounds, resting the man's head on his knee, and wiping the blood from his face. This man, the accused believed, died later. The court called for evidence of character, and the accused was removed under escort.

The foregoing message was read from King George when the land chancellor and the Speaker of the House of Commons today attended the opening of the rooms adjoining Westminster Hall, and within the precincts of the Houses of Parliament which have been placed permanently at the disposal of the Empire Parliamentary Association, which acts as a connecting link between the mem-bers of the British House and members Permanent Home to Members.

Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancello Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancellor, expressed the wish to all who had disposed of rooms for this purpose that they might become the meeting place for members of Parliament from all parts of the Empire. Those who had visited the dominions knew the general hospitality invariably extended. They sometimes felt it was impossible to return with full reciprocity such kindness. turn with full reciprocity such kindness to those from dominions who came to London. This would be a permanent home for members of the dominion parliaments within the very walls of the mother of parliament. Speaker Lowther directed attention to the fact that portions of the walls of those very rooms were built by William Rufus. The Empire Parliamentary Association, with the exception of the imperial cabinet was so far the only link between the British and overseas parliaments. Whether in course of time it would evolve into something which would bind the differ-ent nations of the Empire more closely,

Sir George Foster Replies.

Sir George Foster paid a generous tribute to the abundant hospitality shown here to people from overseas. "Visitors came to us from Britain of many classes, but there are not many of each class," he continued. "We have sent you a million of our rank and file and you have receival every one of them with splendid, sympathetic hospitality. That is a thing that tells, and they will spread the story of your unlimited kindness all over their own country. Would you think it unreasonable if some times there arises in the minds of those who have fought for the Empire so well that they must ask for and must not be denied a share in government of the Empire which they helped to maintain. We leave that, however, entirely to the
