Charles Lancaster Will Appear in a Week For Sentence. in Local Court

ROBBED A LOCAL COOP

Old Charge Will Be Resurrected Also -Told Pitiful, But Fake, Tale in Court.

Charles Lancaster, who has appeared in city and county courts with unfailing regularity during the past few years, will likely be stowed away from the troubles of the world for a while by Judge Macbeth one week from today. He was found guilty this morning of breaking into and entering Alfred G. Taylor, of the Base Line, Westminster Township, about two weeks ago, and was remanded until Tuesday next for sentence. Some months ago he was convicted of stealing a number of tools from the same man from whom he purloined the chickens. Inspector Sanders treasurer, Mr. J. I. A. Hunt, presented the financial statement showing a balance of \$600 in the treasury. There was a very large attendance of members of the society. Sheriff Cameron, the president, occupied the chair. The election of officers and some other business was laid over until next week, when an adjourned meeting will be held.

In his report, Inspector Sanders stated that during the year the society had broadened out greatly, and had awakened a new spirit of helpfulness, and a new conception of the possibilities of childhood and youth even when most sadly neglected and way-

He gave a large share of the credit to Mr. James A. Stevenson, the pro-bation officer, who had done much for the boys of the city.

The "Big Brother" movement start-

ed by Mr. Stevenson had been an unqualified success, and had been in strumental in saving many boys. The inspector also paid a tribute to the value of suggestions given to the society by Mr. and Mrs. J. I. A. Hunt. Work of the Year.

During the year 110 children had passed through Inspector Sanders' hands. There were 14 in the Shelter at the beginning of the year, 21 had peen returned from foster homes-6 had been delivered by guardians into the society's care, 14 had been given by parents, 16 were taken from the juvenile courts, 6 had been taken off the street, 9 had come from Middlesex County, and 20 from adjoining counties, while 3 Barnardo boys had been ARE TOLSTOITES taken can the list. taken care of. GOOD FUEL PROCURED FROM ANCIENT PAPYRUS

Reeds On the Nile To Be Used For New Purpose By the Sudan Government.

London, Dec. 13. - The announcement that good fuel can be made out of the raw material of which the ancient Egyptians manufactured their paper may strike one as odd. An Anglo-German syndicate has just been formed to compress into briquettes the rank growths of papyrus and other reeds, locally known as sudd, which cover an area of 35,000 square miles on the Upper Nile and obstruct navigation.

Aged Member of Six Nation Tribe Sent to Kingston.
