

WANT BALLOT ON CATTLE TEST

Attitude of Meeting of Middlesex Milk Producers Addressed by Dr. H. W. Hill.

Cries of "No! No!" and "Put it to vote" were common when pasteurization and the tuberculin test were being explained to the Middlesex Milk Producers' Association Friday night at Hyman Hall.

The speaker was Dr. H. W. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health. He was addressing probably

the largest and most representative gathering of milk dealers ever as-sembled in this city. Dr. Hill explained that tubercu-losis was found in many forms, one of which was the bovine tuberculosis found in cattle, and which was easily contracted by human beings. It was unlike the form found in poultry, which could not be contract-

But even if the disease was not contractible by human beings he took as a supposition farmers should still be desirous of ridding their herds of the dread disease, since an affect-ed animal conducted the tuberculosis to other cows, and thereby lessened the value of the herd. 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



CANADIAN FISHERIES. What did Canada's fisheries vield n 1921?

The yield of Canada's fisherles in 1921 was \$34,930,935, compared with \$49,241,339 in 1920, a decrease of 29 per cent, owing chiefly to lower prices. The quantity of salmon caught and landed dropped from 1,294,729 hundredweight in 1920 to 878,124 hundredweight in 1921, and the total value as marketed in the different forms from \$15,595,970 to \$9,305,763. The catch of lobsters decreased from the previous year by only 6,360 hundredweight, but the decrease in total market value was \$2,000,052. Cod. halibut, whitefish. mackerel, pickerel, tullibee, perch and oysters show increases in catch

Little Port Stanley Church Links Up Past With Present

NESTLING in quaint dignity against its background of hills, Christ Church, Port Stanley, known and dear for nearly 100 years as "The little church on the bend of Kettle Creek," enters upon a new era of its existence next Sunday, when two magnificent plate-glass windows are to be dedicated, and extensive improvements made about the church will be formally presented to the congregation.

Time was when Christ Church was the end of a journey for people

of the little village which was growing on the banks of the creek, but the scenes shifted as the population crept nearer the lake, and now Christ Church stands just inside the

entrance to Port Stanley, at the point where Kettle Creek makes the last of its many twists and turns toward Lake Those who grew up with English gardens and the gray churches

of English, villages become reminiscent on a peen into the little graveyard which lies sheltered at the foot of the hill behind Christ Church.

Stones Crumble. Headstones, crumb-ling, and with the names

half obliterated, on a June day gleam from the thickets of wild pink roses, which have sprung up about them, and in the early summer a carpet of liliesof the valley covers the tombs. Tall trees cast a grateful shade,

and in the autumn bright sumach blazes a crimson tribute to the memory of the dead who lie there. The little church at Port Stanley has always been a source of in-

terest to the tourists who flock there in the summer. Entering either by motor or the electric cars, it is impossible to pass without noticing its tall spire, flashing against the green hill behind, and the beauty of its picturesque surrounding. It was in 1832 that Col. Bostwick donated the land upon which

the church was to be built, but it was not until some years later the building was erected. Finds Place in Hearts.

Since that time it has occupied a firm place in the hearts of the Anglican people near the lakeshore, and although at one time the parish extended over a much larger area, yet each recurring summer finds there a congregation, whose individual members during ten months of the year live perhaps miles and miles apart, but are drawn during the holiday season to the old-fashioned little church, with its impressive, somewhat old-world dignity of service.

For many years the Memorial Window, donated by a former congregation, in memory of Miss Arksell and Miss Morley, and depicting Our Lord as a Shepherd, has been situated in the chancel. Move Window.

During the recent renovations, however, it was transferred to the south side, and opposite it placed a second window of similar size. donated as a Soldiers' Memorial Window by Capt. and Mrs. Berry of Port Stanley, in memory of their sons, John and Joseph.

In the chancel now is the splendid three-fold Memorial Window

placed there by the Mason family in memory of their father and mother, who for many years attended Christ Church. It is a reproduction of Hoffman's picture, depicting the Call of the Fishermen, and of a most beautiful appearance.

A fourth memorial, a lovely marble font, is the gift of Mr. and McLeod of Toronto In addition to the placing of the memorials, the church has seen

many other improvements. New leaded glass windows have been installed, each bearing a church symbol. The organ, installed 68 years ago, and which has always been famous for its sweetly mellow and pure tone, has been thoroughly overhauled and new stops in-

Spire Repainted.

The tall spire has been given a coat of aluminum paint, so that on a sunny day it looks like a shaft of silver, and both exterior and interior of the church have been renovated and redecorated. Seven feet has been added to the chancel, and a music room and organ loft constructed.

A large basement has been added, permitting of separate class rooms, and a stage with curtains and footlights has been constructed, as well as conveniently-fitted kitchen. New electric lights of coral glass have been placed throughout and a new pulpit installed.

The present rector, Rev. J. R. Bythell, who was inducted a short time ago, and who has already won the appreciation and liking of his congregation, will conduct the Sunday services.



ittle Welshman May Change Complexion of Campaign At Last Minute.

,370 NOW IN FIELD

Sound-Thinking Politicians Concede Success To Bonar Law's Party.

LONDON, Nov. 3.-(By Canadian Press) .- An anti-climax of the election has been forced on the eve of closing the nominations by the puzzle whether Mr. Lloyd George will yet produce his 150 emergency candidates for a direct fight at the polls for the control of the next parliament. With twelve hours remaining to announce the decision, his headquarters are mysteriously silent, only 170 of the 1,370 in the field being

Prime Minister Bonar Law's camp is jubilant, believing that Mr. Lloyd George cannot produce, and that Labor's crushing defeat in municipal voting clears the road for the Conservatives to go in with a working majority. The question in all Eng-land is: "Will the little Welshman at the last minute work his wizardry by changing the complexion of the whole campaign?"

The soundest opinion already concedes the success of Mr. Bonar Law. Labor's preliminary rout has shuffled the political deck in such a way that unless the Lloyd Georgians have a remarkably strong card up their sleeve, Mr. Bonar Law will be able to defy suggestions of a coalition.

J. H. Balderson, in the Outlook, has strikingly revised his last week's

figures in favor of the Conservatives, giving them 330 seats and reducing Labor to 115. The Indepedent Liberals got 105, and the Lloyd Georgian Liberals only 65. He says this majority of the Conservatives, though only 50, is absolute. Yet the figures of such a sound prognosticator may be upset by a sudden movement of consolidation in the Liberal ranks.

Bury the Hatchet.
The Manchester Liberals signficantly buried the hatchet today in deciding upon unity of action be-tween the Independents and the Coalitionists, and this may have widespread influence before the 15th. If their strength elsewhere can be solidified English politics may see a handshake between Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Asquith, which would be almost miraculous after the long years of bitterness, and it would be a blow to the Conservatives. 
