Toronto, Nov. 10.—The death took place yesterday at Cobourg of George McKenzie Clark, K. C., for many years judge in the County Court of Northumberland and Durham. He resigned in 1887 to become solicitor for the C.P.R., which position he vacated three years ago. Deceased was 76 years of age, having been born in Belleville, April 14, 1828, was educated at Upper Canada College, called to the bar in 1850, and practiced his profession at Cobourg. UNITED STATES AS WORLD-POWER.

Phillips Brooks once said that when the American people acquired a due sense of proportion and perspective, great things might be expected of them. The will of seventy million people is a mighty force, but until it senses itself, it is apt to play havoc with the workings of government; not one man nor a thousand men can turn its energy to proper channels or adjust its expenditure in proper proportion to national and local needs until the individual units are willing to understand and to co-operate. The authority to control can exist only in the power to accomplish.

life of the United States can be traced more or less directly to the lack of this national characteristic. The vigour which sweeps away all barriers to industrial success and overwhelms competition by its intensity asserts itself but vaguely and without definite purpose in the halls Congress; the keen, concentrated intelligence which allows no business advantage to slip past unheeded has no time to spare for the business of cities or states or republics. Whatever sense of personal responsi bility the average citizen may feel for the Government under which he lives must thrive on the odds and ends of time he is able to spare for than in Great Britain. If the United States were a nation set off by themselves, it would be possible to view their continued existence as a badly governed people, with a sincere, but impersonal regret. Unfortunately their industrial eminence is apt to blind people of other countries to the fundamental weaknesses which threaten far-reaching disaster to the national structure. Until her citizens awaken to a common realization of their responsibility as individuals, the American Republic cannot be regarded as a reliable force in preserving the world's peace o promoting the world's welfare.



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

FIGHTING FORCE

Outsiders are not able to form ar Outsiders are not able to form an accurate opinion of the real condition of the military resources of Japan. Even the sympathetic people of Europe and America are in the dark on the subject. I have been informed by an intimate friend, who has been in the service of the Japanese army for three years, that Japan can call into service at short notice, 1,500,000 men of strong physique, besides the large national guard; for, according men of strong physique, besides the large national guard; for, according to his information, 539,282 men—which was the number eligible for conscription in 1901—had no objectional physical defect, and belonged to the first class, as shown by physical examination. The men who belonged to the second class had merely slight defects in the eyes or in some other bodily function. As for the naval force, 27.865 men—the tothe naval force, 27,865 men-the to tal number of seamen in the active, and the first and second reserve, services—are of the best physique. In case of necessity, more than double this number can be recuited from the

this number can be recuited from the merchant marine, as well as from the eager applicants for admission to the service. One million five hundred thousand is a large number, but it is a small portion of 8,034,098, which is the number of males from 17 to 40, who were available for conscription service in 1898.

Foreigners are apt to suppose that the flower of the Japanese saldiers and soldiers are necessarily the young men of the Samural class on whom too much eulogy has been already lavished. True, the Samural class have long been the flower of the Japanese tighters; and, indeed, most thousands of miles distant from Letitia's home. ****************** A FIRE-FIGHTING JOB COSTING 1,000,000.

One million dollars is being spent fighting the greatest subterranean fire that has ever broken out in the Pennsylvania anthracite coal regions. The fire, which started fifty years ago, has gained such enormous headway that at least two years must elapse before it can be fully extinguished.

Millions of tons of coal have been consumed by the flames since the fire first started. Millions of gallons of water have been poured into the mine from time to time in vain efforts to extinguish the blaze. There are still many millions of tons of coal which the flames have not yet reached, and it is with the determination of saving

them that the latest fight against the flames has been begun. No undertaking, like it has ever been attempted before, and as im-proved methods of mining do not now permit such fires it will probably be the last great fight of the coal diggers against the most destructive element they know.

Of this fire no flames are to be seen

No smoke escapes, and only the presence of very heavy sulphurous vapor above the many cave holes it has caused gives indication that hundreds of feet below the surface is raging a fire as great as that which has filled the heart of many a volcage.

The fire is in the Greenwood colliery of the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company, Iying in the Panther Creek Valley of the lower region near Wilkesbarre, Pa. There the mammoth vein rises in places to a solid sixty feet of the purest anthracite coal, and there too, are numerous other veins, less thick, but vastly valuable. It is these veins that the fire has been eating for the past fifty years, finding fuel incalculable, gorging itself like a great fiery dragon and leaving in its wake desolation and ruin. The fire is in the Greenwood col tion and ruin.
Where the fire had already raged

the immense pillars of coal which sup-ported the surface have been con-sumed and the surface has fallen in, great holes marking the flames' progress. Some of these are near houses and there are house owners who fear that any day or night the earth may suddenly open and their property and their families be engulfed.

their families be engulfed.

It is not to protect these that the operators are to spend a million dollars but to save from the fiery monster the millions of tons of good coal which still lie untouched in the path

which still lie untouched in the path of the fire.

A conflict, steady, stubborn, and painstaking, will be waged; a conflict scientifically gonducted, a conflict in which water alone would be valueless, but which, mixed with the refuse of coal itself is a deadly and effective agent in overcoming fire, HOW THE FIRE STARTED.

were ingited and which added to the
ruin being wrought. From that day
to this the mine has been in the
grasp of the fire fiend.

Hardy fire fighters then strove
with all their skill and bravery to
win back the mine. Some lost their
lives. The struggle continued. For
years it was fought, but greater and
greater grew the fire, until every

greater grew the fire, until every plan to cope with it being exhausted, the fire fighters retired baffled, Since then other attempts have been made and failed, and now for years the fire has had undisputed sway. There seemed no effective means of coping with it. sway. There seemed means of coping with it.

methods of fire fighting in mines have been discovered, and one was peculiarly effective. It was to pour on the fire a mixture of culm and water, which fills the fire-eating spaces, and forces back before a steadily growing wall the angry flames until they ing wall the angry flames until they are hemmed in a corner and crushed before they can gain force to exist. It was this plan which gave the owners of the Greenwood the opportunity to save the million of dollars' worth of valuable coal which still lies in the mine awaiting the fire, unfess the hand of man can quench it.

AN-INGENIOUS CAPTAIN

Many have read in Mr. Hopinkson Smith's story of "Cap'n Bob" who stopped a hole in his ferry-boat with his own arm, and thus saved many lives. The London Daily Express delives. The London Daily Express describes a method of stopping a leak no less novel and ingenious than Cap'n Bobs and not so trying to physical well-being as that adopted by the heroic pilot. The Norwegian bark Flora, bound for Cape Town, experienced in the Bay of Biscay such terrifice weather that she was obliged to lie to for six days.

In the buffeting that the vessel received she sprang a leak and began

In the buffeting that the vessel received she sprang a leak and began to take in water at the rate of six inches an hour. All hands were kept at the pumps day and night without infermission. As the gale abated the bark drove before it into calmer seas. Captain Mattson found the leak was getting worse and set his brains to work. He constructed a great water proof canvas bag, sixteen feet long, six feet in circumstance and two feet in diameter. This he kept distended in diameter. This he kept distended in diameter. This he kept distended by means of hoops. A window of glass was let into the side, five feet from the bottom. The captain step-ped into the bag, and by means of tackle was drawn under water, so that he could see the leak. The oth-er end of the bag being open and above water, he had plenty of air



London, Nov. 10.—(C.A.P.)—Lord Hugh Cecil, speaking at Newcastle, said as to the authority for the saying that preferential trade brought nations together they couldn't buy the levalty of Canada, by two shill-ings per quarter on wheat and a pennt per pound on meat. The foun-dation of loyalty was common race, common patriotic feeling and a common sentiment of devotion to a great cause. To persuade the colonies to become free traders was the only way to improve fiscal relations.

BURGLARS AT NORWICH.

Use Nitre-glycerine to Wreck a Pestoffice Safe and Secure \$200.

Woodstock, Nov. 10.—Daring burglars were at work in the village of Norwich at an early hour yesterday morning. With the aid of nitro-gly-cerine they blew open the safe of the postoffice and obtained over \$200. Stamps amounting to \$150 in value were taken, and \$50 or \$60 in silver.

Liberals are gathering in Toronto, but none will say a word. In fact the majority of them have nothing to say. It is supposed that temperance legislation is the thing to be discussed, but no one outside the Cabinet really knows.

The character of the dissentions over Premier Ross' plan to dissolve yesterday and appeal to the people are leaking out, It is reported that T. L. Pardo, M. P. P., for West Kent, was the one who really first blocked the plan. Mr. Pardo, it is said, for once donned his warpaint and refused absolutely to ahave anything to do with such a move and others tollowed his lead. It is said Mr. Pardo frankly informed Mr. Ross that his chances in West Kent under such a hurried move were nil and hitterly opposed the premier's plans.

ABOUT POISON IVY.

Frequently a person is puzzled to know whether a vine with which he comes in contact is poison ivy or Virginia creeper. The poison ivy has three leaflets and white berries, while he creeper has five and purple ber-

ries.

The only way to prevent a bad case reatment as soon as the itching sen-

or poisoning from the ivy is to begin treatment as soon as the itching sensation becomes apparent. If the case is allowed to continue until the pustules break the patient is pretty sure to suffer for a week or more. A good remedy is the extract of grindella, which if used in time by rubbing on the affected parts every five minutes will give relief. Sugar of lead salve is also a standard remedy. If a person who has touched poison ivy will wash the exposed part thoroughly with soap as soon after as possible, poisoning can generally be prevented. The poisonous principle in the ivy is a corrosive essential oil which is very volatile. It is not necessary to touch the ivy in order to be poisoned. Passing near it may be sufficient, and when ivy is burned the smoke is poisonous.

Many people are not at all sensitive to poison ivy and can handle it without fear while to others a mere

Many people are not at all sensitive to poison 'vy and can handle it without fear, while to others a mere breach of it is sufficient to cause troublesome eruptions. Poison oak and poison ivy are the same thing. The plant has a peculiar way of changing its habit of growth according to local conditions.—Pathfinder.

HOME-MADE HOREHOUND.

This is an old-fashioned preparation for coughs and that made at home will contain horehound, while the boughten candy has the flavor given boughten candy has the flavor given to it with chicory. A manufacturing confectioner once told the writer that he had never had an ounce of the genuine horehound herb in his factory. To make this candy, first make a rather strong tea of the herbs and boiling water, then add 1 pound of granulated or coffee C sugar to each half-pint of the tea and boil until it will crack when tried in cold water, Pour into shallow, well-buttered pans, and when nearly cold mark into squares or bars. One can soon tell how strong to make the tea. The fresh herbs are preferable, but the dried packages one gets at a ling store will do nicely.—Mrs. H. L. Miller.

THE WELFARE

MANAGER

Within the last few years there has been created in the industrial world an office now known as that of the welfare manager. It should not be forgotten, however, that this term was invented to fit an office already in existence, and that it was not so invented until much valuable work of a pioneer character had been accomplished.

This manager, who may be either a

or a pioneer enaracter had been accomplished.

This manager, who may be either a man or a woman, is a recognized intermediary between the employers and employes of mercantile houses and manufacturing plants which possess any pretensions to size and importance. Such a person represents the choice of an employer who would introduce among his employes improved and more favorable conditions, but who, hampered as he is by the complex ramifications of the industrial and social world of to-day, and unable to attend personally to every detail, finds himself obliged to summon to his aid the services of an intermediary between himself and those in his employ.

It is the employer, not the employe, who has chosen this intermediary and outlined the scope of the manager's work. At the same time, in order that his own purposes may not be defeated by the presence of too much friction in his establishment, he has been at pains, when making his choice, to respect the sentiments and prejudices, and sometimes even the dignities, of his employes. In no case coming under my observation has he failed to remove a welfare manager unable to preserve the harmonies. For such a manager, it must be understood, is unlike a superintendent or a foreman, and has no direct authority in the business, nor tendent or a foreman, and has no direct authority in the business, nor power to engage or to dismiss an employe.—The Century.

A PROVINCIAL CONVENTION

Premier Ross Decides to Feel the Pulse of Party Rank and File.

On Question Before the Cabinet-Meantime the Question of Dissolution is Shelved.

Toronto, Nov. 9 .- It is stated that Premier Ross has decided to call a Provincial Liberal Convention, and that members of the party have been immediate future, to pass upon the subjects which are now engaging the attention of the cabinet.

At this gathering Mr. Ross feel the pulse of the rank and file of the party, and will then definitely frame the policy on which he will appeal to the electors of the Pro-

Dissolution of the Legislature was to have taken place yesterday after-noon and the announcement made this morning, but a hitch occurred at the last moment, due, it is said, to the protest of certain Liberal members, who were averse to an early general election. These members, is stated, made such representations to the Premier as to induce him to come to the conclusion that the questions now agitating the cabinet-prohibition, construction and dissolution had best be referred to the party as a whole.

CALL FOR A CONVENTION. At a meeting of the executive of the Ontario Reform Association this the Ontario Reform Association this afternoon, presided over by Hon. J. K. Kerr, it was decided to issue a call for a provincial convention to take place in this city toward the end of the present month. This will be the first provincial Liberal convention held since 1883. Those who are entitled to attend the convention as delegates are—Liberal senators from delegates are-Liberal senators from Ontario, Liberal members; ex-members or candidates for the House of Commons, and Legislature; the president; vice-president; scretary and treasurer of every riding association, and twenty electors from each riding in the province to be elected by the riding association.

A VOICE FROM OTTAWA. Ottawa, Nov. 9.—The Free Press, Liberal, to-night says Mr. Ross must re-organize his Cabinet in order to win, and declares against prohibition in the party platform. Acceptable re-organization, no prohibition, and a rousing newspaper campaign, it sees no reason why Mr. Ross should not carry Ontario as he has no men of first-rate ability opposed to him.
