If ever a British general experienced—to use Sir Redvers Buller's phrase—"rank bad luck" it was surely Lord Methuen, who, after playing so brilliant a part in these protracted operations, was fated almost on the eve of the Vereeniging Peace Treaty to be wounded and captured by the Boers. This untoward occurrence took place while he was moving with a small force from Vryburg to Litchenburg. A panic seems to have seized some of the raw and almost untrained mounted troops, and though the infantry and artillery made a splendid stand, Delarey won the day. Lord Methuen, who afterwards paid a warm tribute to the kindness and courtesy of his captors, was, when sufficiently recovered, sent by the Boers into the British lines at Klerksdorp. Though it is more than five years since he received his wound, he still walks with a slight halt, which is hardly perceptible to a stranger, and which detracts not at all from his strikingly military mien.

"When I saw our latest leviathan warship, the Indomitable, launched at Glasgow the other day," writes a correspondent, "I could not help wondering what our forefathers of a century ago would have thought of her. In 1800 a leading naval authority wrote: The size of our shipe seems now to have reached its ultimatum. The French indeed have latterly built a ship of most extraordinary size, I72 feet keel, 55 feet 9 inches by the beam, tonnage about 2,850 tons. But she is pronounced to be entirely unfit for service." And yet this marine monster of 1800, whose size made her so unwieldly that 'she hathe never been out of harbor,' was but a third as long as our latest cruiser, little more than two-thirds the width and a sixth of the tonnage. In fact, she was relatively so small that she might easily, one would think, have been carried on the Indomitable's deck. Although a fifty acre forest had provided her timbers and it had taken 200 shipwrights a year to build her, her total cost was less than one-tenth that of her successor of to-day."—Westminster Gazette. ### CZAR TOOK INITIATIVE

Dismissal of Douma Was Resolved Upon a Fortnight Ago.

Stolypin Opposed the Proposal - Reactionaries Hold High Festival-Held All Night Fete at Which Champagne Was Served to All Comers-General Strike Not Likely-News Received Quietly.

St. Petersburg, June 18.—From a well-informed source the Associated Press learns that the decision to dissolve the Douma and abolish the former election law was due to the initiative of the Emperor, whose original intentions went far beyond the steps intentions went far beyond the steps actually taken. His Majesty wished to dismiss Parliament a fortnight ago and prolong the interval between the convocation of a new assembly, thinking that this would permit the agitation throughout the country to subside.

side.

He was encouraged in this attitude by court circles, but finally yielded to the argument of Premier Stolypin, who strongly advocated the convoluwho strongly advocated the convoking of the Douma in the autumn. The Premier also succeeded in having stricken from the electoral law provisions increasing the educational and property qualifications for suffrage and raising the age limit of voters from 25 to 30 years, working upon His Majesty, by what is disgustedly described by one of his opponents as "the bugaboo of reaction."

It is learned that the manifesto was drafted at Tsarskoe-Selo over a fortnight ago, only a few minor changes being introduced Saturday night. Copies of the manifesto reached the papers, with the date Tsarskoe-Selo uncorrected. It is stated that the Empress was one of the most vigorous enemies of the Douma.

Reactionary circles here are jubilant over the dispersion of the Douma, the Conservative deputies holding an all-night fete at the Conservative Club in celebration of the Emperor's decree. Champagne was served to all comers. The Emperor's decision was hilariously cheered, and ultra-loyal speeches were delivered. Ex-Minister Yermoloff, hitherto considered a moderate Liberal, in an oration, glorified the change in the Douma as rescuing Russia from the hands of aliens and Jews and restoring the power to the classes which heretofore ruled the empire.

Telegrams from practically every city in the empire announce that the news of the dissolution of Parliament was received quietly and with almost an entire absence of demonstrations. Even at Odessa and Kiev no disturbances occurred. The prefect of police of Kiev issued orders that no demonstrations on the part of the reactionists or revolutionists be allowed, and that no open discussion of the dissolution of Parliament be permitted.

Press Muzzled.

The order of Gen. Dracheffski, prefect of police of St. Petersburg, prohibiting hostile criticism of the Government, was copied almost universally throughout Russia by the Governor-generals and completely muzzled the Liberal press.

The Novoe Vremya, which has aligned itself with the reactionists, attacks the new election law as a half-way measure, affording the possibility that the revolutionary elements will again be able to enter Parliament.

A close study of the new election law, which is a bulky document of eighty pages, in complicated phrase-ology, has somewhat dispelled the feeling of gloom in Liberal circles. The idea is gaining ground that the Government has failed in its intentions, and that there is a possibility that there is a possibility that there will be an oppositional majority in the third Parliament, as in the case of its predecessors. Even under the new law it is thought that the Constitutional Democratic will retain control of the cities, though perhaps they will be swamped by the Social Democratic proletariat in the elections of the second and poorer cates or of the second and poorer cat tions of the second and poorer cate-gories of urban voters.



Its intent is purely pacific, the object being to assure the status quo of that region, which could not be altered without injury to the two contracting signatories, and the security of the communications of the respective outlying territories, which is especially important in the case of our possessions in Africa, and on both the Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts."
