TENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Tenth Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors and Friends of the Boys' Home took place on Monday, the 31st January, 1870, at the "Home," in George Street. A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present. Amongst the latter were the Mayor, Professor Wilson, Hon. G. W. Allan, Mr. John Gordon, Rev. E. Baldwin, Mr. Gzowski, Dr. Thorburn, Rev. Mr. Greig, Mr. Beardmore, Mr. Leslie, Mr. McCord, Mr. A. M. Smith, and other influential friends of the Home.

On the motion of the Hon. Mr. Allan, seconded by Mr. Gzowski, Mayor Harman took the chair, and said that one effect such a meeting had was to remind him of the flight of time, as it was a year since he occupied the position of chairman of a similar meeting, and he only hoped that each one on reviewing the year would be able to find such a record of charity to their credit, as was due to the ladies who had so indefatigably worked for the Home. He would call on Dr. Wilson to read the Report.

Dr. Wilson said that Mrs. Taylor had deputed this office to him, which he would endeavor to discharge.

ANNUAL REPORT.

At the conclusion of another year the lady managers of the Boys' Home have much pleasure in laying before their friends and the public, their Tenth Annual Report, feeling that they have, as ever, deep cause of thankfulness to Almighty God for the continued success which has accompanied their labors.

There are, at present, 38 boys in the Home. During the past twelve months 34 have been admitted, of whom 2 were

orphans, 22 had lost one parent, 4 were put in by fathers on account of drunken mothers, and 1 by a mother on account of a drunken father. During the same period 16 have been removed by their parents, 9 have absconded, and 2 have been adopted into happy homes, 16 have been sent on trial to farmers in the country, and are all doing well but 3 who were sent back, not giving satisfaction. Indeed the demand for boys by farmers is greater than can be supplied, as no child is sent out of the Institution under ten years of age, and the ages of those admitted are from five to eleven. During the last year five boys have been apprenticed, and the accounts received of them and many others apprenticed in previous years are most gratifying and encouraging. On one or two occasions the boys themselves have been brought into town by their employers, and the sight of their healthy, happy faces, and comfortable, warm clothing, has more than repaid those, who have lent their humble assistance in this labor of love.

Although no death has occurred among the children during the past year, the Managers have to record the death of one boy, Robert Whittaker, formerly an inmate of the "Home," who was apprenticed to Mr. Purvis, a farmer in the country. He had only been in his situation a few months, and was giving great satisfaction to his employer, when he became ill, and it was discovered that a tumor was forming in his side. As it was impossible to obtain regular medical attendance for the poor child in the country, Mr. Purvis requested that he might be allowed to bring him back to the "Home," in the hope that with the constant care and attention he would there receive, he might soon recover, and be able to return to his situation. But it was otherwise ordered. The poor little fellow gradually wasted away, and after two months of suffering, which he bore with wonderful patience for one so young, was happily released. Much credit is due to the Matron for the kindness she bestowed on this child, whom she attended with a mother's care, both night and day; and at the same time the Committee have much pleasure in expressing their satisfaction with her general management of the Institution throughout the year.

The health of the children has been singularly good during the past twelve months, and the Managers cannot but gratefully feel that this fact is attributable, under Providence, to the constant care and attention bestowed on them by Dr. Thorburn, who still continues to give his valuable services to the Home gratuitously.

The managers would take this opportunity of offering their warmest thanks to the Rev. W. M. Punshon, for the very instructive and eloquent lecture delivered by him in January last, in aid of the funds of the Institution; and for his additional generosity in remitting the fee, usual on such occasions. By this lecture was realized the very handsome sum of \$544, which enabled the Committee to lay aside a part of it towards the land fund; a large balance of the debt still, however, remained due, namely, \$294, and it is with feelings of gratitude and admiration that the Managers have to report that this large sum has been collected and paid in by the untiring energy and zeal of one lady alone, Mrs. Dunlop. Such an act as this is indeed worthy of record.

In the beginning of the Summer the funds of the Institution were in such a very exhausted state, that the Managers found it absolutely necessary to make some great exertion, in order to be able to meet the daily expenses of the Home. With the help of the many friends of the Institution, a Strawberry fete was given in July, by which the sum of \$142 was realized. In thanking all those who so generously contributed on this occasion, the Managers desire to make particular mention of the very handsome donation of 70 boxes of strawberries from Mr. Cross, of Oakville, and of the kindness of Colonel Spicer in giving them the use of the very efficient band of the Grand Trunk Battalion free of charge. They would also gratefully acknowledge the untiring assistance given, during the fete, by Mr. Michie and Mr. Mitchell, to whose help they mainly attribute the success of the undertaking.

Indeed, never have the Managers found the public come more willingly and generously to their aid, than during this time of need.

On hearing of their necessities, Mr. James Shields, of Dodgson, Shields & Co., whose contributions, both in money and provisions, have long been continuous, conveyed to them a cheque for \$50, for which they would again offer him their hearty thanks. Shortly after this, the Toronto Lacrosse Club most kindly got up a match with a party of Indians, in aid of the funds of the Boys' Home, by which was realized the handsome sum of \$50. And in mentioning this subject, the Managers gratefully remember that their thanks are also due to the members of the Toronto Cricket Club, for granting them the use of their ground on this, and a similar occasion, free of charge.

On the evening of the 11th of August, a fire broke out in the hay-loft adjoining the Boys' Home, which rapidly destroyed the whole of the outbuildings and sheds, and but for the great exertions of the firemen, who speedily came and rendered their assistance, would have communicated to the main building. It was truly an occasion of great thankfulness to all connected with the Institution, to find that, though the danger was imminent, the many helpless little ones dependent on this charity were not deprived of their Home. Happily the buildings were all insured, and the Managers would acknowledge the promptness with which their claim, amounting to \$322, was settled by the Phoenix Insurance Company. About the same time, they received from the Ontario Lacrosse Club the very munificent donation of \$400, the proceeds of a match played between them and a party of Indians, before H. R. H. Prince Arthur, in October last, to be applied to the re-building of the premises. The kind thoughtfulness and liberality of the Club displayed on this occasion, cannot be too warmly acknowledged. These two last sums, in all amounting to \$722, are now placed out at interest, and the Managers trust that, with some additional help in the Spring, they may be able to rebuild the premises destroyed, in a safer and more substantial manner.

The Managers have again to offer their sincere thanks to C. S. Gzowski, Esq., for his generous donation of \$100, to provide the Winter supply of fuel for the Institution; and to Mrs. Gzowski, for the very handsome contribution of 160 yards of cloth, which helped to fit the boys out in warm, substantial clothing for the Winter. They would beg also gratefully to acknowledge the handsome sum of \$50 from Benjamin Lyman,

Esq., of Montreal, and a large grant of cordwood from C. J. Brydges, Esq. Also the following grants: From the Legislature of Ontario, \$320; from the City Council, \$250, and from the County Council, \$100.

To Ald. Hallam, the Managers feel greatly indebted, for the bountiful dinner given to the children on Christmas day, and for the further entertainment afforded them by him and other friends, by means of a Christmas tree. Surely any one who witnessed the large number of bright, happy little faces on that occasion, must feel what a blessed thing it is to "consider the poor."

The Managers would acknowledge the many obligations they are under to the editors of the *Leader* and *Telegraph*, for the gratuitous insertion of all matters relating to the Institution, throughout the past year.

The Treasurer's Annual Statement of Accounts will be found annexed, and affords ample proof of the steady success which accompanies the efforts of the Managers, and the continued confidence placed in them by the public. They would particularly call attention to the contribution of \$40, sent by the Cabmen of this city, being one-fourth of the proceeds of a ball, and for which they desire to offer them publicly their thanks. To Mr. Hamilton they are sincerely grateful, for the unceasing interest he continues to take in the Home, and to Mr. George and Mr. Thomas, who attend the Home regularly every Sunday, for the purpose of giving religious instruction to the children.

In conclusion, the Managers would desire to thank the public generally for their liberal subscriptions and hearty support, and earnestly to beg a systematic continuance of the same. They trust that a work which has already benefitted such a large number of miserable, helpless children, will still commend itself to the sympathies of their Christian friends, and in aiding it, let all remember that "He that hath pity upon the poor, lendeth to the Lord."

MEDICAL REPORT OF THE BOYS' HOME.

I have the honor to present to the Lady Managers of the Boys' Home my Tenth Annual Report, and in so doing have pleasure in congratulating them on the present excellent health of the inmates. During the period embraced by this report there

has been but one case of severe sickness in the Institution, and that was of a peculiar and exceptional character. A boy who had been some time in the Home, left in good health, but in the course of time, prostrated by disease, returned to it, where he soon died.

I have paid special attention to the dietary provided at the Home. I find it good and nutritious, and its effect is soon apparent. Many of the boys when admitted have the well-known traces of poverty and disease marked upon them, but in an incredibly short space of time by good food, together with a strict observance of personal cleanliness and sufficient clothing, we see the sickly face and the emaciated form changed to full health and vigour.

In the carrying out all these arrangements so conducive to the health and comfort of the boys, very great credit is due to the Matron. The most is made of the means at her disposal, and with such excellent management, the public may have every confidence in the success of their efforts to reclaim and elevate many of our race, who would otherwise be uncared for, and would certainly become a burden on society and a disgrace to the country.

RESOLUTIONS.

Moved by Rev. E. Baldwin, seconded by James Leslie, Esq., that the very numerous and gratifying instances of generous liberality to the Home recorded in the report, call forth feelings of the deepest gratitude to the Giver of all Good, for having put it into the hearts of so many to contribute to the maintenance of the charity, while it inspires feelings of continued confidence in God's never-failing Providence and care over the little ones left thus dependent upon His bounty.

Moved by Rev. Greig, seconded by A. S. McCord, Esq., that in reviewing the history of the Home during the past ten years, the lady managers desire to record their sincere and devout thanksgiving to Almighty God for the gracious protection and favour vouchsafed to it during that time ; and they would express their fervent trust, that the Lord will still further crown with abundant success their humble efforts to make the Home a continued blessing and protection to the little wanderers, who, from time to time, may find a resting place within its walls.

The Mayor said that there was one resolution which he felt sure all the gentlemen present would be desirous of proposing, but as chairman of the meeting he could not move it, and the ladies present were debarred from taking any part in question. But he felt sure that the gentlemen he saw around him would relieve him on their hearing that the resolution he referred to was a vote of thanks to the ladies, who had so nobly and persistently exerted themselves in the cause of the Home. The vote was carried by acclamation.

OBJECT OF THE BOYS' HOME.

Duties of the Board of Management and Officers.

The Institution is open to boys of the ages mentioned in 2nd Rule of the Regulations, the claims for admission being the utter friendlessness of the applicant, or being a child of drunken and dissolute parents ; the object of this Institution being the prevention of juvenile crime, by training these poor outcasts in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

The management is vested in a Committee of Ladies, chosen from the Subscribers, at the Annual General Meeting, in September of each year; said Committee to consist of thirty members, from among whom eight shall be chosen as Directresses; and among them there shall be a 1st and 2nd Directress, Treasurer, and Secretary.

The 1st Directress, or in her absence one other Directress, shall preside at the monthly meetings, audit and sign the accounts presented for that purpose by the Treasurer, propose and declare the resolutions, and sign the minutes of each preceding meeting.

The Treasurer shall receive and keep an account of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as also the earnings of all the boys, a separate account of which must be kept with each. All the accounts must be presented each month, at the meeting of the Managers, for the signature of the first Directress, or in her absence, the Lady presiding.

The Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society; keep a list of the names, ages, and peculiar circumstances, as far as practicable, of all the boys, in a book provided for that purpose; attend at each monthly meeting, take the names of those present, and minute the proceedings in a book, which must be read at each ensuing meeting, and be signed by the presiding Lady.

Two members of the Committee, in rotation, shall visit the "Home" daily, each week; inspect the house; ascertain from the Matron the conduct of the boys, and enter a report at the weekly meeting on the Monday.

The Weekly or Finance Committee shall consist of the Directress, Treasurer, Secretary and two of the Committee, who shall have been appointed to purchase or otherwise obtain the necessary clothing for the boys. Three shall form a quorum, and their order shall be sufficient authority to the Treasurer to advance the money requisite for the above purpose, or such things as may be considered necessary for the "Home."

The General Committee shall meet on the second Monday in the month, at three o'clock p. m.. Each meeting shall be opened with prayer. The minutes of the preceding meeting having been read and signed, the vouchers of the Treasurer produced and signed, the Secretary shall inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place during the last month, and the 1st Directress shall put before the meeting such resolutions as may be put into her hands, take the votes, and declare the decision. Seven shall form a quorum; and when a tie

arises, the presiding Lady shall give the casting vote. All admissions that have taken place during the past month shall either be ratified or disallowed, at the discretion of the meeting.

As soon as the meeting is opened, all conversation not addressed to the presiding Lady, shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

Rules and Regulations of the Boys' Home.

I. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the boys; to conduct the household affairs generally; to admit applicants with the doctor's certificate, subject to the approval of the Weekly Committee; and she shall daily see to the personal cleanliness of each boy, and every morning and evening conduct family prayer.

II. Boys from the ages of 5 to 14 are admitted as inmates, and none shall be placed in a permanent situation until he has been one year in the Institution. This rule may be suspended under peculiar circumstances, at the discretion of the Managers.

III. The boys shall rise at six a. m. from 30th April to 30th September, and at seven a. m. from 1st October to 1st May; the time for going to rest being from six to eight p. m. Their meals to be at regular hours—Breakfast at eight a. m., Dinner at twelve, and Tea at half-past five p. m. Grace to be said before and after meals, by one of the elder boys; and all hours not occupied by such meals, or by instruction, to be employed, under the supervision of the Matron, in bodily exercise, house cleaning, or in play.

IV. All the boys shall regularly attend Sunday School, and also Divine Service, in a Protestant church, every Sunday, in charge of the Matron; and in the afternoon receive such religious instruction as can be given by the Matron, or any visiting friend to the Institution.

V. The charge for each boy of parents, or friends, who are able to pay, shall be \$1.50 per month, unless an exceptional case shall occur. If more than one boy of the same parent or friend gains admittance, a reduction shall be made, as approved of by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

VI. Prompt and implicit obedience must be given to the orders of the Matron.
