OUR total givings for 1893 were \$5.333-\$4.321 for congregational purposes and \$1,012 for missionary and benevolent objects. Last year our givings for missionary and benevolent objects was only \$670. The increase is marked. Let us do still better in 1894. " Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of these least ye have done it unto Me," saith Jesus.

THE Boys' Brigade and Young Men's Bible Class take up a good deal of our minister's time. Could it be better spent than on the boys and young men? You can help him in his many labors by not worrying him nor complaining if he doesn't visit you as often as you would like, or as he could before undertaking these extra labors. If you see him every Sunday and Wednesday (and you ought to see him on that night); is it necessary for him to be visiting you as well? And when you are sick send him word. And any time you want to see him about anything call at his house, corner Jackson and Ray streets, Wednesday afternoon, or ask him to speak with you after any of the services. He never thinks it a trouble, but rather a privilege.

EDITORIAL.

The Annual Meeting.

As usual our annual meeting was well attended, pleasant, harmonious and thoroughly interesting. Every report was encouraging See other columns for the reports in detail.

It was decided to continue the publication of the Echoes quarterly and to put the "Record" into every home. A grant of \$50 was made to the Church Sunday School, and of \$10 to the Mission toward expenses.

The question of employing a deaconess was considered and laid on the table for future consideration.

Messrs. A, M. Souter, T. H. Keller, J. W. McBean and Alex. Mitchell were elected managers for 3 years.

The elders and managers were asked to appoint ushers.

The question of putting a pipe organ in the Church was earnestly, but pleasantly discussed and left over till the adjourned meeting held on Wednesday, the 24th inst., at 9 p.m. The usual votes of thanks were given to choir, organist, etc.

We have never had a more encouraging annual meeting than was this.

Report of Session.

In presenting their report the Session would express their thankfulness to God for the many blessings and much grace He has bestowed on us as a congregation since our last report was presented. In all departments of the congregation's work there is unmistakable evidence of growth outward and inward.

While there has been a large addition to our membership during the year there have also been many removals by death, certificate and discipline; yet their remains a gratifying net increase in the number of our communicants after the roll has been thoroughly purged.

The attendance at Sabbath services has been gratifyingly large and steadily improving. At Communion it has been the usual 663%, though we feel it should be somewhat larger. At the Wednesday evening service it has been good all through the year, and much larger since the new year, and we hope the improvement will still go on.

The Session rejoices in the good work being done by the faithful workers in our two Sabbath Schools and would remind these workers of the Master's words: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto Me," and of those of Paul, "Be not weary in well-doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not."

The Session would extend its benediction also to the Christian Endeavor Society, the Boys' Brigade and the Mission Band, believing that work which will bear fruit for eternity is being done by the workers in these departments.

The Session also is delighted with the excellent work being done by the Women's Foreign Missionary Society and the Ladies' Aid Society. the one in developing an interest in world-wide missions, and the other a spirit of sociability among the people, making strangers among us feel at home, and helping in reducing the congregation's indebtedness. The Session believes that there has been a decided deepening of the spiritual life of the people and recognizes as one of the means to that end, along with the faithful preaching of the Word, the seasons of special services held in May and December. It is glad also to observe the steady growth in the practice of total abstinence from the intoxicating cup and in the temperance sentiment of the congaegation and community. It rejoices, moreover, and very especially in the evidences of development in the grace of Christian liberity and the practice of systemmatic giving of a fixed proportion of income, and would commend this practice to all the congregation as both scriptural and best.

Let us "thank God and take courage," and go forward to our New Year's work, determined by God's grace to "try more for Him and expect more from Him" than ever before.

We lay before the congregation a brief statement of the affairs of the Sabbath School, but one of which we have cause to feel proud.

The average attendance of scholars for the past year was 242 as against 234 in 1892. The collection amounted to \$239.82—\$175 of which has been set apart for missions, apportioned as follows: Home Missions, \$45; Foreign Missions, \$40; Knox College Students' Missionary Society, \$20; French Evangelization \$50; Jews, \$5; Girls' Home, \$10; Boys' Home, \$5. Total, \$175. The balance being applied to school purposes. We look forward to still larger collections and better attendance this present year.

Mr. Shearer's class for young men will improve our school in attendance, offerings and interest. Ald. Hall has resigned as Treasurer, after years of faithful service, as has also the Secretary. Mr. Hall is succeeded by Mr. John Keith, and Mr. John W. Gordon is the new Secretary.

Report of Board of Managers.

It is with feelings of gratitude and thankfulness that we present this, the .3th annual report. We begin the year with bright prospects, and we think all will feel encouraged with the satisfactory statement we now present.

Our weekly offerings amounted to \$3,234, being an increase of \$300 over last year, average Sabbath collection being about \$60.

The offerings towards the reduction of the Debt Fund amounted to \$560. Although it fell short of last year and only half the sum hoped for, still we must not feel discouraged, but strive to make a special effort to raise the desired amount—\$1,000—this year. Total receipts for the year amounted to \$4,003, an increase of \$260.

During the year we paid off the Booker estate loan \$400, leaving a balance of \$160, \$160. This, with the \$151 collected by the Ladies' Aid Society, amounts to \$311 to the credit of this fund; which has been deposited in the Savings Bank at interest.

Since our last Annual Meeting we have opened a section of the gallery and upholstered the same. Hope ere long that it will be necessary to open the remaining section to accommodate our increasing numbers. The ventilator, we trust, has given perfect satisfaction.

The managers retiring are: Messrs. A. M. Souter, T. H. Kellar, J. W. McBean, and Geo. Harper, the three former are elegible for re-election, Mr. Harper having moved to the Northwest.

We extend a cordial vote of thanks to the Ladies Aid Society for their handsome sum of \$151 towards the reduction of the Debt Fund. To Miss Edgar and the Choir for their kind services. Special vote of thanks to Miss McBean for her gratuitous services as organist. To the ushers for their obliging and courteous attention.

We would specially desire to return thanks to our Heavenly Father for His manifold blessings to us as a congregation and to our beloved Pastor, strengthening him spiritually and physically and enabling him to attend to the many arduous duties which devolve upon him. Let our united prayers be for a continuance of the same, now and ever, and that harmony and good-will may still be ours in the future, as it has in the past.

The Missionary Association of Erskine Church.

The Missionary Association began the year with a meeting shortly after the Annual Meeting at which a Programme Committee was appointed to arrange for the monthly missionary meetings and also a Literature Committee for the purpose of disseminating missionary intelligence. The Programme Committee, consisting of Rev. J. G. Shearer, the President and the Secretary, held a meeting at which it was arranged that these three would in turn conduct or be responsible for the missionary prayermeetings, when the latest information in regard to the different fields of mission work such as

Formosa, West Indies, China, the Jews, etc., would be given. Rev. Mr. Shearer took charge of four of the meetings, the President of two, and the Secretary of one, the other meetings being filled in with special missionary addresses from Mr. McArthur, Rev. Mr. McDougall, Rev. Dr. Paton. and the special services in Dr. Paton. and the special services in December. The Literature Committee held one meeting and arranged for the distribution of some tracts. The contributions for 1893, we are glad to say are about double of what they were in 18/12, the \$100 contributed at Dr. Paton's meeting partly accounting for this, but we notice a general increase in the givings to nearly all the schemes of the Church of the Church

The Session has agreed that for 1894, the Missionary meetings shall be held only once a quarter, but that special prayer for Missions and Missionaries will be offered at the first prayer meeting in every month.

Report of Ladies' Aid For 1893.

With cause for renewed encouragement and thankfulness, we present this, the sixth annual report of this society; but, before doing so, the ladies wish, especially, to thank our pastor for his many kind and helpful visits, and our honary members for their cheerful contributions.

We began the year with eighteen active members; during the year one active member has removed from the city and two have retired from active work. But to counterbalance this 14 new names have been added to the active membership list and 9 to the honorary, making our present membership 29 active and 119 honorary.

At our control meeting in February, Mrs. Hyndman was appointed as delegate from this society to Associated Charities.

society to Associated Charities.

In July attention was drawn to our fast diminishing Benevolent Fund, and in order to have something wherewith to help the needy, a resolution was passed whereby the active members were permitted to divide their monthly contributions, or give an occasional extra toward that object. Mrs. James Souter was appointed Treasurer of said fund. Out of this fund the society have at different times been giving aid: \$2 was given to get needed delicacies for a sick child; two coverlids were made, one was sold and the other given to a poor but deserving family, and \$6.55 of that

fund remains in the hands of our B. F. Treasurer.

The monthly contributions toward the general fund amount to \$151.75 with \$1.25 interest.

Of this amount \$151 has been handed over to
the managers, leaving a balance of \$2 in bank.

The average attendance of active members

at our monthly meetings was 15, and average monthly collection \$12.64.
