

SAFETY FIRST" MOVEMENT

IN CHICAGO A SUCCESS Public Lectures in City Parks and Instruction of School Children has Resulted in Reducing the Fatal

Street Car Accidents 75 p.c.

MOVEMENT IS BECOMING GENERAL

Safety Movement Bound to Come in Montreal, Where Many Meet With Ac-cidents Every Year, Through Ignorance—Campaign Would be En-dorsed by Leading Citizens.

That by far the greater number of accidents which occur in every city re due, not so much to the person who causes the accident, but to the person ho is injured not observing the proper rules for his own safety, is proven by

atistics. In Montreal every year there are a certain number of persons, the ma-rity of whom are children, that are run over and killed on the city streets, ther by street cars, automobiles or vehicles of some other description. At the coroner's inquests, into these accidents, probably in 19 out of 20 ses is "accidental death." the full meaning of which, is that no blame could attached to anyone in connection with the accident, except to the negligence the victim. of the victim

Sometimes it seems almost impossible that these accidents occur when notor cars and street cars are going at a slow rate of speed, and the conduc-or or chauffeur were sounding a warning, but such is the evidence which is enerally sworn to at an inquest, and must, therefore, be taken for as the left.
