Berlin Papers Publish Statement Evidently to Prepare Public Opinion For Eventualities; Bulgaria Now Taking Action

Austrian troops on the Roumanian frontier has resulted in the Balkan nation making preparations for eventualities. part of her army already has been mobilized and reservists in other countries have been ordered home.

A steadfast refusal of Roumania to permit the transportation through her territory by Germany of military supplies for Turkey is supposed to have aroused the animosity of the Central empires.

Recent advices from Rome were to the effect that negotiations were under way for the formation of a new Balkan league, to be composed of Roumania, and Greece. Bulgaria, it was said, was not included in the negotiations because of her agreement with Turkey by which she will obtain possession of territory along the Dedeaghatch railway. Montenegro probably would act in accord with the other three powers as she already is arrayed on the side of the allies in the
