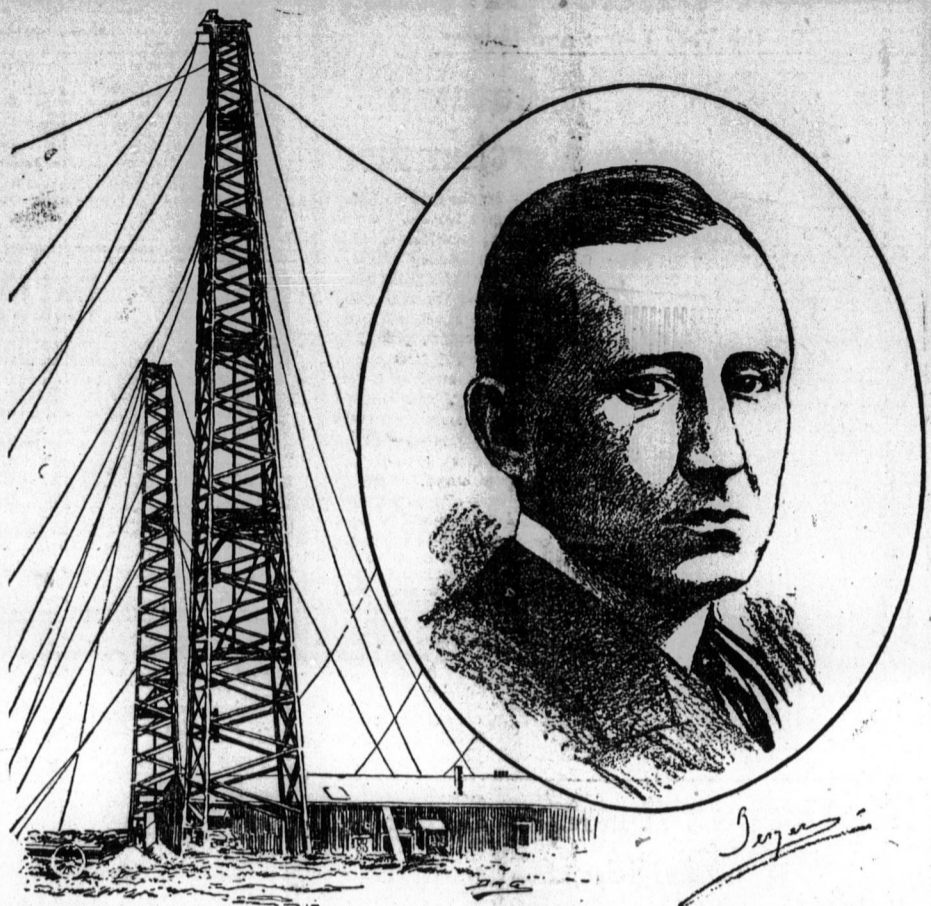

COUNCIL MUST FIG FOR \$12,000 MORE.

Board of Education Proposes to Increase the Burdens of the Aldermen.

Over 1,000 Pupils of City Schools Are Taking Domestic Science.

The Internal Management Committee of the Board of Education decided last night to again recommend that the collection of school fees from resident pupils in the Hamilton Public Schools be abolished.

It was suggested that a smaller committee might be appointed to take the matter up at once, but it was agreed to wait another month and give the committee appointed to deal with the matter a chance to take it up.

There are six classes a week from the Public Schools as follows: Commercial class from Victoria Avenue; Cannon, Hess, Central, Ryerson, Queen, Victoria and Caroline; also fourth book from Stinson Street, giving a total of 120 pupils.

Inspector Ballard reporting on Domestic Science stated that the girls in the senior third, junior fourth, senior fourth and leaving grades had been grouped in fifty classes. Of these 15 classes attend each of the following, the Caroline Street centre, the King Edward centre and Wentworth Street centre, and the Collegiate Institute.

The members in attendance are as follows: Caroline Street ... 337 King Edward ... 314

It costs us about \$6,000 for books and we get \$12,000 in fees. The surplus goes to pay the teachers and for other things," said Trustee Allan.

Trustee Callaghan said that he had been informed they were education-minded in Toronto, where no school fees were being collected, this being used as an argument for abolishing the system here.

Secretary Foster said that while there was a reduction this year on readers in the lower grades, that on the whole the supplies figured out ten per cent. higher than last year.

In a discussion over present prosperity Trustee Howell said the crowds seen on the streets and patronizing amusement resorts was an argument against the statement that people had a hard time making ends meet.

The increased cost of living is out of proportion to the increased rate of wages," observed Trustee Callaghan.

Mr. Callaghan said he found there was a shortage of about ten per cent. this year in labor. The abolition of school fees might make Hamilton more attractive from an educational standpoint for workmen.

While the discussion about Toronto and education was on one of the trustees remarked: "They have lots of Government pap there."

"I still have faith in the Whitney Government," was Trustee Callaghan's jocular comment.

"You are a man of faith," added Trustee Wodell, jestingly. "If you persevere you will soon be able to move a mountain."

"A very slow process," was another member's dry remark.

The committee agreed to recommend the Board to take up the recommendation which was referred back to abolish the fees, including those for the commercial classes.

Refuse Council's Request. After considerable discussion the City Council's request for the use of rooms at the coming municipal elections was refused.

Normal training was again discussed. In July a special committee composed of "friends of the Whitney Government," was appointed to interview the cabinet officials and see what could be done to get the Government to establish a technical institute here in place of the Ontario Normal College removed to Toronto.

None are secure from desperation; few from subtlety.—Byron.

While so far the services have been exclusively in English, German preaching will soon be begun and continued alternately with the English. For some time past, even before the mission, the church has been doing well, and hopes for a speedy growth and development are entertained. Rev. Henry Hansen, 59 John street north, is the pastor.

NO FEAR OF ACETYLENE. The Grand Truck Will Haul Cars of Other Lines Thus Lighted.
