

Lord Herschell's Death. OTTAWA, March 1 .- The news of Lord Herschell's death came with startling sud-Ottawa. It produced a shock at the Government House and on Parliament Hill, the more so because of its entire unex pectedness, the latest intelligence from Washington being that he was recovering. His Lordship resting comfortably in his apartments and in excellent spirits. F. C. T. O'Hara, Sir Richard Cartwright's secretary received a telegram yesterday from Mr. Cartwright, Lord Herschell's after receiving news was summoned to the Government House by Lord Minto and had only a moment in which to express his profound regret at the sad occurrence. Lord Herschell's death, he declared, was a distinct loss to Canada and to the empire. Sir Richard J. Cart. wright, speaking of the occurrence, said: "I regard it as a misfortune to Canada Not only were our relations with him most cordial but in all respects we found him disposed to render us valuable assist. ance. Both personally and politically I extremely regret his loss." Lord Herschell was the second of the commissioners to die, Hon. Nelson Ding-

ley being the first.



btain protection for their business, what that good men should demand that the defence and protection of the law should cease? And as the liquor forces are united in their demands, what is more natural or reasonable or necessary than that patriotic men of every name, and especially Christian men, irrespective of party, should unite in demanding the legal overthrow of this destroyer of their homes and enemy of the public good?

Yes, the liquor question is in politics, and can never be gotton out of politics until the ministry and the Church unite to put in out. And they will never put it out by pious talk nor fervent prayers; enemy, votes and votes only give the ultimate decision. The liquor question will never be out of politics till forced out by the ballots of free men emancipated from

In order to do this the pulpit has delicate and difficult but necessary duty to perform. Difficult, but not more difficult than some other duties from which it must not shrink. Men occupying the pews and calling themselves Christians must be made to see that there is no evil of society greater than the saloon and no duty greater than the destruction of the saloon. That the saloon must be outlawed, that it cannot be outlawed until a majority of voters demand it, and that this necessary majority can never be secured while men slavishly follow the dictum of the party managers who want the saloon

The pulpit must preach the duty of party. This is the solemn and in tive duty of the pulpit of to-day. But we are told again that the pulpit

ust not meddle with politics. By whose authority and in whose interest s this saying so flippantly bandied about? Who authorizes the pulpit to leave what-

are involved in the politics of a country like our own, it is treason to truth and to List Publishing Co., Green Ridge, Mis-God to demand the silence of the pulpit in relation to these questions. The pulpit must discharge this duty with truth and with love, and it must be in this as in all its ministrations neither an advocate

form of carrying L party measures. The pulpit should be non-partisan in fact and not in mere profession, and should not lend itself to mere party service any more by its silence than by its utterances.

But are we not in danger of falling into error concerning the relations and duty of the pulpit to political organizations and measures? Whence comes the widely prevalent sentiment that the pulrit must be dumb concerning political parties and their issues?

What law of God, what principle of

Christianity, what reasonable requirement of man demands the silence of the pulpit concerning any man or body of men, any society or corporation or organization whose avowed principles and open conduct vitally affect the interest of society? And what command of Christ or what postage stamp until tomorrow? principle of ethics exempts the organization called a political party from the honest consideration, on if need be, the denunciation of the Christian pulpit? Indeed the political party, because it

makes its appeal for popular support, is more than other organizations the legitimate subject of pulpit discussion. The contrary position is dengerous in the extreme. If a body of men organized in any other capacity promulgates theories perilous to the community and solicits public support, the pulpit would be accounted cowardly and guilty to maintain silence. Why then when a political organization adopts a platform that embodies dangerous principles, proposess "to frame iniquity into a law" and asks the support of the Church, should so many men demand that the pulpit be dumb concerning this matter? Shall the pulpit yield to-this unrighteous and perilous demand because a large number of party-blinded men

What will happen if the pulpit does heed this clamour? Suppose a political party advocates the legalizing of lotteries, the licensing of prostitution, the protecting of gambling-houses, the pulpit, in obedience to this imperious behest, must keep silent and allow these abominations

The question can be settled in the future by the test of the hydration of lime, which will give irrefutable proof of the validity of such complaint.



We have seen them advocated as a once-a-week ration with good results, but didn't know what the result would be if fed daily. Some thought it would be a fal-ure; we were told there was too much starch in potatoes for a steady diet and that the continual feeding of same would that the continual feeding of same would result in cholera; but determined to try it, we did. The day before they were wanted to feed, were placed in a kettle on the stove and there allowed to cook and hell until they were soft and mealy.

on the stove and there allowed to cook and boil until they were soft and mealy. In the morning they were again placed on the stove and heated thoroughly through. They were then mashed and enough water left in to make the mess very thin. It was then thickened with meal and bran until of the right texture, making about two-thirds potatoes and one-third meal and bran [The fearth.] and one-third meal and bran. The fowls were perfectly ravenous over it, and other food would hardly be touched if given all they wanted of the potatoes. A good big feed of this in the morning sufficed for the day, but they were also given a light feed of grain at night. The diet was kept up all winter and now no heavier weighing lot of birds of the same breed can be found in any man's yard.

White Specks in Butter. Mottles in butter and "white specks" are sometimes confounded, and by some are considered the same, but there is a difference. Mottled or streaky butter has been explained as being caused by an unequal distribution of the salt; but "white specks" have a different cause or causes. Sometimes, when the milk is set in shallow pans, they result from the cream drying on top, so there are small portions that are so hard they do not churn into butter, and the "specks" are thus caused. This may be remedied by carefully straining the cream when it is put into the churn.

Another cause of "white specks" is

this: When some milk is skimmed off with the cream, as is usually done in the case of deep cold-setting, this milk settles to the bottom, gets over-ripe, and forms a curd, which will be so hard as not to break up in churning and will not run off with the buttermik, but will remain with the butter as "white specks," as they are sometimes called. This can be remedied by not letting the cream stand so long before churning, or by frequent and thorough stirring of the ream during the process of ripening. These hard white particles can also be taken bard, white particles can also be taken out by straining the cream.
