Public Works Report
In the account of the work done in this Province during the fiscal year ended June 30th, 1914, contained in a special report of the Minister of Public Works for the Dominion, lately to hand are the following:

The "Prince Edward" deepened the berth alongside the railway at Charlottetown; made a basin at Red Bank Wharf; opened a new 900 feet long to the east of the existing wharf; cut a channel 840 feet long and 37 feet wide at bank at North Ruston; and later in the year made a further cut 1,165 feet in length and from 114 to 160 feet wide at the same harbor; and removed a "middle ground" of 200,000 cubic yards from the harbor.

The pier at Annandale, King's County, was repaired to the amount of \$275,311; the pier at Chapel Point, Grand River, was under contract for a new span and block and other repairs; but the work was only half done at the close of the fiscal year. The pier at St. John's was under contract for considerable repairs; Hickey's pier was repaired to the extent of \$500. Repairs were also made to the pier at Kier's shore, Malpas and to Lambert's pier, Montserrat.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT
