Lord Beresford Declares Burden of Armaments is Due to Britain Becoming the Bully of the Seas

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 28.—At the Canadian Club luncheon, Lord Charles Beresford criticized the policy of the British navy administration in abandoning Esquimalt as a naval base in common with our other "Overseas bases during a certain period of insane naval administration.'

He also criticized the "Declaration of London," stating that it weakened the British naval organization over trade routes. He said the Declaration of London was "conceived in a moment of aberration and would result in an already weakened spot in the British naval organization being made weaker. Since the cruisers were taken off, the trade routes had been converted into a "gigantic danger."

Lord Charles Beresford referred to the growing burden of armaments, stating that it was due to Britain becoming the "bully of the seas." When dreadnoughts were put forward it induced other nations to

compete in an "insane competition of armaments." He believed that reciprocity, had it passed, would not have meant annexation.

His condition was so rabid that several hospitals refused to admit him, owing to his hopeless state. Finally he was taken into the county hospital. This afternoon the child was unconscious under the influence of the drug.


