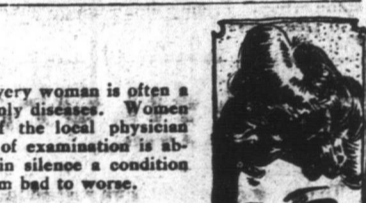

Dynamiters Try to Destroy Part of the New Viaduct

New York, September 14.—Dynamiters' last night blew up one of the sections of the viaduct of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, just east of Columbus Avenue, in Mount Vernon.

It is believed that a deliberate attempt was made to destroy one of the main sections of the new four-track "electric rapid transit" system which the new corporation is constructing.

According to information received by Chief of Police Foley, it is thought that a woman carrying a satchel and seen in the vicinity of the viaduct was representative of the dynamiters. She was observed walking from Columbus Avenue toward the second pier which sustained one of the steel girders of the viaduct, 150 feet above Columbus Avenue.

The woman was dressed in dark clothing, and immediately following the explosion, which shattered many panes of glasses in the vicinity and threw passengers into panic in a passing trolley car, she was seen to run in the direction of the New Haven Railroad tracks, which almost parallel the tracks of the new railroad.

Among those first to inspect the effects of the explosion were Mayor Edwin W. Fiske and Assemblyman William S. Coffey. The Mayor expressed the opinion that the work of destruction was carried out because of an alleged labor disagreement.

It was learned by Mayor Fiske that the new Third Street Station was being constructed by union labor, while the trolley, one thousand feet distant, was being completed by non-union men.

Roman Dreadnought.

1,700 Year-Old Vessel's New Home. A Roman vessel which has been lying under the mud at the bottom of the site of the County Hall at Lambeth and it was being taken to a "dry dock" at the newly-founded London Museum.

The work of transferring this splendid example of a Roman Dreadnought was begun at three o'clock yesterday morning, and it was fifteen hours before Mr. C. G. Laking, the Keeper of the Museum, saw the precious relic in the shed which has been built for her.

The boat weighs close upon thirty tons of oak and the protective shell that has been built around her brittle timbers weighs another eight tons. It was great task to get her untraced to her new home, and it required two coupled lorries drawn by a team of twelve magnificent cart horses, as Mr. Laking refused to submit the relic of Imperial Rome to the indignity of being dragged through the London streets by a traction engine.

Mr. Laking rode at the head of the procession, which was followed by a motor-car conveying museum officials. There is no other specimen in the world of a Roman ship with which to compare her. The boat was built, keel, ribs and planking of Baltic oak. When her skeleton was unearthed last year, time and water-logged blackened timbers were so soft that they could be cut with a spade. Since then the work of the carpenter has helped to harden the timber, which has, however, become very brittle and shrinks to a considerable extent. She is to be carefully restored to her old shape.

As the boat passed on her journey to Kensington by the camp of the last "Squire" trade from Aldershot, now on strike service in the gardens, a man of the Camberwell section of the Roman was the vessel passed him. The boat will be open to public inspection almost immediately.—D. M., Aug 26th.

Those Vital Statistics.

Yesterday we invited the correspondent who furnished us with the statistics of interments in one of our city cemeteries to give us the statistics of other years between the same dates. We thank him for a ready response to our request.

Yesterday he told us that there were 46 interments in this cemetery between August 3rd and September 12th. To-day he informs us that between August 1st and September 12th, there were 36 interments in 1910; 34 in 1909; and 50 in 1908. It will be seen that the number of burials in 1911 was much in excess of those in 1909 and 1910; but four less than those of 1908. Our correspondent divides these numbers in two classes: placing in one class the number of interments of those who had reached the age of 18 months and over; and in the other children under 18 months. This classification discloses a startling fact. The abnormality shows itself in the death of very young children. The variation in the number of adults and children over 18 months is exceedingly slight in these four years, as will be seen by a perusal of the figures. Of this class, there were 18 interments in 1908; 15 in 1909; 16 in 1910; 17 in 1911. The fluctuation of the numbers in the other class, viz. of children under 18 months old, is much greater. The number in 1908 was 32; in 1909 17; in 1910, 20; and in 1911, 29.

One of the great problems of the age is the lessening of high infantile mortality. Dr. Newsholme referring to the conditions causing high infantile mortality, ignorance and inexperience on the part of parents bear a considerable part, especially as influencing the food and mode of feeding. Nathan Straus in the United States has been at work for twenty years trying to save the lives of infants by establishing Infant Milk Depots. It would prove of interest if any who know would furnish the public with the cause of the high infantile mortality of 1908 and 1911 as compared with that of 1909 and 1910.

We clip the following from a recent issue of the Daily Mail which will be read with interest in this connection.

THE SEA-WATER CURE.

"No few than 655 children under two years of age died in London last week from summer diseases—a terrible death toll of the heat wave which might have been considerably reduced had more people known of the existence of the Quinton Polyclinic, a charitable dispensary at 79 Poland-street, Soho, London, for treating infantile cholera in injections of specially treated sea-water.

Newfoundland and Confederation.

Ratification of Canadian-American Agreement May Lead to Confederation.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Word has reached Ottawa that as soon as Canada ratifies the reciprocity agreement, a movement will be launched in Newfoundland for union with the Dominion.

Newfoundland has several times without success sought better trading terms with the United States. This bargain made by Canada which will give free delivery of fish to the United States has aroused great interest in Newfoundland and a desire to share with Canada in the advantage of the great American market.

It is felt by the party which is forming in Newfoundland that this can be more easily done through union with Canada than by direct negotiations with the United States. The ratification of reciprocity by Canada, it is said on good authority, is likely to be shortly followed by the arrival of commissioners from Newfoundland to discuss terms of union.

Confederation Story by Laurier's Organ.

According to the Daily News, the Toronto World asked Premier Morris for a statement on a declaration in the Toronto Globe that "if reciprocity carries, movement to be launched in Newfoundland for annexation to Canada." The Premier replied that there was no feeling here in favour of Confederation and declared war on any such movement. It is somewhat curious that this story should start in the Toronto Globe, the chief organ of Sir Wilfred Laurier, and the newspaper which contains articles inspired by him. It will be remembered that we pointed out weeks ago that Sir Wilfred insisted on the publication of the Naval Agreement on the eve of dissolution. The chief electioneering value of that document was that it showed Sir Wilfred had obtained for the Dominion the naval charge of half the North Atlantic, including the seas washing the coasts of Newfoundland. It will also be remembered that the Premier's organ the Plaindealer, recently advocated that Newfoundland should approach Canada with a view to Confederation, as it would perhaps be too late in 1912. The mentioning of 1912 was illuminating, for that is the extreme limit to which Sir Edward Morris can hold the reins of Government against the wishes of a people whom he has estranged.

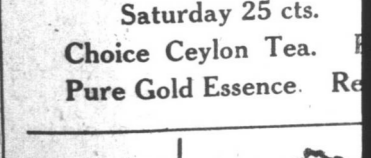

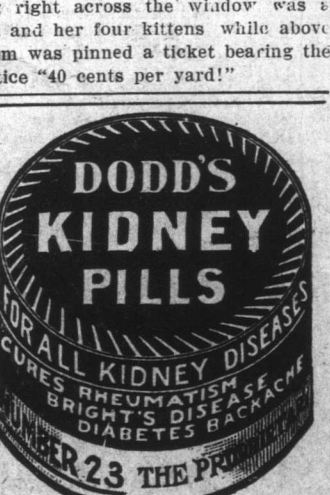
A Free Fight.

Ang Tarred and Feathered Girl.

New York, September 7.—A sketch to the World from Lincoln, Mass., says: Sensational testimony expected at the trial at the next term of the district court of a number of young men who live in the city of Shady Bend on the charge having tarred and feathered Miss Chamberlain, of Rorly, a pretty year old girl. He has been sentenced to a year in jail. It was reported that he entered into conspiracy to entice the girl to the spot where the gang was waiting to attack her. He pleaded guilty and on program of a light sentence gave the names of all the others concerned. It is said that the reason for the attack was remarks Miss Chamberlain alleged to have made about some girls.

Dangerous Auto Accident.

Most people who see automobiles speeding over our steep streets believe that sooner or later an accident will happen which will entail serious loss of life. Shortly after 8 o'clock last night a car owned by Mr. W. H. Franklin and driven by Chauffeur Edward Carey, of Sebastian Street, was wrecked at the foot of Patrick Street. Carey was severely hurt, as well as two other young men who were with him, though a young lady also on board escaped without injury though severely shocked. Carey bought his machine across LeMarchant Road intending to go down Patrick Street and down into Hamilton Street to go to Pippy's Garage on New Street to have the lights on the machine attended to. In crossing LeMarchant Road he took on board Mark Leonard, Sydney Kendrick and Miss Ethie Petrie, of Lime Street, to give him a run. The machine was driven down Patrick Street at a quick pace when suddenly the brakes refused to work and the machine shot on lightning speed over the steep descent. Kendrick and Leonard both jumped, and the former's face when

he hit the ground was a sight to see. It was covered with wounds, gravel and pebbles were imbedded in the flesh, the man's arms and body were bruised and he was generally in a bad state. Leonard escaped only with a few slight abrasions and bruises. Carey held on to the control wheel, and the terrified girl held her seat. The auto shot across Water Street at terrific speed, hit a telephone pole opposite the Round House smashing it and then went over on its side. Miss Petrie providentially escaped injury, but some part of the machine must have struck Carey who was rendered unconscious and suffered much pain until removed in the ambulance at 9 o'clock to the Hospital. All were brought into the residence of Mrs. T. O'Connell where Constables Nugent, Whelan and others soon telephoned for Dr. Mitchell, and after he had done all he could for Carey he had him removed to hospital and made Kendrick accompany him in the ambulance. Messrs. W. J. Pike, G. H. Ellis, F. Ayre, Capt. Cross and others were near and rendered all necessary assistance. The machine was almost a complete wreck. Had the pole not stopped it it would have gone completely through the side of the Round House when Carey and Miss Petrie most certainly have been killed.

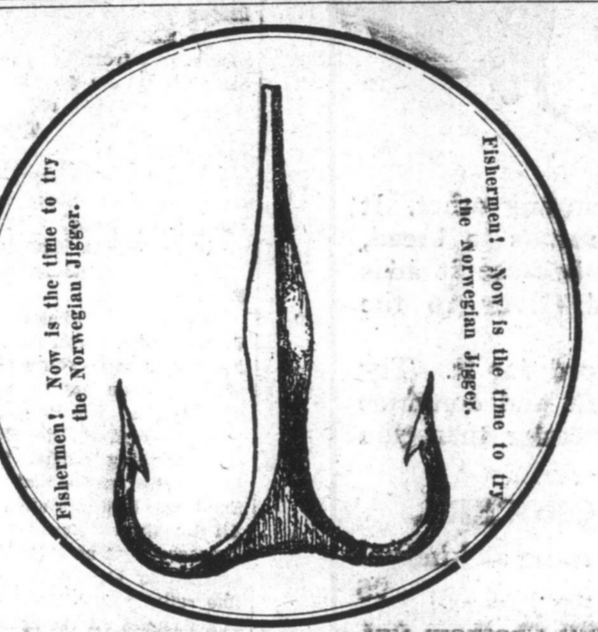
