



The petition for daily bread is made by universal Christendom, but per haps sometimes made without due thought as to what it really implies and even some who offer the prayer and make their request do not really think that their blessings and their bounties really come from God, and they act as if He were left out of it But this was a mistake, because al our blessings bespeak of Providence and declare his over-ruling power The seed may be sown and the grain may be garnered, and all the toil o the harvest be bestowed upon it, bu unless there be life in the seed it cannot bud nor grow. In the life of the seed lies the mystery of production and it is in this aspect that we fine the care of God and see His power and thus understand the necessity o the prayer, because we ask it of Hin who is the author and source of al

While the petition was universally used in the Churchs, yet it had a per sonal application, and contained great truth as to what man should possess. Our daily bread implied ou own share of it, and it also implied that there was a share for our neigh bour. This principle affected th present agitation of Labor and Capi tal, and it taught us that if each mar were satisfied with his proper share o daily bread, and one would not striv to have his neighbour's share beyond what is fair and legitimate, then i would be very possble to settle th differences and solve the problems which seem to force themselves upon business and society in general.

The question of daily bread taught us many lessons, but we are slow to learn them. It taught us the lesson if our dependence upon God, and o the dependence of one country upon another, and of one people upon another, and hence the necessity o roduced variety enough to supply a that we use in daily life are the pro ducts of nations and peoples far apart. Our breakfast table, or our dinner table, if we look at the ingredients which compose these re pasts, will reveal the fact that some of these came from Canada, some from England or France, some from far off China and Japan; but in the course of trade, and by the law of commerce, and under the Providence of God, they have been brought to gether and they make up what known as "our daily bread."

The products of nature were suf ficient for its annual supply of food but by one season of failure manking would be destitute of food. Bu every season produced it own crops Thus it is that food is ever fresh and new, and contains the life-giving pro-perties necessary to the body. Therefore when we make the petition fo daily bread we are acknowledging ou dependence upon Higher Power, and that our daily wants are supplied from above. But there was a higher aspect in which man partook o bread. The daily bread perished in asmuch as it only gives physical life, but there is a greater bread than daily bread; there is the bread of life; he bread of which the disciples "Lord, evermore give us this

They left the ship in a small boat at 10 o'clock Friday morning, and landed at 11 o'clock. Then they travelled back by land to the scene of the wreck, but could do nothing to help those remaining on the ship, the south west wind which was blowing be eing too strong. They remained there until 3.30 p.m., when they left to seek shelter, which they found in a fisherman's camp, where they remained all night. On Saturday morning they returned to the wreck, but could see nothing of her or any of the crew. Ship completely broken up. Captain and crew wanted thinking the weather would get better, and wouldn't risk leaving the ship at the time the survivors

Last night the second mate, whose name is J. Hedley, sent the accompanying message to Mr. Montgomeric nanager of the Furness Line, here:

"Ship struck at 3.30 a.m. about five miles west of St. Shott's. All on board climbed over the bow-sprit under the cliff, but couldn't get to top. At daylight all returned aboard. A 10 a.m. I and four seamen, in a small boat, left and got ashore, the Captain and others deciding to remain till the wea-ther moderated. We then pro-ceeded over the cliff to where the ship lay, and tried to render assistance, but owing to the heavy S.W. wind prevailing were unable to do anything. Slept in fisherman's hut over night, and when we returned to scene in the morning, there was no sign of bodies or ship, she having broken up. Some timber floating about was the only signs. Valuable Mail Destroyed

When Mail Car Takes Fire by Explosion of Lamp.

A serious accident occurred shortly

before 1 a.m. yesterday to the mail car of the express in charge of Conductor Penny, which left here at 6 p. m. Saturday, we learn from passengers who arrived here by the express last night. The express was proceeding along near Camp 4 between Tickle Harbour and Long Harbour when suddenly one of the lamps in the mail car fell from the ceiling, exploded and scattered burning oil all over the compartment. The mails bags about with their contents, of course, furnished most inflammable material for the fire which soon enveloped the whole car. The train ran in on the siding and the burning mail car was quickly incoupled and was burned to the trucks with practically all its con-tents in less than a half hour. When the accident occurred a fierce gale of N. W. wind blew and Mailman Cashman and Baggaeman Doody with the conductor and other train hands and passengers attempted to get out the mails, but the car in a few minutes was a seething furnace and only ouple of bags were secured. The mai officer had all his clothing destroyed in the fire. There was no water near but even if there was the train hands believe that the car could not be saved. Two safes which contained several thousands of dollars were removed from the burning car, rakes from the engine being used to grapple them and haul them out of the car. All the express packages shipped by the Reid Nfld. Bicycles in British Army.

Some 3,000 Wheels Used in Recent Manoeuvres—Found of Great Use.

The recent manoeuvres of the Britsh army, conducted on a larger scale than ever before in times of peace, has brought the bicycle into fovarable otice, and the probability is that that rehicle will be given an important standing. With good roads, such as are found throughout England, the picycle has demonstrated its reliabilty and utility. Some 3,500 of these yelists were attached to the cavalry nd the rapid movement of that large ody was surprising to most people. It is conceded that the bicycle would be no substitute for horses in a battle charge, though the destruction possible with two or three thousand motor-cycles at full speed would certainly cause some confusion, especially if the riders were protected with steel shields. The direction of a cycle com-mand would require specially train-ed officers; in fact, the French have for some time. A combination of mo-tor cycles and bicycles will not unlikely be the final outcome, for one likely be the final outcome, for one motor-cycle can tow four or five mounted bicycles over ordinarily good and level roads at a speed of fifteen or twenty miles an hour. For distance of, say, up to thirty miles, a motor-bicycle regiment could be transferred to emergency points in far less time than by railway, even assuming that the railway were convenient for loading and unloading.—H. W. Windsor, Popular Mechanics' Magazine.

The Government has authorize British and American Protestant misionaries to undertake the teaching of natives in Portuguese Africa.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 22. Fifteen fishing boats have been lost in a storm on the Caspian Sea. Forty fishermen are missing.

LONDON, Dec. 22. The Turkish embassy here has reeived a telegram from Constantinople denying the report from Athens regarding the death of Vice-Admiral Halil Pasha and serious damage to the Turkish flagship.

LONDON, Dec. 22. It is said that Roumania has purchased the two destroyers being built in England for Chili. They will be delivered to Roumania in January.

ATHENS, Dec. 22 The Turkish Army in Mitylene has surrendered, and 1,700 prisoners em barked to-day in Greek transports.

PARIS, Dec. 22. A semi-official statement issued tonight says: The improvement in the international situation has become more marked, and there is now com plete agreement among the powers in favor of moderation. Austria, which heretofore has maintained an attitude of reserve, has decided to come into line with the other Powers and urge prudence and moderation in Turkey. The cause of peace has made great strides in the last 48 hours.

PARIS, Dec. 22. Premier Poincare, speaking in the Senate, yesterday, said: When peace is signed it will rest on a solid basis permitting the Balkan States to develop themselves. Turkey will retain a considerable empire and she will act wisely in listening to the wishes of the population, still subject to her For our part we insist that her interests in Lebanon and Syria generally shall be respected. There is no foun dation in the insinuation that any dis Britain concerning these. On the contrary the latter has assured us that she has no political aspirations in these regions. We are resolved to maintain the integrity of the Ottoman Empire, in Asia, but without allowing our own interests to suffer. If peace unfortunately, is not concluded, w will begin again our efforts at con ciliation, in an attempt to restrict the spread of the conflagration, while ready to defend our influence in the East and the prestige of France

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 22. The Cabinet, to-day, discussed the peace negotiations and forwarded fresh instructions by wire to the delegates at London. It is believed in some quarters that Turkey is about to in voke the aid of the Powers to promote an agreement. The military feeling continues strongly in favor of re-opening hostilities rather than surrender Adrianople. Reinforcements arrive almost daily for Syria and Kurdestan, and several important orders for grains and stores have been placed abroad. The military power favor remaining on the defensive during the winter and assuming the offensive in the spring. This military spirit undoubtedly endangers the stability of the Cabinet, and is not shared in by the sober-minded citizens who are most anxious for the conclu sion of peace. The Government I giving attention to reforms in the Anothian provinces, and proposes to send a special commission of enquiry to the Armenian provinces. LONDON Dec. 22.

The body of the late Ambassado: Reid started on its journey to the States yesterday. Highest military bonors were paid as it left London. The coffin was placed on a gun carriage, drawn by men of the royal horse artillery. The Stars and Stripes were spread over the casket, eight non-commissioned officers acting as bearers, walking on each side. As the procession started from Dorchester House on the way to Victoria Station, it was led by a squadron of Horse Guards in bright breastplates. elmets, long plumes, with great scarlet cloaks enveloping each horseman. The band of the Scotts Gupards followed behind them; then came the Pipers. The regiment followed before the casket, and after it a battation of Scotts Guards. At the same time a battery of Horse Artillery stationed on the Parade Ground of James' Park, fired a salute of nine tren guns. The Band of the Scotts Guards played "Abide With Me." As the train drew out of the station, a guard of honor presented arms, and the pipers played "Flowers of the




