The Sixth Commandment, "Thou halt not Kill," formed the theme of Church last evening. Among other things, the preacher emphasized that urder,-the crimson sin of the soul asisted not only of homicide, and the act of killing, but included religious intolerance, bigotry and per-secution. As the subject was much too wide for one address, the preacher confined himself, more or less, to one point, that of Hate, pointing out that Hate was and is contrary to individual and social welfare, and the opposite of Love, the constructive lement in human life. Hate kills edemption, because hate displaces the meek and forgiving spirit. Hatred isolates man from society, inasity preaches Love as the panacea of the world's ills, while the exponents of Socialism preach class hatred, fornake for regeneration, as class hatred as well as personal hatred is forbidden by the sixth commandment. Continuing, the preacher showed that in response to the material, philosophic and artistic questions of to-day the answer comes back that

hate is unprofitable, and this contention was borne out by many historical and Biblical references. Hate itself is murder, and as Cain was branded, so to-day society brands the hater, inasmuch as the individual going about hating his fellowmen, is shunned by all, as being outside the social pale. Then even as the crimson mark is still in evidence, so also there is a crimson wail going up to Heaven continually from the murdered, including those murdered by the wheels of industry, but the deepest wail goes up from the murderer himself. As for the cure, that can only come from the crimson stain, the Cross of Christ, symbolising the Divine Love, that love which alone of all the virtues can dispel the blackness of hate. Love is the keynote of Christianity, and only by following the Christian doctrines of praying for your enemies, and living for others, can the cause of all the world's dis-

cord be destroyed .. In beautiful and eloquent language, the preacher closed one of the most heart-touching discourses that has yet been delivered on the Commandments, and was listened to with the deepest attention by the large congregation which crowded the sacred edifice.—S.J.H.

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"Soldier and Sailor, Too."

Field-Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood sex, on February 9, 1838, has the distinction of having seen active service not only in the Army, but also in the Navy. He began his career as a midshipman in H.M.S. Queen, of 116 guns, under his uncle, Captain Frederick Michell, in 1852. About that time Europe had begun to drift into the complications leading to the Crimean War, and in September, 1854, the landing in the Crimea was effected. After the battle of the Alma and the occupation of Balaclava, it was decided to employ a Naval Brigade ashore, under Captain Peel, R.N., who did splendid work, not only in the Crimea but later through the fortune, as he reckoned & to be selected. With it, he went through the hardships and pertis of the trenches in that severe winter, and later he was attached to Peel as A.D.C. He also took part in the first unsuccessful attack on the Redan (June 18, 1855), and was wounded in the arm, a bone being splintered by grapeshot. Subsequently the wound gave him much trouble, but he was eager to get to the front again and, moreover, had decided to change his profession for the Army. The fact that he had been mentioned in Lord Ragian's dispatch as having particularly distinguished himself at the assault on the Redan, facilitated matters, and he was gazetted to the 13th pedless to be bothered with indiges- Light Dragoons, then in the Crimea. Later, he joined the regiment there, but hostilities were ended, and it was not until he went to India that he really began his great career as a soldier, which ended in his being awarded the baton of Field Marshal.

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
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
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
