Had a drastic curtailment of expenditure been made the expectations of the people would have been realized but now, viewing the tariff, he thought the last stage was worse than the first. He believed it would be great setback to the fishermen to find that the duties have been increased. He was of opinion that the tariff as submitted by the Commission would not have been accepted by the past Government without revision by the Executive. He believed that the present Executive never saw the tariff until it was printed, and the Finance Minister never gave it any due consideration. The decision to scrap the subtax and supertax system and revert to the one straight duty is a very welcome change, and the classification of imports has many anomalies, Instances, however, are quoted which would indicate that the new system imposes a hardship on persons holding certain lines of goods. Some of these have already been revised, and no doubt if others are shown to be unduly burdensome they will receive due consideration in time.

It is claimed that the Tariff Commission kept in view the desirability of making a distinction between luxuries and necessities. That is as it should be, but under those circumstances, it surely cannot be claimed that the re-

moval of the income tax has brought any relief to the wealthier class. That tax, it has been demonstrated could never be effectively applied, and if general taxes on luxuries have been increased, they not only provide a more certain revenue, but they nore than counteract the relief given by the removal of the income tax.

Taken altogether the tariff is experiment, and any irregualities which appear after it has been given a fair trial can be removed or readjusted.

OFFICIAL SYNOPSIS. THURSDAY, April 16th. The Council met at 4 p.m. pursuant

o adjournment. HON. MR. PRESIDENT read a letter from His Excellency the Governor granting leave of absence to Hon. Dr. Robinson for the remainder of the

Bill to amend the Terra Nova Sulphite Company Act of 1920 was read third time and passed and it was ordered that a message be sent the House of Assembly that this House had passed the same without amend-

The House resolved into Committee of the Whole on Bill entitled, "An Act Respecting the Encouragement of Shipbuilding." Hon Mr. Davey in the

HON. MR. MORINE explained that he Bill before the House was a substitution for the Bill which had come rom the Lower House dealing with bounties for the Repairing of Vessels. It had been thought better to consolidate the matter of Repairing with that of the bounty for Shipbuilding, beause there were many provisions ommon to the two. He said he had ound the task of consolidation one of the most difficult he had recently unlertaken, for it was almost impossible to find out what the law was with regard to the matter. It appeared that for years an incorrect interpretation had been put upon the law. Amendments had been made almost every year, and it is now considered desirable to consolidate all the amend nents. The method of dealing with he Bill was, he added, a little irregular, as it should come from the Lower House, but inasmuch as the original Bill had passed through all stages there, and a Bill dealing with the same subject could not be introduced there again this session, they have no objection to the Council's dealing with it. Hon. Mr. Morine then explained the alterations in the schedues and drew attention to the changes made. Time would be given the Hon. members to pursue and study the Bill and full discussion and suggestion for improvement were invited.

The Committee rose and reported progress, and asked leave to sit again. The Council resolved into Committee of the Whole on the Survey of Foreign going and Labrador vessels Amendment Bill; Hon, Mr. Power in the

HON. MR. MORINE said that like the preceding one, this Bill had grown out of one from the Lower House, due partly to some suggestions from the Hon, members and partly to the need for consolidation. The old Bill apparently did not cover sealing ships, nd an Act was introduced this year o provide for an annual survey of these ships before allowing them to proceed to the sealfishery. It was the original Act and the Amendments thereto. First, the Bill provides for inspection and for regulations, by the Governor-in-Council. The next section provides for reports of injuries to vessels to be forwarded to the Minister. The powers of the Inspectors are given. Section 8 deals with the inspection of equipment, etc., and is taken from a Canadian Act. Section 9 had to do with sealing ships.
