**The Herald's Mendiacity.**  
When we penned the few but emphatic words in flat contradiction of the sensational and specially manufactured paragraph in the Weekly Herald, (a paragraph, which from some mysterious unexplained, and probably unexplainable cause, never appeared in the Daily Herald) we were well aware that the floodgates of literary Billingsgate would be opened upon us by the cadaverous Ghost of a Skeleton." (O, faithful autobiographer, we thank thee for the phrase), who at present transacts the scurrilous fish-wife business for the Herald. Our duty, however, was plain. It was our misfortune to have the painful measure imposed on us of styling a monstrous falsehood by its appropriate name, even although employed by such distinguished authority in such matters as the writer in the Herald, and we did it. We simply reiterate our charge in all its forcible beauty and gravamen, and fortify it with the following letter:

To the Editor of the Mercury.  
Sir,—Having observed in the Herald some remarks in relation to the late public meeting of Reformers held in the Town Hall, in which a statement is made that an Independent Reformer was hissed down, and that the meeting was a packed meeting. How a meeting called by public notice and held in the Town Hall will open Coombs and a dozen of Conservatives were present and called a packed meeting, in my opinion, is a statement that carries a falsehood in its face by the Herald's own admission that a number of Conservatives were present. In respect to the gentleman referred to being hissed down, the statement is not correct. I heard no hisses. Mr. McMillan rose to speak after the resolution to which he referred in his remarks was put and carried. He was invited to ascend the platform and addressed the meeting. There was, it is true, some symptoms of hostilities among the audience at the time, but the personal explanation upon the part of Mr. McMillan, but he went on and published his speech without any such interruption as has been stated by the Herald, and he was not hissed down but heard out to the end of his remarks.

We doubt not that the above can and will be, if necessary, corroborated by all who attended the meeting in question, and who have no interest in the "manufacture" of a paragraph. Mr. McMillan, who emphatically repeat, was not hissed down. The most authoritative contradiction that the meeting was not packed is to be found in two facts furnished by the Herald itself, namely, the presence at the meeting of two of its conductors, and the mention made in its own paragraph that there were about half a dozen Conservatives present. A "packed" meeting would not have admitted either the one or the other.

Our hospitable contemporary will, therefore, reserve that now venerable "leek" for some future occasion, in case his next editorial may require its delightful flavoring assistance, or perhaps may, in these times of vegetable dearth, be gladly availed of as a substitute for onions in strengthening the poultice necessary to relieve the horrible blistering with which a certain "vulgar scribe" in the Mercury has "deified" the editorial back of the Herald's "ghost of a skeleton."

We, of course, cannot definitely fix the authorship of the insinuations paragraph. Certain it is, in spite of the audacious attempt at denial in the Herald, that the Assistant Editor of the Herald made use of the expression referred to either during or after Mr. McMillan's speech (judged from what we heard to-day, during both periods), and not in private, but in the Town Hall. Why we mentioned it at all was merely to expose the unscrupulous nature of the tactics adopted by the Herald, and the hollow hypocrisy of its assumed sympathy with Mr. McMillan.

[A word as to the Herald's personalities. Under its present regime it is nothing if it is not personal, and yet with what unctuous fervour of a would-be pathetic regret it gloats over every opportunity, suitable or unsuitable, for a return to its favorite and congenial sport. The supposed writer in the Mercury is dubbed "a sneaking scribe" by the Herald's "parvenu," but can it be that retributive justice has unwittingly caused him to pen the epithet in order that the world of honor and respectability should be informed that this pretentious apologist for a journalist is the sneaking scribe himself. We have been taunted with being "professional contortionists," but retributive justice here again steps in order to show that the designation is fully applicable to the man who has so shamelessly vaulted from the Liberal saddle to that of the Conservative— from riding the political steed of Liberalism with some degree of personal gracefulness and ease,

to riding a Conservative Cuddy "a posteriori" with the tail tucked up as his reins. Then again we are "brass-nosed," but retributive justice steps again to the front, and states that as brass-facedness has been the great distinguishing feature of the Herald under present management and as it is a well-known mathematical axiom that the "greater includes the less," so the rights of possession demand the transference of the epithet from our unworthy selves in order that the honour of the knighthood may be conferred on the rightful heir-at-law and equity. Congratulations doubtless will now pour in from hosts of admiring friends upon the much worshipped and admired recipient of the new order of K. B. N. We had almost forgot that we are also accused of being "a maker of faces." Well, we believe that that is about the only correct charge that the cadaverous "Ghost of a Skeleton" has brought against us, and unrivalled almost as we are generally admitted to be in this department of "manufacture," we have not as yet succeeded in photographing on the dial of our facial representations the irrepressible slang dogism of the "sneaking scribe" who so characteristically stunk into the Reformers meeting the other day, and into which any high-toned member of his profession would have spurned to intrude. But personalities in journalism are never edifying, and nearly always disgusting, and we hasten to stop. In common justice we have written as we have done, merely adding but no amount of provocation will cause us, unless libellous, to condense to notice the brutalized diatribes of this many cur, and having the mens conscia recta to support us we confidently say, unpack your little arsenal and explode away, for many a glass house that you threatened to demolish is still standing, a monument at once of their strength, and your miserable imbecility. We always like to avoid personal contact with a skunk, whether quadrupedal or human; then, and then only, are we a "sneaking scribe" and a genuine "professional contortionist" and "maker of faces."—Ed.]

**Our Salt Reports.**  
The altered American tariff in favour of Canadian salt has already enabled our producers to compete successfully with those on the other side of the lines, and to undersell them on their own ground. A hundred casks of Canadian salt arrived in Saginaw a few days ago, and we believe sold at a profit. The effect has been to depress this branch of industry at this place, and will in a similar degree, we presume, reduce the scope of operation in New York, Ohio and the Kenawha Valley. It is claimed by our dealers that they can buy Canadian salt in Chicago, under the new tariff, at less than the cost of manufacture in the United States. Of course, American producers will do their best to re-instate the old duty of 18c. per 100 lbs., but doubtless the consumer is quite willing to continue under the present arrangement.—Free Press.

**DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN BOSWORTH.**—About one o'clock, on the morning of Tuesday last, a destructive fire occurred in the village of Bosworth, on the town-line between Peel and Maryborough. Snyder's hotel, occupied by Mr. Boppree, and Haight's blacksmith-wagon and harness shops, were utterly consumed. The latter buildings were insured, but to what amount we did not learn. Mr. Boppree loses a considerable quantity of furniture. The stabling in connection with the hotel was saved by the efforts of the villagers.

**SERIOUS FIRE IN TORONTO.**—Between two and three o'clock on Thursday morning, the premises of Messrs. Elliott & Co., wholesale druggists, Front-st., were discovered to be on fire. It is supposed to have originated from some oil that may have been spilled on the floor getting mixed with other matter and spontaneous combustion was the result. It is impossible at present to estimate the loss.

**THE GOLDEN LION OF GRANPER.**—Messrs. Hunter, Rose & Co., of Toronto, have sent us a copy of the above work, by Anthony Trollope, whose fame as a writer is indisputable. The above gentlemen are the publishers of the book, which is neatly got up and excellently printed.

**MAGAZINES FOR JULY.**—Mr. Anderson has sent us the "Young Ladies Journal," "London Journal" and "Good Words" in which is contained a feeling and eloquent tribute to the late editor, Dr. Norman McLeod, by Dean Stanley.

**LINCOLN.**—At the Reform Convention held yesterday (Thursday) at St. Catharines the slavish support of the present Government by the present M. P., Mr. T. R. Merritt, was unanimously condemned, and Mr. John McKeown (a Roman Catholic) was nominated as the unanimous choice of the Convention.

A father and son at Brantford, Ont., concluded that they had better secure a house-keeper, and each, unaware of the other's intentions, brought home a new wife on Friday.

There is a feeble effort on foot among the Oxford Tories to oppose Mr. Oliver's re-election for the North Riding, by bringing out Mr. Alexander, the Woodstock postmaster, as a candidate.

The Ministerial organ can only hunt up fifty-four Tory candidates in ninety Ontario constituencies, whereas the Opposition have over seventy candidates in the field. Even of the fifty-four mentioned, several have declined to run.



BY-LAW No. — A By-Law to provide for the Erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$20,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registry purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

AND WHEREAS there is no interest in arrears. And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in this municipal year contracted any debts or loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditure which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars.

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ter mentioned, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$13,396,208.

AND WHEREAS for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund the payment of the principal of the sum of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other rates.
