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

A Gladstenian Victory.
London, July 24.—The election, yester day, in the north or Wisbech division of for the Liberals. Hon. Arthur Branda, Liberal, receiving a majority of 260 over Duncan, Conservative. In the last election Captain Selwyn, Conservative, defeated John Higby, Home Ruler, by a majority of 1,087. The victory is a surprise to both sides. The Gladstonian candidate was opposed by powerful local trade interests, and it was hardly calonisted that he would do any more than reduce the Conservative majority to such a minimum as would justify a recontest at the coming election. Among the Conservative strength were the publican and brewer interests, long dominant in the constituency. These were thrown in chull strength against the Gladstonians, whose victory is therefore all the more significant, but neither this nor the results of any by-elections will alter the determination of the government to try to complete its scheme of Irish legislation before dissolving parliament.

Clergymen Bisagree.

London, July 24.—Among the closing incidents of the Congregational council was the proposed union with the Baptists, the proposal exciting discussion in both communions. Dr. Goodwin's vindication of Congregational orthodoxy aroused Dr. Parker's ire. When interviewed, Parker said he would rather not speak on the subject at large, but that his wife had written a letter which fairly represented his own thoughts. The wife's letter abounds in strong language. She compares Goodwin to a theological corpse that had lain in the grave for 200 years, and been dragged out stinking, with the grave clothes not too gracefully draped around him. To much more of this style of criticism Parker adds that he was on a bed of sickness ten days, yet the delegates preaching in the temple failed to remember him in their prayers, thus exemplifying their unholy Calvinism, and that they were so much concerned about their own orthodoxy as to neglect the simplest decencies of civilization.

The Biggest Of FLYING BIRDS.

The Wandering Albetroes and the South American Condor are the Ones.

The biggest of all really powerful flying birds are, I believe, the wandering albatroes and the South American condor—for the roc I reject outright as worthy only of the most restricted Arabian and nocturnal ornithology. Seen on the wing, says a writer in the Chicago Globe, or even with the wings expanded merely, both these great existing birds have a most majestic and colossal appearance. But feathers in such cases are very deceptive; they make fine birds out of very small bodies. For example, our well-known little English swift, which looks so imposing in flight as it passes overficad with pinions poised, is hardly as big when plucked as a man's top thumb joint and weighs only half an ounce. So, too, the albatroes, though its expanse of wing is said to exceed that of any other known bird, amounting sometimes to nearly ten feet from tip to tip, does not average in weight more than fifteen pounds, which is just exactly the poulterer's statement for my last family Christmas turkey. As for the condor, while he spans from wing to wing some eight feet, his length from beak to tail is only three and a half, and I doubt if he would pluck into anything corresponding to his magnificent outer show—though I am bound to anything corresponding to his magnifi-cent outer show—though I am bound to admit that I have never personally tried the unpleasant experiment.

BY A CHILEAN TORPEDO.

The Launch of the War Ship Pensaco Blown Up at Arica--Five Seamen Killed.

The Chilean Cruiser Mistook the Boat for an Insurgent Vessel—A Stupid Blunder.

Apologies Tendered, but the Dead Bitter Over the Affair.

New York, July 24.—A correspondent at Callao, Peru, under date of June 24, writes to his paper thus: The man-of-war Pensacola, of the United States navy, has just arrived here, after an exciting run along the Chilean coast, and I send you the first news of a thrilling accident at Arica, Chile, by which five sailors of the Pensacola lost their lives. Her steam

Arica, Chile, by which five sailors of the Pensacola lost their lives. Her steam launch was blown up in the harbor of Arica, by the Chilean torpedo boat Condell, and every man on board was killed.

The list of the dead includes: O. Smith, New York; Wm. Hayes, Brooklyn; Frank Peckham, Newark, N.J.; Teddy O'Rourke, Huntington, L.I.; Arthur E. Dykeman, Pearsalls, L.I.

The attack took place on the evening of June I. The Condell stole into the harbor of Arica about 7 p.m. There was a heavy fog, and objects at a distance of 100 yards could not be seen with any distinctness.

The steam launch had left the Pensacola, on her regular evening trip to the abore, and was making her way slowly, when suddenly the man-of-war saw the little boat lifted completely out of the water. The quiet that followed told plainly that the five men on board the launch had been killed. The search-light of the Pensacola was brought into play, and at the same instant orders were given to lower the boats. The Condell was discovered only a short distance away.

The Chilean cruiser had mistaken the launch for an insurgent boat and used a torpedo with deadly effect. There was intense excitement aboard both vessels for the next twenty minutes. Signalling continued between the man-of-war and the torpedo boat for some time, and when the situation of affairs became known on the Condell her commander dipped his colors and sent his chief officer aboard the Pensacola. It then became known that the explosion was a stupid blunder on the part of the cruiser. Such apologies as could be offered were made, but the feeling smong the comrades of the dead sailors was very bitter.

Commodore Irving, commandant at the Brooklyn navy yard, was seen at his residence this evening, and was told of the reported sinking of the Pensacola's steam launch and the killing of five of the crew. "I have heard nothing of any such occurrence," said the Commodore, "and it is my helief that there is no truth in the story. Only to day I received a letter from Admiral McCann, dated July 6, from Callac. He writes from on board the Baltimore, and informs me that the Pensacola was preparing to sail for San Francisco. Had there been any such occurrence as you relate he would certainly have said something about it."

About 1848 they took a trip up Red river on a cedar purchasing expedition, intending to ship a large cargo to England. They were gone some time. Facilities for mail communication were neither rapid nor

communication were neither rapid nor plentiful in those days. Stanley heard little of affairs at home. He returned to New Orleans to find his wife had taken sick and died during his absence from home. Soon afterward he married Miss Miller, an Englishwoman. He then changed his business, becoming cotton weigher for the firm of Payne, Dameron & Co., the predecessors of Payne, Kennedy & Co.; later he obtained employment with Wright, Williams & Co., in the same capacity. He made a good deal of money in the days when there were fortunes in the ectton-press business. When the war ectton-press business. When the war broke out he took no part in the con-flict, but with his wife went over to England to revisit the scenes of his youth. He left his dwelling, facing Annunciation square, in charge of Mrs. Stanley's sister, Mrs. Walter Nicholl, who occupied it with her husband dur-ing the absence of the Stanleys. When Gen. Benjamin Butler made his head-quarters in New Orleans he ordered the seizure of the house and the Commercial press, putting his soldiers in the

Mr. Stanley's friends took advantage of his British birth and foreign residence to appeal to the English consul. The latter promptly sent word to Butler to release the property within twenty-four hours. The orders were obeyed and though the coldings may be and a read the coldings may be a read. and the soldiers marched out and camped in Terrell's press across the street. As soon as the Stanley and his wife returned. Stanley resumed the cotton-press business, but was not as successful as in the antebellum days. In 1870 he sold the Com-

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

DESCENT OF THE BARINGS. History of a Great Commercial Family Extending Through Centuries.

Two centuries ago there lived at Bremen, in Germany, a pastor of the Luth-

eran church named Franz Baring, or Baering. In those days, says Spare Moments, the ministers of his order might be men of great learning, but their circumstances were at the best moderate. His son, John Baring, went to England and established himself as a clothmaker near Exeter, in Devonshire. From the ranks of the cloth drapers and

the linen drapers, quite as often as from among the goldsmiths, the merchants and bankers were then recruited. John

Baring's son, Francis, born in 1740, was sent at an early age to learn the "art, trade and mystery" of a merchant, and before he died he made himself, by con-

sent, the first merchant in the world. He was a director in the Honorable East Indian Company, then one of the highest rewards to which a merchant might hope to attain; for a time he was

the great company's chairman; for twenty-two years he sat in parliament,
