

Turks Committing Wholesale Massacres and the People Panic Stricken.

Town of Adrianople in Ashes **And Many Other Sections** in Flames.

Sultan's Forces Making Franttc Efforts to Restore Order in Disturbed Districts.

Sofia, Aug. 29 .- The Dnevnik publish-Sofia, Aug. 29.—The Dnevnik publishes a report that one section of the town of Adrianople is in ashes, and that three other sections are burning. The inhabitants are panic-stricken and the authorities have lost all control. The Turks are committing wholesale massacres. An unsuccessful attempt was made to blow up the westbound Orient express between Usunkistri and Tchernikeskia. Only the locomotive, however, was derailed.

A telegram from Leren says the railway station at Ukshi was blown up, a number of efficials being killed and the rails torn up for a distance of 150

meters.

The insurgents have blown up the lighthouse at Vasilko, and now occupy the principal points along the Black Sea coast. The barracks at Demotika, near Adrianople, have been blown up and the garrison killed. Four thousand Albanians are pillaging the villages in the districts of Okrids and Krushevo. The latter district is deserted by the population, who have joined the insurgents in the mountains. The Turkish forces in the frontier districts have been largely increased.

Salonica, Friday, Aug. 28.—It is officially announced that the seven battalions of Turkish troops which have been investing Neverka—captured August 25-by the insurgents, who killed 200 of the 230 men composing the garrison—have receptured the place. 




