feature in the financial panic to-day was the failure of Fisk & Hatch, and A. R. Dimock & Co., Wall street stock brokers. The Metropolitan bank resumed payment. There was a run on a number of other banking institutions, but in every instance all demands were met. The situation is still regarded as one of great gravity. Fears are entertained for many firms who yet appear to be strong. One broker says that the suspended firms will have plenty of company soon. In fact, he said, we may have another Black Friday. Several other gentlemen expressed the opinion that there was trouble to be anticipated in the future owing to the scarcity of money and a lack of confidence among the financial men. It is feared there will be trouble in the oil market tomorrow. New York, May 15 .- The principal

Fisk & Hatch suspended at 2.45. The firm was composed of A. S. Hatch, president stock exchange, and Harvey Fisk. They have been the heaviest dealers in government bonds on the street, and have generally been considered a staunchy conservative and thoroughly reliable firm. Their suspension came like a thunderbolt on the exchange, the immediate result being a decline of from 1 to 5 per cent in prices. The weakness in the government. prices. He stated that three gentlemen had promised \$1000 each for this purpose, and it remained tor other friends to subscribe the balance. "It was important," said the doctor, "that the young theologians should be delivered from the narrow cloister life of a denominational college."


