Trade Relationships. The result of the conference of the Boards of Trade and Commerce of the Empire should not be discouraging to those who hope for an improvement in Imperial trade relations.

Two views of the matter have been taken by the newspapers of this country. "The British people," one newspaper assures us, "are not going to tax themselves by preferential duties to help Canada out of holes. This, we take it, is self-evident, and no Canadian who has given the matter any thought expects that the British people will lay burdens on themselves merely for the advantage of Canada or any other colony. It happens, however, that that is not the proposition that has been made.

The proposition that has been made assumes this form: Canada will be certain advantages in her market provided the Mother Country reciprocates. Indeed, the offer was intended to take a larger scope than that of the tariff concessions. It was intended to include the offer to join all the colonies in the scheme of mutual concessions. There was also a third consideration offered, and a recent utterance of Lord Salisbury goes to encourage it. It is felt that the adoption of commercial understandings with her colonies would arm Britain against the tariff marauders who the world over seem to have made a determined set on her trade supremacy. So long as the United States and other protectionist communities find that they can adopt every means of injuring British interests without fear of tariff reprisals as long will the merry warfare be kept up. How changed would be their tune if they discovered that the Empire at large was preparing to treat them to a dose of their own medicine! A wonderful change would come over their facial views. Canada does not, therefore, ask the Motherland to give us something for nothing. On the other hand we offer concession for concession, and in doing so afford a prospect of making a breach in the impenetrable tariff walls that each nation of the earth has thrown up to its coast. The people of Britain cannot be expected to change in a day a policy under which Britain has prospered for many years. Nor can we hope that the Empire will be hard logic of a waning commerce shows that it is time to be up and doing to meet the foe. It is good and hopeful, however, that the fight of fighting fire with fire has been prominently stated, and it may well be believed that British statesmen and the British people will begin to look with more and more fraternal eyes on the people of both the British and the American Empire. SEALERS SEIZED.

A Capture in Behring Sea Which Will Renew International Disagreement.

YANCOUVER, July 3.—There is great excitement here over the report that American cruisers have seized the steamer Coquillon in Alaska waters and a number of Canadian sealers. The Coquillon is owned by the Union Steamship Company of Vancouver and chartered by an association of sealers to carry supplies to schooners in Behring Sea and bring back skins. Her owners will make representations to the Dominion Government as regards the seizure. It is said 6000 skins were seized. A Lieutenant in Civilian's Clothes saw Her.

The Lieutenant's special says the British steamer Coquillon of Victoria, B.C., Master James, arrived at Sitka on June 26, in charge of Lieut. Quinn and Assistant Engineer Bretherton and was turned over to the U. S. collector of customs for violation of the revenue laws. The Coquillon was seized by Capt. Hooper at Fort Stevens, Prince William Sound, on June 22, for having a blank manifest on board, allowing neither cargo nor passengers and for entering and towing to the coast of Alaska and bringing stores to and receiving seal skins from the British sailing fleet within the jurisdiction of the United States without entry or other documents. Her operations were perceived by Lieut. J. B. Quinn of the Calvin, who, disguised in civilian's clothing, had been on board the Coquillon for the purpose of watching the movements of the schooner and steamer.

The Coquillon is a heavy propeller of 100 tons, carrying 12 men and five passengers, and had on board nearly 6000 seal skins valued at \$20,000, besides a large stock of flour for the fleet. She is cleared by the Union Steamship Company of Vancouver and was chartered by the British Columbia Sealers Association of Victoria. Twenty-five schooners Ordered Out of the Harbor.

Twenty-five British schooners were boarded in Port Etches. After being given reasonable time for weather and repairs they were ordered out of the harbor. The seizure of the Coquillon leaves all the British sealing fleet in the northern waters of the Behring Sea. The Coquillon is discharging the seal skins which she received from English sealers and is being discharged at Sitka. She was going to port on board the sealers when she was taken in charge.

The news was a great surprise here. It is thought Captain Hooper's action was pronounced as the British officials of this Government located there. She left port with a complete store list however, and complete strictly fish oil forms. At there comes a charge against her of attempting to defraud the revenue laws by smuggling goods into Alaska for the boats would not be subject to confiscation or a more serious penalty upon the combined charges than five of \$2400.

The sealers and other cargo could not be touched, the officers not being responsible for the misdoings of the schooner. As for the schooner, it is evident that they transferred their catch as it would be more like sixty thousand than six thousand. A meeting of the association may possibly be held to-day to give attention to the latest development in the situation.

Blind Tom. Blind Tom, the negro musical wonder, will appear at the Grand Opera on Thursday next, July 7. Who has not heard of the marvelous dandy, deprived apparently of every other mental faculty save the sense of harmonious melody? Of one of his performances at the St. Louis Globe-Democrat says: "Despite the bitter weather last evening a large audience was present at the Grand Music Hall to hear the performance of Blind Tom, the negro prodigy in music. He is the same Tom as ever, clapping his hands, and every performance was the audience is applauding. He gave several compositions from such masters as Liszt and Gottschalk, with an interpretation as skillful and artistic as those of pianists who have been technically educated. His accompaniment was of wide range. Any one in the audience can play an air that Blind Tom has never before heard and he will immediately repeat the same perfectly. A word will be pronounced and he will play it phonetically by his knowledge of sound, as he is entirely uneducated in music. His limitations of the Scotch bag-pipe, guitar and fiddle and drum on the piano are perfect representations of the instruments, and all of them and evince the wonderful control he has over the keys. He seems to be a perfect master in the principles of harmony, and all from intuition. The closing piece, 'Battle of Manassas,' which he played with time and time again, was thoroughly enjoyed by the spectators."

Beginning with the driving of Jesus he spoke on the evil results of moral fast driving. He is an enthusiastic and earnest speaker and moreover an all-around amateur athlete. During the course of his address, and while pointing out that a Christian had no need or excuse for wearing a long face, he said: "I can just as well drive as live as anybody. I can't play lacrosse—we don't play that in England—but I can play tennis and football with any of you. Several times his remarks were enthusiastically applauded."

Wounded, But Didn't Know How. A woman giving her name as Sarah Crowley of 10 Edward-street was found in Lawrence-street at 10:45 o'clock on Saturday night. She had two large lacerations on her face and head, but was so much under the influence of liquor that she was unable to give any account of her injuries, in which the injuries had been received. She was removed to the hospital in the patrol wagon.

The room was fittingly adorned with bouquets of flowers and mottoes. The little girls seemed to take great pride in the samples of their cooking and needlework. It certainly would compare most favorably with the work of young ladies of a much more advanced age. Their teacher, Miss Forrest, deserves great praise for the success she has attained in her double capacity of teacher and matron.

The school has only been organized eight months, but already it is a handsome and spacious building, almost ready for occupation, about a mile east of the village. Several members of the board visited the building Saturday, among them being Dr. W. T. Aikin and wife, Mr. Haverley Jones, Mr. Morton, Mrs. Matthews and Mrs. Harvey. The board have good reason to look forward to another prosperous year.

A Grave Charge. An affair which will call for the investigation of the Magistrate this morning, occurred at Hamilton's Point late on Saturday night. The British steamer Coquillon, while standing in front of Hamilton's Point, was accosted by a young woman about 22 years of age, named Jenny Barke, who asserted that she had been grossly assaulted by a young man in the rear of the boat. It appears that early in the morning she had "caught on" to a young man named Thomas McCarthy, residing at 40 Edward-street, and the pair of them had walked round together. Late in the evening, however, they fell out, and it was immediately after the quarrel that the once companion of occurred. On McCarthy's arrest a short time later identified him as her assailant, and the pair were taken over to Headquarters. The accused young man is about 27 years of age and works as a coal-heaver in Rogers' employ.

City Hall Notes. The Board of Works will meet on Monday to reconsider the appointment of the engineers. It has been delayed thus far so as to leave as little time as possible to wire-plotting or lobbying the members of the executive.

The Grand Trunk has obtained a 50 per cent lease of the Bell line and intend to begin operating it at once. Mrs. Margaret F.
