THE PRESCOTT MEETING.

Hon. Wilfrid Laurier may be an accomplished orator, but his friends could not help but be disappointed at the discussion of commercial matters severely alone, as he never falls to make his ridiculous when he undertakes to deal with them. He is reported by The Globe as saying in his speech at Prescott: "While the people were said to be wealthy and prosperous, there was no farm in the Dominion of Canada which could be sold for 40 per cent. of what it was sold for fifteen years ago. This meant that the farmer was 40 per cent. wealthier fifteen years ago than he was today." Take the case of the best of farms saleable fifteen years ago at \$100 per acre. Mr. Laurier asserts that such a farm could not be sold now for \$40. Admitted that there has been a decline, as there has also been in the United States, Great Britain etc., a considerable decline in the value of farm lands, no such decline as 60 per cent. or even half of this, has been experienced in any country in Canada. But Mr. Laurier's estimate of the percentage of loss to the farmer is too funny any statesman to make. If fifteen years ago the farm was worth \$100, and is now unsaleable even at \$40, the farmer was 150 per cent. not 40 per cent., richer than now.

Mr. Laurier says that in 1875 wheat was selling for 80 cents per bushel, which he calls the Grit price, but that the low price now ruling is the Tory price. Mr. Laurier and the leaders of his party constantly maintain that legislation cannot affect prices of farm produce in Canada, as they are invariably determined by their export value. Where, then, is the point he was trying to make? Does Mr. Laurier ever consult our trade and navigation tables? If he does, he must know that in many years during the past fifty years in Canada for wheat, flour, pork, products, oats, etc., have been so much above export value that United States dealers have found it profitable to export many millions of dollars' worth of these commodities to the Dominion, even after paying the heavy duties imposed thereon. This advance in price is what the National Policy was designed to accomplish, and which the Grit leaders know that it has accomplished.

Sir Richard Cartwright was on hand at the meeting with his usual stock of exaggerations and misrepresentations. He attributes the unsatisfactory increase in our population to the N.P., and in the very next paragraph says that, in addition to our nominal taxation of \$30,000,000 per annum, there is an actual additional taxation of a like amount in attempting to naturalize the vast exodus of foreigners here and there. Admitting for the moment that consumers pay, on an average, 25 per cent. more for these manufactured articles than last year, is more likely to be about the average, then, according to his own showing, there must have been \$120,000,000 more of manufactured articles made in Canada through the instrumentality of the N.P. than would have been made in trade. Any school boy would tell Sir Richard that if this estimate of his is correct, then the unsatisfactory increase of population must be attributable to some other cause than the N.P. It is admitted that there has been a large increase in the manufacturing population in the cities and towns, so also it may be admitted that there has been a corresponding decrease in our rural population. To attribute the latter result to the N.P. is absurd, as the farmers have been largely benefited by the home market created by the manufacturing industries for a great variety of produce which cannot be profitably exported, so that their condition has been greatly benefited, not injured. The causes of the decrease in agricultural population are: Yearly increase in the use of machinery for field work; substitution of dairy and cattle feeding in place of grain, the former requiring much less farm help than the latter; and the opening up through manufactures of our fields of labor which promise greater attractions and larger incomes than many farmers' sons can find by farming. The amount of taxes which ordinary farmer's family contributes to the Federal revenue are hardly equal to twenty-five cents per acre on 100 acres; certainly the reduction of or exemption from which would hardly induce them to move to the next concession, let alone to leave their country. If taxes are a little higher, this has been caused by the railway, postal and other expenditures which have cheapened transportation and have conferred innumerable other advantages.

THE BOND HUBBLE.
The recent sale of bonds affords a good idea of the inefficiency that characterizes the management of our affairs under the existing system. If a private corporation had business of this kind to attend to, an individual would be assigned the duty of carrying it through, and he would be held strictly responsible for the result of the transaction. When the city comes to transact the business, and the responsibility divided between several individuals, together with the Council itself. The chairman of the committee of the proceedings to the Treasury took part in it. The Mayor was a prominent figure in the deal, and the City Council passed resolutions directing how the thing should be done. The result was a complete fiasco. The city is a fitting climax to the whole sorry business. One series

of bungles has characterized the thing from start to finish. The citizens have only to consider the way in which the matter was handled to be convinced of the necessity of having an improved system of civic government. As we pointed out yesterday, civic reform ought to be the watchword of the coming municipal elections, and only candidates who will pledge themselves to carry out a scheme of genuine reform should be selected and voted for.

THE NIAGARA RIVER SERVICE.
The inhabitants of the Niagara peninsula suffer no little inconvenience by reason of the stopping of the boat service between this city and the Niagara River. The Niagara Navigation Company run their boats for but five months during the season. It is pointed out that formerly the City of Toronto was kept in commission for seven months, namely, from April till the end of November. The traffic at that time was probably not one-quarter of what it is now. The residents of the peninsula have, therefore, a reasonable cause of grievance to ventilate. A correspondent in another column states that the people are in earnest in this matter; and an opposition boat is hinted at unless the company who now control the trade furnish the service asked for. The city of Toronto is interested in having navigation kept open for as long a period as possible. At one time in our history boats between Toronto and the Niagara River ran during the entire year, and it has been suggested that such a service be again revived. DEADLIER THAN WHISKY.

That such drugs are in common use in this city there can be no question. HIS GRIP SAVED HIS LIFE.

A Boy Falls Down an Elevator Shaft, Grabs a Bar and is Saved.

A thrilling incident occurred in the warehouse of the J. B. Maclean Publishing Company, Front-street west, yesterday, in which a fatal elevator accident was averted only by the tenacity of a small boy. The building has an ordinary old-fashioned elevator running up to six stories. The entrance to the elevator shaft on the upper floors are protected only by a cross bar held by a bolt at one side and lifts from a cleat at the other. A delivery boy, who happened to have business on the top flat, and whose name is Calvert, tried to catch the elevator just as it was leaving; he failed to do so, but somehow or other grasped the bar and set it free; with the result that he lost his balance and fell into the open shaft. He managed to retain his hold of the end of the bar, however, and hung dangled in the shaft, with the ground 60 feet below him. His only support was the grasp he maintained on the 2 x 4 scuttling. In this position he hung for fully two minutes. Everybody in the warehouse lost his head except Foreman Robert Gay, who ran for the fire escape rope. This was let down with a loop on the end. The boy then let go with one hand, shoved his arm through the loop and was pulled up to safety. But for the extraordinary strength of his wrists he would almost certainly have been killed.

WHOOPIING COUGH EPIDEMIC.

Adults the Principal Sufferers—Dangerous Complaint at This Season.

The World was informed yesterday that whooping cough had become epidemic among adults during the past week. In one front-street business establishment two employees were afflicted with the trouble and in one of these cases it had spread to the entire family. Both gentlemen stated that they have neighbors so afflicted. The disease is not confined to any one quarter of the city, but the cases are mostly scattered. Enquiry at the Medical Health Department yesterday showed that no cases had been recently reported. It is not, however, supposed by physicians to report the disease, although it is customary for them to do so if they happen to be registering instances of other contagious disorders. Whooping cough, though not a serious complaint, is regarded as particularly dangerous at this season of the year, since it is likely to trouble the victim all winter.

Starving Canal Boatmen.

Ellenville, N.Y., Oct. 11.—Starvation is staring the canal boatmen in the face. Their 45 boats are tied up all along the line on dry land. Many are empty, but more are filled with men. For seven weeks not a boat has moved. The men have quartered their horses and mules with farmers, but they have no money to pay for their keep. The boatmen usually make ten trips every season, and they receive \$80 a trip. This season they have made only four or five trips. Few of the men have paid for their boats.

An Aged Actress Dead.

New York, Oct. 11.—Mrs. Marlan Sutton, who died at Narragansett, N.J., on Sept. 19, was one of the oldest actresses on the American stage. She was born in Liverpool in 1810. Her maiden name was Mercer. Her first appearance was at Montreal and she was first seen in New York at the Bowery Theatre on July 4, 1838, in "Destiny."

A Quick Passage.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—The Beaver Line steamship Lake Superior, which left here October 2, arrived at Liverpool this morning, a day ahead of schedule time.

A Doctor Surrenders.

William West, a doctor from an English regiment stationed in Halifax, applied to Col. Denison's Court yesterday for assistance to get back his regiment. He was remanded for a week until his commanding officer can be heard from.
