A letter from Messrs. Freshfield & Williams, the London solicitors of the city of Toronto, was received in Mr. Fullerton's office on Aug. 20. It enclosed Mr. Blake's opinion. On Wednesday, Aug. 21, a despatch, headed "Toronto Bonds," appeared on the front page of The Mail and Empire, which included the opinion of Mr. Alexander Asher, Q.C., which had also been sent to the city solicitor's office and the following paragraph as to Mr. Blake:

"Mr. Edward Blake, Q.C., M.P., has also been consulted. In his opinion the fact that the city did not avail itself of permissive legislation to pass a bylaw to issue 4 per cents, does not constitute a ground of action, and in the absence of any by-law the city is not responsible. In his opinion, however, the moral aspect of the question, apart from the strictly legal and technical, does not place the city of Toronto in a favorable light, and that it has an

from the strictly legal and technical, does not place the city of Toronto in a favorable light, and that it has an unfortunate appearance that the authorities should have availed themselves of the want of the corporate seal to a resolution which would otherwise have been legally binding."

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL BOARD. Atkinson Resigns—Date Annual Meeting Set for Oct. 19.

The principal busines which came up for consideration at the meeting of was the resignation of Mr. C. J. Atkinretary of the Victoria Industrial School. That gentleman read a letter in which he gave his reasons the step. He repeated in effect charges made in the original er of complaint, which he admitted his evidence to have drafted. It ducted the examination witnesses, endeavoring to prove the in-competency and mismanagement of the superintendent, and in several par-ticulars his moral unfitness. The let-ter read yesterday afternoon charged that he disciplining was "mechanical"; that punishments were excessive, as many as 30 corporals being adminis-tered in one day; that the same medi-cine was administered for all sick cine was administered for all sick-nesses; that a member of the staff practised habits (tobacco) not allowed to the boys, and lack of system and business management. In conclusion, he desired the acceptance or rejection of his resignation to be an expression on the subjects he had brought before

on the subjects he had brought before them.

This latter clause the committee took exception to, and after the secretary and superintendent had retired the following resolution was drafted after considerable debate: "Resolved, that the resignation of Mr. Atkinson be accepted, but that in accepting it this board desires to record that while there were some matters brought forth at the investigation which Mr. Atkinson mentions which showed some laxity in management, there was nothing to show that there were grounds for any such serious charges as are repeated in the letter of resignation, and this board refuses to recognize any connection between its decision upon the resignation tendered by this officer and its intended action upon the question of the general management of the institution, which is under consideration in proper form."
