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

The Need of Production

It must be plain to the most obtuse and unreasoning mind that twenty-four or twenty-five million of men cannot be withdrawn even from the swarming population of Europe without effecting a huge reduction in the produce of labour and of the Women may in a measure soil. supply the places of men, but it must be remembered that women have also their sphere in the economics of life. Therefore in taking them to the land they are being taken, in the main, from other emfor mently, if every man who goes to fight there was a woman to take his place in agriculture or other industry there would still be a deficiency not only in labour but in production. At the present time 400,000 women are being called for to take the place of 250,000 British soldiers recruited from farm work. Hence it is clear, that no matter what steps may be taken, either during the war or after the war, there must be an enormous shortage of the requirements across the Atlantic for many years to come. And that shortage for a period subsequent to the declaration of peace will be as keenly felt as at any time during the gigantic struggle. Needn't Kiss Bible in Taking Oath

Toronto, April 13.—In future it will not be necessary for a witness in taking an oath in court to kiss the Bible. The legat committee of the Ontario Legis-lature this morning passed an amend-ment to the Evidence Act, which pro-vides that a witness shall be sworn by administering the oath while he has a administering the oath while he has a copy of the Old or New Testament in his hand.

It is Caused by the Pressure of Mod ern High Power Powder. The use of high power powder in ri fles has given rise to a phenomenon

which did not exist in black powder days. This is known as "whip" and is due to the pressure and vibration set up by the powder. It is constant with given loads and is always in the same

Sights are aligned by the manufac turer to compensate for this whip in proportion to the powder charge used. In firing auxiliary cartridges it will of cen be found that the rifle shoots off center. As a matter of fact the bullet from the auxiliary is traveling in a true line with the bore, and it is the sights that are wrong. The lighter charge of the auxiliary does not pro-duce the usual whip, with the result that the line in prolongation of the bore of the rifle along which the bullet travels is not the line given by the alignment of the sights.

Two other rifle terms that must not be confused are upsettage and keyholing. Keyholing is the tendency of the bullet to turn over in flight, while upsettage is the slight shortening of the major axis of the bullet due to the force of the charge. It was peculiar to black powder fired behind lead bullets and does not exist to any appreciable extent in metal jacketed bullets with smokeless powder. In the latter case the charge burns more slowly and the jacket stiffens the bullet against the sudden blow from behind .-- Outing.

ORIGIN OF THE PERISCOPE. The Reflecting Spyglass Used at the

Siege of Sebastopol. Speaking of the origin of the peri-scope, the following extract from the writings of the well known inventor of "Pepper's Ghost" gives the credit to the clerical profession. Pepper wrote soon after the Crimean war:

"During the siege of Sebastopol numbers of our best artillerymen were con-tinually picked off by the enemy's rifles as well as by cannon shot, and in order to put a stop to the foolhardiness and incautiousness of the men, a very in-genious contrivance was invented by the Rev. William Taylor, the condju-tor of Mr. Denison in constructing the first 'Big Ben' bell. It was called the reflecting spyglass, and by its simple construction rendered the exposure of the sailors and soldiers who would look over the parapet or other parts of the works to observe the effect of their shots perfectly unnecessary, while an-other form was constructed for the purpose of allowing the gunner to 'lay' or aim his gun in safety.

"The instruments were shown to Lord Panmure, who was so convinced of the importance of the invention that he immediately commissioned the Rev. William Taylor to have a number of these telescopes constructed, and if the siege had not terminated just at the time the invention was to have been used no doubt a great saving of the valuable lives of the skilled artillerymen would have been effected."-London Express.



TESTING A FREIGHT CAR. Shower Baths Are Used For Detecting Leaky Roofs.

Shower baths for freight cars? Certainly. Treating the cars to a good bath every now and then is the method which railroads have devised to prevent having to pay for freight dam-aged while in transit by water leaking through the car roofs. 1

To detect a leak in the roof of a freight car before it has caused any lamage to the goods inside is no easy matter. Previous to the introduction of the shower baths for cars railroads frequently had to pay heavy bills for damage caused by roofs which were supposedly in the best of condition.

To overcome this difficulty on several large railroad systems every car is given at regular intervals a severe test for leaks by means of shower baths.

The bathing apparatus is rigged over a track along which the car is run at slow speed. Enormous volumes of water are poured upon the car and with such force that water will find its way inside if there is any fault in the roof, sheathing or ends.

As soon as the car emerges from the bath inspectors examine it carefully and mark with chalk any signs of leaks.

A car thus marked is sent to the shop to be made waterprof. Before it is sent out to resume its work it is subjected to a second shower bath to determine whether the repairs have been satisfactorily made.

MODERN GREEKS.





New Regulations for Fish and game

An Act to prohibit the sale of wild ducks, wild geese, or other wild water-fowl was decided upon by the Fish and Game Committee of the Legislature as a step for lessening the unnecessary slaughter of game birds. Other import-ant decisions were the prohibition of trapping fur-bearing animals without a license, farmers exempt; close season for partridge and gronse until Oct. 15, 1918; open season for woodcocks, November 1 to 15; for quail, the same, with a day-bag limit of 6 and a season limit of 25; black and grey squirrels and wild turkey, November 1 to 15; ducks from Sept. 1 to Sept. 31. Sept. 31. The license fee for Americans 15 re-

great deal more destructive than ankerworms, San Jose scale, and other pests. Each bag or case may contain from 700 to 1,200 eggs, which during next May and June will hatch into as many hungry caterwill pillars.

In many cases the bag worm is doing more harm to shrubbery and shade trees than all other insects combined. If the proper measures of prevention are put into practice it is, however, one of the easiest insects to control.

A simple way of destroying the pest is to collect the cases or bags during the fall and winter and burn them. If this work is thoroughly done the eggs of the insects will be destroyed and the pest may be completely stamped out.

Since the caterpillars that hatch from the bagworm eggs are leaf eaters they may be destroyed by the use of arsenical poisons. When the worms are small or just emerging from the bag-like cases during May and June they may be killed easily by spraying the foliage thoroughly with arsenate of lead paste at the rate of arsenate of lead paste at the rate of three pounds to fifty gallons of water. This spray should be applied just as soon as the pest begins to feed in the spring. Later sprays may require more poison. During the summer sticky bands placed around the trunks of the trees will protect them from the caterpillars which wander at this season.

Ford plant. Thus 3,000 persons there are dependent upon the Ford factory. Basing an estimate on the fact given in the last census report that there are five in the average family, this makes a total of 15,000 people that look to the Ford Plant for their support. For instance, twenty-two girl office employes, steno-graphers and file clerks contributed a total of \$77.50 per month or 12 months. Ford employes are the highest paid automobile workers in the British Empire. They are paid 3 times as well as the aver-age Canadian workmen—receiving \$1,200 a year as against the average wage of \$435 as given by the last census reports.
