Manual Training Schools.

Boston, Jan. 12—Prof. James W. Robertson, commissioner of dairying and agriculture for the Dominion of Canada, who has been in this city superintending the shipping of hay to South Africa for the British government has taken the opportunity to visit our small training schools in connection with the plans for the introduction of similar methods of instruction in Canada. On Saturday Prof. Robertson purchased of a Boston concern the necessary equipment for twelve manual training centres in various provinces. For a long time Prof. Robertson has been interested in the plan for the introduction of manual and the expansion of practical instruction as a means of increasing the number of young men who will be anxious to secure a more advanced scientific education.

Sir William C. MacDonald, of Montreal, who had given about \$2,500,000 to the Mc Gill University, has provided Prof. Robertson with the funds necessary for the equipment of the schools and also to meet the expenses of qualified teachers and of maintenance for three years in these places. In Ottawa there will be equipped and maintained for three years as many centres as are required to give all the boys, numbering about one thousand, between the ages of nine and fourteen, in the public schools, an opportunity to receive the Sloyd training. Schools will also be established at Brockville, Ont.; Charlottetown and Summerside, P. E. I.; a place in the Province of Quebec; Truro, N. S.; Bredericton, N. B; Winnipeg, Man.; Calgary' N. W. T., and at a place in British Columbia. Thoroughly trained and experienced teachers of high attainment will be brought at first from England, Scotland and the United States. Next summer it is proposed to pay the expenses of several teachers from Canada to Great Britain and tagehers from Canada to Great Britain and stresses to take the course of training there, for see for themselves the educational systems and methods of those countries. At the end of three years the practicability of the system will have been fully demonstrated, and as in other countries, probably, will be made a part of the educational studies under the school authorities.

Russian High-Handedness Russian High-Handedness.

Vancouver, E. C. Jan. 12—A digest of the opinions of the principal Chinese and Japan-see papers as received today by the 'Empress of Japan,' thirteen days from Yokohama, indicates that Russia is unmistakably revealing its intentions in the Far East.

The 'China Gazette' says that, taking advantage of England's pressing engagements in South Africa, the Russian Government, through its consulate at Hankow, has revived its claim to the Jardine-Matheson land, making a demand for the property in the most peremptory fashion. The Russian consul claims that the question of the disputed ownership of the land has been absolutely decided in favor of his government and he has announced his intention to take forotible possession of the property without negotiations.

Keep everlastingly at it. Take him back if he attempts to trot or shuffle, but keep him touched up with the whip. You may get some improvement in this way; in-

teach a horse to walk fast is when he is first broken. Patience is the remedy in in this case, and keeping everlasting at it. However, while there is a farmer's pride in having all farm stock look fat and sleek, vet with all young stock the first winter is most important.
