### The School-Children's Friend

One morning, about a hundred years ago, a farmer boy with a basket on his arm was on his way to a store in Franklin, Massachusetts. He was probably fourteen years of age, although you would have guessed him to be older. His face was pale, and bore the saddened look of a child who had never known what it was to play.
