## The Old Stamp Duty on Newspapers.

As late as 1836 there was a duty on each nenspuper sold in Great I3ritain and there was besides a considerable duty sinpence or sume such sum on esery adsertisement in on newspaper. In the ealy days of our century the stamp dut) was abuat fourpence though it hat been much higher than that. There was also a heavy excise tax on the paper itself and a customs duty that prevented foreign competition. These various charges pressed heavily on the newspapers of that day, so much so that one could not come into existence until it had made provision for no end or factitious expenses. The consequence was that in those days the possession of a newspaper was a luxury of the rich, and uthers were decmed fortunate if they obtained an occasional read of a paper. It was a common thing for a number of persons to club together and take a paper which they read by turns, and as compensation for late recoption of the news the paper remained in possession of him whose turn came last.

The adsentisement tan was finally abolished and in 1855 the stamp, duty was also done away with. Then many papers were stavted and some of them acquited influence and reputation, but still the paper duties told heavily against cheap journalism. The various taxes were originally imposed with the object of checking the srowth of seditious newspapers, and when the agitation came to abolish the taxes, it was the crecd of many that cheap newspapers meant the establishment of a daily proparanda of socialism, communism, red republicanim, blasphemy, bod spelling and general immorality. The sulbject is fully treated in Iustin McCarthys IIistory of Our (Own Times.

How different it is in these days in our enleghtened and progressive Dominion. Here every billage ah , wist has its newspaper at not more than a dollar a year, and metropolitan weehlies are sold at half that -um. Eien the average rural paper in Canala to elay gives vastly more news that the Lomen pipkis did h.alf a century dso notwithstandin:s their price was smmething like sjo a year.

Haw'rn we vowed in our anger that the "changed-every-day-upecials-all-to-be-seat-tered-and-in eath cane followng-pure-reading-not-amdwidhed.in.. with..odds--and..ends...and-wher-pecials" woukd not be accepted at any tigure: Havont we lowked over the paper, on receipt of the formal motice of a mis-tit, a no. tice that serenely if ant sarcastically enguires
lsn't it the truth, brethen, that the fault is as much with ourselves as with the conditions of the contract? Is it so difficult a matter to give what we agree to deliver? Probably not, when we go about the right way of giving.
The news foreman has a deal to contend with. Placing special position advertisements is the bane of his typographical hife. I know of a truly good man who wrecked his connection with the Methodist church while trying to get this clasis of advertisement into place every day. His language developed from a fairly decent Anglo-Sanom to a profuse vocabulary of a markedly heated character. There is no

use trying to rectify this matter of position after the paper is printed. While its pages are on the stone is the place to doy your work and save regrets.
Half a dozen phans had been tried and found wanting. Several had the weak spot that when the make-up was off for a day or two the office was stranded on the edge of an uncertainty as to the advertisements that should appear in next day's paper and where they should be placed. It was concluded to give the make up’s mellect and his memory a rest and a scheme was blocked out and tried that has given results about as perfect as may be reached. Simple alfair, requires no elaborate preparation. The accompauying plate, will show a fairly perfect phan of keeping track of such advertising contracts.

A number of sheets tblank book demy was
found to be a convenient size) were ruled to pattern, providing spaces for name or title of advertisement, memo. of position and for thirty-one days. The thirtyone spaces were numbered from one to thirteone. It averared about three folios (for the entries cover the width of two patges) to hold the entries for each month. When copy comes in, the book is taken, name of advertisement and position recorded and the dates of insertion checked off as far ahead as may be desired. Three months is a bair period to enter up at once, thourg the full contract term would be better. Weekly insertions are entered in red ink, daily insertions in black ink. In the space for the day of the week or month on which the advertisment is to appear is written the number of the advertisement or block or reading notice- or both.

Now when the makeup tackles the day's proceedings he has only one column to refer to. If the date be the toth of November, then advertisments and specials marked in col. 16 , on pares for the month go into the paper. Angone can carry ot: the details. Of course, plain every day advertisements and other matters of like chatacter need not be entered.

If eriors are clamed by the advertiser the facts can be looked up quicker by reference to the book than bey consulting the files of the paper. Contracts and important copy can be retained in the business office, and it is preferable to have entries in the book made by the business office staff, though this detail may be attended to $b y$ the foreman. In many ways the book is a help. On a day when a crush of mat. ter threatens it can be ascertained in a minute just what space will be taken up by advertisements soing in, outside of those standing in the forms. Also the space available from the deertisements taken out or be removed.

Try it, brethren. On a small daily it is the one taing needed. It has helped others and will help you.

The press gallery was not slow to odopt the hint and the phatase -peodily came into seneral usase.

## A Scurrilous Press.

A writer in the Canadian Magazine ${ }^{\kappa}$ gives the press of Newfoundand a very bad chameter, sumuch so that we must confess they will be no acquisition to the pournatistic ranks of Canada if Newfoundland should dinally decide to cast its lot in with the Dominon. The followmy are a few extracts from the article in question : -
"The press of Newfoundland probably takes the palun for scurrility. . I Prom a literary point of viey their merits are of the smallest. Iluge tope, capitals and italics do duty for eloquence. Tlocir leaders are rather violent than clever. It is the reneral practice to fill up vacant spaces with anomymons letters on varioms topics, mestly virulent abose of (iovermment officials from the governor down to the lumblest constable or tide-waiter. In actlition to these there is alwases a serial novel, semeralli of the pennedreadfol order.
The press dues, and has done for mam lears past, incaleulable harm: and the injury is two fold, for not only has it a debasing inthence on the people, but it bigiths the reputation of the colony aloroad. -. . The people are vere much to blane in the matter. In the case of litel it is next to impersible to ohtain a verdict muless the complainant can show that he has suffered pectuniary loss. It is therefore concluded that Newfoundland juries consider low of money a far more serions matter than lons of character.
of course in all phaces larice allow. ance must le made to the press during elections. When political feeling runs high, even the most respectable papers often lecome violent and not infrequently personal. But the stock-in-trade of the St. folm's papers is persomal abmes of the mont unsernpalons nature, and lxoth phblic and private persons are alike assailed. A nember of the (jorermatent is appointed governor of the Savings Bank, and the opponition paper immediatele warns the public that dejosits are not safe in his hands. The terms liar, thice, traitor, scommerel, to axe nothing of smeh ex: presion as loooder and hoodhum, may lee seen in amy paper you may happen to pick up.

So great has the scandal become that the clersy of Newfoun:land have felt inpelled to call upon the adherents of the taious religious denominations to unite in discountenancing the scurrility and disloyalty of the press of the colong. The resolution adopted by the clergy contains the following very strong language:
" In particular we consider its tendency is to " pollute the minds of the young and to comn" teract the teachings of church, school and "Christan home : to poison the minds of the " whole community and vitiate and degrade the -a public taste. White journalism of a proper - kind has a wholesome and elevating intlu-- ence, that to which we refer merits the abhor-- rence and condemmation of all Christian men "' and women."

## Advertising Rates.

The problem of how to obtain fair advertis. ing rates in country papers is still unsolved. Some time ago the Cimadian Prese Association disensed the guestom, and we believe arrived at the conclusion that a monimum rate of $s 2$ per inch per sear for each 20 quires of circthation would be abont the thing. This rate is certainly low enough in all conscience, but yet how few of the country papers secure it? The custom is for some advertising shark to send a contract for signature, p.obably accompanied by the first quarter's payment in cash at hadf the above rate or even less than that. In many cases rather than return the money the pub. lisher inserts the advertisement and finds his contract burdened with such restrictions as " to be inserted top of column next pure reading matter,' etc. etc. Then if the advertisement is not inserted according to instructions, the advertising gentleman aforesaid refuses to pay until the advertisement is put in another twenty or thirty tines free of charge to make up for the alleged wong insertions. The publisher should rigorously refuse all such contracts, and give no preferred positions to anyone except at an adrance in price of from twenty-ive per cent to double or treble full rates according to the position reguired. The publisher not onls depreciates the value of his own space by accepting low priced contracts, but gives the advertising shark a battering ram with which to knock down the prices of his brother journalist elsewhere.

The remedy is, however, very simple and can be applied, we think, in only one way: That is by the newspapers combining together and placing all their advertsing outside of their own counties in the hands of some honorable agent, say in Toronto. Then when outside contracts are offered let them be at once sent to the general agent who has full power to cloce contraces and whose interest and duty it is in get the full rate ageed on. $\lambda$ combination of one hundred papers in Ontario on this plan would be strong enough to command the situation by dealing honorably with each other and with the agent. Stict integrity between the parties and a risid adherence to the plan in all its details, would bring about in the course of a year or two a far better state of alfairs than now exists, and would be a good thing alike for the newspapers and the agent.

Tolle laprense is willing to act as the general asent if a representative mumber of papers can be obtained in ()ntatio to gro in. Tobe successful the leading journals in each combe in the province should jom in the phan, when its sue. cess will be assured.
